<u>Fair week for field work:</u> New England averaged 3.5 days suitable for field work last week.

New England experienced seasonably cooler temperatures last week, with scattered precipitation throughout the region. Average weekly temperatures in the region ranged from three degrees below normal to six degrees above normal. Four percent of pasture was rated in very poor condition while 26 percent was poor, 35 percent was fair, 34 percent was good, and 1 percent was excellent. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.62 to 4.95 inches in the region. Field work was slowed or halted in areas that received heavier rainfall. Cranberry harvest continued in Massachusetts for many of the larger growers. However, most all other crops were winding down in the region. Farm stands and PYO operations were beginning to close for the winter season. Farmers continued to clean up fields, plant cover crops, spread manure, and put farm equipment away for the winter.

CONNECTICUT

HARTFORD & TOLLAND, Ross Eddy

A soggy week with better than one inch in most of the area. Corn silage harvest is complete and grain corn moisture is on the high side. Summer farmers' markets are about done for the season and in a few weeks the winter markets will open.

LITCHFIELD. Richard Meinert

Some late planted corn is all that remains left to cut for silage. Soybeans are drying down nicely. Frost has been extremely spotty; hardly any field crops have been nipped yet. This is the growing season that just doesn't seem to want to end.

WINDHAM, Dawn Pindell

Mowing hay, baling and chopping for grass silage, and corn chopping continues. Not much activity on grain corn - it is still standing in the fields. With recent rains the cover crop is a vibrant green and growing well. Pumpkin sales with prices of 45 cents per lb. to \$5.00 for all pumpkins at farm stands and backyard stands. Good weather this past weekend for outdoor activities and cropping. Light rains brought a double rainbow cascading across the autumn landscape on Sunday afternoon.

MAINE

CUMBERLAND, Sandy Truslow

Rainy weather stopped all field activities last week. Some areas still have not seen a frost yet. This will be a record for the latest frost in the Portland area. Unfortunately, frost should be arriving later this week. Overall, a good to average year for crops.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Lots of rain replenished ground water supplies for winter. Corn is ready for grain harvest. Soybeans are not drying out well.

SOMERSET, Elaine S. Moceus

Warm and dry week, turning wet and cooler towards the end of the week; halted some field work.

MASSACHUSETTS

NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH, Deb Cannon

Cranberry harvest continues with many smaller growers complete, but larger growers with substantial acres remaining to harvest. Last week's storm brought additional needed rain to recharge the local water supplies.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

COOS, Steve Turaj

Corn harvesting finishing, and manure spreading on hay land.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

For the week ending October 25th, rain showers were persistent 5 out of 7 days. Reports of rainfall varied from as little as 1.2 inches to well over 2 inches in other areas of the county. Soils are generally returning to a fully saturated condition. Producers are finishing up corn harvest. Most of the corn for silage has been harvested. Producers are capping their bunks and many are still trying to harvest the last of their haylage. Most apple producers have finished picking. Vegetable growers are winding down, but a number are still offering quite a variety of produce on their stands. Pumpkin growers should be nearly done harvesting this year's crop.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fruit: Orchardists busy marketing crop. Harvesting Rome, Fuji, and Golden Delicious apples. Many orchardists are flail mowing apple drops under trees. Vegetables: Farmers are cleaning up fields, picking up plastic mulch, drip tape, and trellis stakes, seeding cover crops on harvested fields, draining and putting away irrigation equipment, and soil testing fields for next season. Cleaning and putting away farm equipment. Field crops: Silage corn chopping is finished. Soil testing fields for next season and cleaning and putting away farm equipment. Seeding cover crops on harvested fields. Some manure spreading and incorporating in soil is taking place.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Harvesting salad greens, radishes, and leeks. Apples, winter squashes, and pumpkins available at farm stands. Bringing rutabagas, celeriac, and carrots into root cellars for winter storage. Most of the apple PYO operations now closed for the season. Corn chopping was winding down. Cleaning fields, removing plastic, and liming. Torrential rain and gusty wind Wednesday evening into Thursday. End of the week warmer and sunny on Saturday. Some fields are very wet.

SULLIVAN, Kelly Greenbacker

Heavy rain through the middle of the week set back field activities. Ponding and minor flooding was visible in some fields. No damage has been reported. Farmers are still harvesting the last of the corn silage.

RHODE ISLAND

NEWPORT, Paul E. Brule

Farm stand activity was slow this past weekend, maybe because the weather got a lot cooler. Half of the state has not had a frost yet or a freeze. Silage corn and potatoes are just kind of wrapping up. They are harrowing and seeding rye in the fields. Cleaning up machinery to be put away for the winter. With Halloween coming this Friday, a lot of the stands will be closing up for the winter.

VERMONT

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Rainy week in Franklin County has kept field activity at bay. Rain was much needed; headed into the freeze-up season. Silage corn is pretty well in and what grain corn and soybeans there are to be harvested are at a standstill due to wet weather. This week will be the finale on pumpkin sales. Still plenty to be had, so carve away and be sure to watch for the great pumpkin.

ORLEANS, David Blodgett

It rained every day last week making the corn harvest very difficult. Most all corn for silage has been harvested. Corn for grain harvest is underway. There is not a lot of corn grown for grain in the county. Hay harvest is done for the year. The fields are far too wet now with all of the rain we have had. On a positive note, there was no flooding reported. The only other farm-related activity was some manure spreading.
