



# Missouri Agricultural Prices

Released October 31, 2022

The September Prices Received Index 2011 Base (Agricultural Production), at 131.2, decreased 0.2 percent from August but increased 21 percent from September 2021. At 127.0, the Crop Production Index was down 1.3 percent from last month but up 17 percent from the previous year. The Livestock Production Index, at 136.4, increased 1.3 percent from August, and 26 percent from September last year. Producers received lower prices during September for hogs, broilers, soybeans, and strawberries, but higher prices for market eggs, lettuce, cattle, and broccoli. In addition to prices, the indexes are influenced by the volume change of commodities producers market. In September, there was decreased marketing of cattle, wheat, upland cotton, and peaches and increased monthly movement for soybeans, corn, apple, and dry beans.
