<u>Good week for field work:</u> New England averaged 5.5 days suitable for fieldwork last week.

New England weather was mostly dry last week, except for light precipitation in some areas. Average weekly temperatures throughout the region ranged from 7 degrees below normal in the north, to 5 degrees above normal in the south. Two percent of pasture was rated in poor condition while 29 percent was fair, 53 percent was good, and 16 percent was excellent. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0 to 1.23 inches in the region. Most fields and pastures continued to have adequate to surplus moisture levels, although some were rated as having very short to short moisture levels due to the drier weather. The drier weather last week allowed for more cutting of hay and planting of crops. In some areas, farmers were making their second cutting of hay. Strawberries were being harvested throughout the region as well as a variety of other fruits and vegetables. Disease management of crops continued to take place due to the emergence of various pests and blights throughout the region.

CONNECTICUT

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Picking strawberries, top dressing corn.

WINDHAM, Dawn S. Pindell

Cucumber beetle and other pest pressure on vegetables. Oriental beetle emerging. Brooklyn Farmers' Market offering lettuce, kale, peas, swiss chard, and scallions. High Tunnel crops: cabbage, tomatoes, and cucumbers. All looked great! Sunny afternoon during first Brooklyn market of the season. Farmers were happy that the sun was shining! St. Croix and Frontenac grapes are both flowering; there was good weather this week for pollinating. Vines are growing well. Deer damage to leaves and stems. Green pruning to strip leaves on bottom and bringing up new trunks on some grape varieties. Sunny and 80's with low humidity. A lot of hay was cut; some of the hay fields got rained on with surprise shower.

MAINE

AROOSTOOK, Larry James

A few operations are cutting hay. Potato operations are cultivating and spraying herbicides. Most of the potatoes have emerged with excellent stands. Grain crops look very good.

CUMBERLAND, Sandy Truslow

Northwest winds blowing all week have dried out the soils. Southern Maine hasn't received much rain recently and vegetables need irrigation. Dry hay is being made. Strawberries are ripe for the picking.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Great growing weather, the crops are looking good. Some square bales are now being harvested. Planting was slower than normal but appeared to be very successful. Ripe, juicy strawberries are on the stands. Some early vegetables are available.

HANCOCK, Valerie Porter

Great week to get field work done. First cutting of hay is underway and looks good. Manure applied on fields that have been harvested. Crops are about 95% planted. Corn and potatoes are being hilled and sprayed. Much needed rain is due mid week. Strawberries about a week behind but look okay. It is still a little late to tell if late frost did any damage to blueberries. Farmers need warmer nights and sunnier days to help plants take a boost in growth.

PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

Haying was challenging with a lot of small showers going through the area during the week.

SOMERSET, Elaine S. Moceus

Perfect weather for harvesting dry hay this week and through the weekend. Most corn has been planted since field conditions have improved during the last week or two. Highbush blueberries are looking good with a slight hue of color.

WASHINGTON, David Yarborough

Pollination completed and bees have been moved out of most fields. Pollination was good on most fields, and as the cool wet weather continues, the crop quality would remain excellent. There have been some outbreaks of flea beetle in the past few weeks.

MASSACHUSETTS

HAMPDEN/HAMPSHIRE, Ted Smiarowski

Hot and sunny with a little rain this week. A lot of hay and straw was harvested due to the excellent weather conditions. Vegetable farmers are harvesting summer and zucchini squash, radishes, cabbage, strawberries, lettuce and greens. Planting tobacco, pumpkins, sweet corn, cabbage, beets, and greens. Topdressing many vegetable crops and scouting for diseases and insects.

NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH, Deb Cannon

At the end of the week, early varieties were at about 15-20% bloom, later varieties remained mostly at hook stage. Early fungicides were applied by many growers. Outbreaks of Dearness and Putnam scale have been confirmed, some have reached the 'crawler' stage.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

BELKNAP, Kelly McAdam,

Harvest began this weekend on early season strawberries. Very little precipitation this week.

