


Montana Sheep Production


The data provided by Montana ranchers for NASS surveys lets us know what is happening in livestock production in Montana - from inventory and lamb crop to feed and wool production. NASS data help expand access to resources for Montana producers to make business decisions and to diversify into new markets.

Montana's sheep inventory dropped 5,000 head from the 2017 inventory of 230,000 to sit at 225,000 in 2018.



The total value of all sheep and lambs lost from all causes in Montana during 2017 was \$6,760,000.

Or 41,000 head of sheep, which is 3,000 lower than the 2016 totals.



The two leading causes of death in 2017 were coyotes and weather conditions.

Value of loss from all predators was down 13.7% from 2016.


The top sheep producing county in Montana in 2018 with 25,000 head of sheep.
