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Poor week for field work: New England averaged 2.5 days suitable for fieldwork last week.

High temperatures in the 60s and 70s have significantly reduced the snowpack across the Northeast. Fields are still too sodden to allow much work except in some parts of southern New England where plowing and manure spreading are occurring on the driest fields. Fruit production is still in the preparatory stage although buds are appearing. Planting is just beginning for some early season vegetables.

CONNECTICUT

HARTFORD/TOLLAND, Ross Eddy

Tobacco farmers steaming beds. Some sweet corn planted on early land. Dairy farmers spreading manure, plowing and seeding hay fields. Pastures need to grow before animals are put out. Dry hay supplies are very short.

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinart

Spreading manure and harrowing if the fields are dry enough.

MAINE

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

There is a big snowmelt going on. So far, there has been no major flooding. The maple sap run has been one of the latest recorded starts. Operations with vacuum systems are doing well. Most others are not. Mud season is shutting down woodland operations.

HANCOCK/PENOBSCOT/WASHINGTON, Valerie Porter

Sunny and breezy days are giving a nice snow melt. Water is still high in areas and fields are very wet. Farmers are waiting still waiting for fields to dry out in order to start spreading. Berry plants and fruit trees are being checked for winter damage in areas. Still too early to do anything in most areas.

PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

About a foot of snow on fields. A dusting of snow fell Sunday.

SOMERSET, Elaine S. Moceus

Steadily melting snow pack due to rain and higher temperatures forecast for the coming week, are causing an increased ice jam flood threat in some areas.

MASSACHUSETTS

BERKSHIRE, Debra Senger

The producers have started to be able to get on their fields, but some of them are too wet yet.

FRANKLIN, Heather Baylis

This past week's weather was good for making syrup! Melting continues and the start of green grass is a welcome sight. A really warm weekend is furthering the warm up. Producers are still not in the fields but working on equipment and getting ready to head out. Producers are pruning trees and berry bushes. Greenhouses are starting transplants.

HAMPDEN/HAMPSHIRE, Ted Smiarows

Some vegetable growers just starting to plow the ground to plant peas and onions. A few acres of sweet corn under plastic planted. Dairy farmers spreading manure. Strawberry growers taking winter mulch off plants.

NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH, Deb Cannon

The preliminary keeping quality forecast, a predictor of fruit rot disease pressure in cranberry, was issued for 2014, predicting poor conditions - high disease pressure. The final forecast will be issued in June and may improve if April and May are cool and dry.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

BELKNAP/STRAFFORD, Kelly McAdam

Although many fields are drying out quickly, we received heavy rain early Sunday morning in Belknap County, saturating wet or low-lying areas.

CARROLL, Olivia Sauders

Fields are still melting out. Fluctuating temperatures, and cool nights persist.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Another spell of warm weather, and things have thawed and melted nicely. Ground is still very wet out there, but things are starting to green up.

COOS

Flood Plains/Cornfields along rivers being inundated following snow melt and rain. All fields quite wet. Good bit of snow yet to melt up north. Maple houses boiling sap.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

Still some areas with snow on the ground.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Field Crops: Liming and fertilizing hayfields. Spreading manure and getting equipment ready for the spring rush. Vegetables: Transplanting tomatoes into high tunnels. Early season vegetables (peas, lettuce, greens) are being planted. Liming, fertilizing, plowing, disking (fields that are not too wet to work) and getting ready to plant fields. Fruits: Apples are at silver bud stage. Pruning blueberry bushes and raspberry patches. Orchardists are pruning younger fruit trees, chopping brush in orchard or push pruning out of the orchards. Fertilizing orchards.

SULLIVAN, Kelly Greenbacker

Maple Season is coming to an end in most areas as temperatures approached the 60s over the weekend, with above freezing nights. Most farmers said that the recent weather helped them approach close to average syrup production this year, despite the late start to the season. Lots of standing water is apparent in low lying fields with the quick snowmelt this past week and rivers are running high.

RHODE ISLAND

NEWPORT, Heather Faubert Spring has arrived!

NEWPORT, Paul E. Brule

A couple of the potato farmers started plowing this week. They will still be about 1 or 2 weeks from planting due to it being too cold. Potato seeds will be arriving in the next week in most places. Still predicting 2 days of rain this week. That's about all that is happening.

VERMONT

ADDISON, Jeffrey Carter

Started spreading solid stack manure. No soil tillage. Frost seeding clover. Some aeration tillage on grass fields.

CHITTENDEN, Terence Bradshaw

Apples still dormant. Ground frozen in most areas. Growers are finishing up pruning, pushing brush from orchards, and preparing for first copper sprays.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Lost much snow in Franklin County this week. Flooding is minimal and moisture remains consistent. Soils are still on the wet side and the amount of frost remaining is making any major field work unpractical.

ORLEANS, David Blodgett

A lot of snow melted this past week and the ground is saturated in most places. There was some localized flooding due to ice jams. Very little field is going on right now. Some manure is being spread on the drier high spots of fields.

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