BELKNAP, Donna Juneau,

A good week all around with temperatures in the 70s and 80s. Little to no rain allowed for additional planting. There was overall good crop growth, and it was a great week for harvesting first cut hay.

CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

Weather has been fantastic for field work. Great for cultivation and early season weeding. Much more produce variety now available at the markets which have just seen the first strawberries of the season. Most are finishing up with first cut hay.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

A little bit of rain midweek, but bright sunny weather for the remainder. Great drying weather, plenty of farms were putting up dry hay. Other farms finishing first cutting for haylage/balage. Field corn looking good across the board. Vegetables doing well, with early crops showing up at farmers' markets and farm stands. Strawberries available this week and looking like a pretty good crop.

COOS, Steve Turaj

Breezy, sunny weather. Haylage and haying activities going at a good pace. Windrows looking fuller and higher this year. Manure spreading on meadows already harvested, re-growth looking fine. Most corn emerged and looks to be doing well, at various sizes, reflecting early planting challenges. Some herbicides being applied. Soybeans just emerging to first true leaf stage.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

For the week ending June 21st, scattered showers mid week did little to slow down field work. Farmers continued to put in hay and haylage. Some farms are still planting corn and other field crops. Overall, the corn still has a way to go in order to catch up in terms of growth. Some reports indicate that first cutting was less than prior years.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fruit: Strawberry harvest continues. Sweet Cherry harvest will soon be under way. Fruit growers mowing orchard floors, monitoring pests and crop development, and applying sprays for pest control. Some apple scab being seen. Removing fire blight strikes in apple orchards. Field Crops: Farmers making haylage. Farmers are side dressing fertilizer to field corn, if needed, and to hay fields. Pastures and hay fields are growing well. Vegetables: Growers continued harvesting early season vegetables such as lettuce, greens, radishes, summer squash, and zucchini. Weeds are plaguing growers. Farmers are side dressing fields with fertilizer, cultivating and hand-hoeing weeds, scouting for pests and spraying. Striped cucumber beetles and potato leaf hoppers are here and first squash vine borer has been caught!

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Strawberries turning red and PYO operations busy. Harvesting an array of greens, asparagus, beets, and sugar snap peas. Some greenhouse tomatoes have been harvested. Sunny and warm week helped plants grow as well as weeds. We are still about 10 days late. A couple of nights saw temperatures as low as 42 degrees Fahrenheit. Planting sweet corn and other vegetables, side dressing corn, fertilizing veggies, weeding, monitoring pests, and irrigating. Mowing orchards and monitoring pests. Blueberry crops and grapes looking average. Hay and pasture look good.

SULLIVAN, Kelly Greenbacker

Beautiful weather for making progress on hay harvest. Lots of dry hay and hay silage being made across the county. Dry weather with temps in the 70s to 80 through the weekend. Last of corn fields being planted, most of corn has emerged.

RHODE ISLAND

NEWPORT, Paul E. Brule

It's been a warm dry week and a lot of work is getting accomplished. Potatoes look very good but not quite in blooming stage for the early potatoes. Straw is about all finished up at being harvested and baled. Hay is not quite half done yet for 1st cutting. A lot of hay is being chopped. The rest of the hay is being baled and the quality is good, but the quantity is short in some fields. Just about all the vegetables are in now and looking good. Looks like we should be starting to pick summer squash pretty soon. Strawberries are excellent and we had good weather for picking them. The size and quantity are very good. Pastures are good, but some parts of the state are a little bit dry and need some rain.

VERMONT

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Great weather week in Franklin County. Much hay going in and making dry hay. Any late corn is now being planted and growth is going great on all corn. Some wet areas have taken a beating: no corn in these spots. Starting N test and seeing some N top dress already applied on corn. Some second cut being harvested and very good re-growth. Gardens are in full swing and much weeding is needed. Have not seen any strawberries harvested to date.
