CROP PROGRESS AND CONDITION WEEK ENDING NOVEMBER 1, 2015

AGRICULTURAL SUMMARY: This week brought much cooler day and nightime temperatures, as well as sometimes heavy precipitation across the state of Montana. Most stations in the State received measurable precipitation and the largest amounts recorded were in the drought-stricken Northwest region of the State where the highest recorded this week was in Superior with 2.30 inches of moisture. Corn harvested for grain is well underway with 60 percent harvested, which is behind last year's 79 percent but ahead of the 5-year average of 50 percent. Sugarbeet harvest continues with 87 percent, which is behind last year's 97 percent and the 5-year average of 95 percent. Potato harvest advanced to 82 percent complete, behind of last year's 83 percent and the 5-year average of 94 percent. Winter wheat emergence is at 91 percent, which is behind of last year's 96 percent but ahead of the 5-year average of 55 percent. Posture and range condition is rated 73 percent good to excellent, compared with 75 percent last year and the 5-year average of 55 percent. Pasture and range conditions were unchanged from the previous week with 19 percent rated good to excellent, which remains well behind last year's 49 percent and the 5-year average of 38 percent. Producers continue to move livestock off summer ranges ahead of normal with 85 percent of cattle and 91 percent of sheep moved compared with a 5-year average of 81 percent and 86 percent, respectively.
