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Poor week for field work: New England averaged 2.5 days suitable for fieldwork last week.

Fields gradually dried out in the Northeast as high temperatures finally rose into the upper 60s and 70s. Crops from blueberries to potatoes were behind schedule due to below normal temperatures in the north and sleet and freezing rain in the south. New England orchards were beginning to come alive as green buds appeared in Connecticut and Rhode Island. Crop experts expected that tree fruits will advance to the pink stage in the next week or two. A few growers have planted sweet corn in plastic. Manure spreading has become a common sight on upland fields. Growers are generally prepared to begin full scale field work next week if warm sunny weather prevails.

CONNECTICUT

HARTFORD/TOLLAND, Ross Eddy

Planting early sweet corn and peas. Some forage seeding completed and fertilizing hay fields where not too wet. Spreading manure on corn fields. Still some frost most mornings.

LITCHFIELD. Richard Meinart

70 degrees a couple of days, 3 inches of sleet, freezing rain, snow, and 2-3 inches of rain all in one week. Makes it difficult to get any field work done!

WINDHAM, Dawn S. Pindell

Weather continues to vary from warm to cold, heavy rain, snow, ice, hard freeze this week. Grape vines seem to be in good shape. Bees lost over the harsh winter. Farmers are starting field work with manure spreading.

MAINE

HANCOCK/PENOBSCOT/WASHINGTON, Valerie Porter

Fields are drying nicely for the most part. Some manure was actually spread on higher ground over the weekend. Blueberry fields look pretty good for the most part. Producers haven't seen much winter damage to date, but could be early in some places. Burning of fields shall be starting this week in some areas. Still too early to tile ground in most areas.

OXFORD, Marcia Hall

Crop fields are still very wet and some have standing water from all the rain last week. Flooding in low areas was reported along with several road closures due to high water levels. Some parts of the counties received snow on 4/16/2014 in the morning. By the afternoon it had all changed over to rain, which brought on flood warnings all across Maine.

SOMERSET, Elaine S. Moceus

The fields are mostly clear of snow with many wet areas in low spots in fields. Maple sap producers are reporting between half and three-quarters of their normal production for the current year.

WASHINGTON, Michael L. Look

Blueberries are 10 days to 2 weeks behind at this point. They will catch up to some degree.

MASSACHUSETTS

BERKSHIRE, Debra Senger

The fields are drying out nicely, but some of the fields in Northern Berkshire are still wet. Should be getting into the fields in the coming day.

HAMPDEN/HAMPSHIRE, Ted Smiarowski

Crop fields are drying out and farmers are subsoiling, plowing, and spreading manure. Planting sweet corn under plastic, potatoes, onions, peas, carrots, collards and cabbage. Growers with high tunnels are harvesting a mix of greens. Nursery stock growers are also harvesting and selling their stock.

NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH, Deb Cannon

Cranberry growers began protecting flower buds from frost as the plants have begun to break dormancy. Spring herbicides are being applied.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

BELKNAP/STRAFFORD, Kelly McAdam

Fields are still too damp to work in.

CARROLL, Olivia Sauders

Buds just beginning to swell. Snow just now melted everywhere except for the north facing slopes and shaded areas.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Mostly dry and reasonably sunny for most of the week. Fields are drying out. Just starting to plant some of the earliest vegetable crops, and some dairy and livestock farms spreading manure on their driest ground.

COOS, Steve Turaj

Better weather after rains and several inches of snow early in the week. Flood plains serving well and filled up probably higher than had been seen in last 10 years or so. Some roads and bridges along river areas closed. Seems to have receded somewhat as of Friday, but there is still a fair about of snow in the hills yet to melt. Fields too cold and wet to do much with at this time. Mark Twain's observation of changeable New England weather verified this week.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Field Crops: Liming and fertilizing hayfields. Hauling manure to fields, spreading manure and getting equipment ready for the spring rush. Vegetables: Transplanting tomatoes into high tunnels. Early season vegetables (peas, lettuce, greens) are being planted. Liming, fertilizing, plowing, disking (fields that are not too wet to work) and getting ready to plant fields. Fruits: Apples are at silver bud stage and few at green tip. Peach are beginning to swell. Pruning last blueberry bushes and raspberry patches. Orchardists are finishing pruning, chopping brush in orchards or pushing pruning out of the orchards. Fertilizing is also occurring in the orchards.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Seeing some very cold nights. Heavy icing and rain and some snow on Monday evening into Tuesday morning. Windy and blistery cold on Wednesday. Pruning apple, pears and cherry trees. As well as pruning blueberries, raspberries. Harvesting spinach. In the greenhouse, growers are seeding in trays onions, peppers, eggplant, parsley, microgreens and other veggies. Spreading manure on hay fields.

RHODE ISLAND

NEWPORT, Heather Faubert

Very little crop farming activity yet due to cold conditions.

NEWPORT, Paul E. Brule

This past week, we started to have some warmer weather. Two days were in the high 50's, but the nights are still in the low 30's. There has been no corn planted yet. No potatoes have been planted either. Some farmers are going to try to plant some early potatoes later this week. Normally, we would be planting some corn under plastic and potatoes at this time, but it has been just too cold. The fields are also wet.

VERMONT

ADDISON, Jeffrey Carter

Light tillage with aeration tillage and limited manure spreading on light soil. No primary tillage. Some broadcast seeding and late frost seeding on pastures and hay fields. Limited no-till seeding of grass, clover and alfalfa hay.

CHITTENDEN, Terence Bradshaw

Apples are in silver tip in South Burlington with green tip expected by mid-week. Growers are catching up on late pruning, pushing brush, and calibrating sprayers. First sprays of copper and oil will likely be going on this week.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Frost is leaving us quickly in Franklin County. Heavy rains early in the week caused some major flooding and road closures. Grass is starting to green up in places which is a welcome sight. Manure spreading is being delayed. However, the frost working out of the ground will get us out on the fields soon.
