# **Crop Progress & Condition**

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<u>Poor week for field work:</u> New England averaged 2.5 days suitable for fieldwork last week.

Wet weather last week led to unfavorable pasture conditions across the region. 10% of pasture land was in very poor condition while 20% was poor, 40% was fair, 30% was good, and none was rated as excellent. Crop fields were also soggy and difficult to get into. By this time last year 20% of field corn acres had been planted. This year corn planting was just now beginning last week. Fruit trees and potatoes were also well behind schedule for mid-spring. Traces of subsoil frost and even snow were still present in parts of New Hampshire and Maine.

#### CONNECTICUT

#### LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinart

Spreading manure, tuning up corn planters and waiting for the ground to dry.

#### WINDHAM, Dawn S. Pindell

A cool very wet week; with 2" of rain on one day and showers throughout the week. Warmer temperatures but cool wind at the end of the week. Planting field corn delayed in most areas of the county. Peaches flowering, blueberries in swollen bud, starting planting sweet corn, lettuce, peas, and onions. Rain and windy conditions have hampered spraying apples to control scab. Farmers markets beginning a month earlier than usual with vegetables grown in high tunnels helping farmers get to market earlier. Bedding plant sales are beginning as well.

#### MAINE

#### AROOSTOOK, Larry James

Cold wet weather is delaying the planting season. Some operations may be able to get on the ground by the end of the week. North sides of line fences still have snow.

## CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Some areas received hail on Sunday. The weather is gradually warming up. Greenhouses are still spending more than expected on heating. The grass has greened up. Still waiting to see 70 degrees!

#### FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

It is time to repair fences here before the black flies come out. The smell of manure being spread is in the air! It is nice to see some green grass for a change.

## SOMERSET, Elaine S. Moceus

Field activity is limited to manure spreading and only on higher ground at this time, since some fields are still very wet. Producers have reported that plowing in some early fields may be able to be done next week. Temperatures have remained cool with rain showers throughout the week.

#### SOMERSET, Kathy Hopkins

Fields are wet. Some manure is being spread.

## WASHINGTON, Michael L. Look

Need sun desperately.

#### **MASSACHUSETTS**

#### BARNSTABLE, Russel Norton

Cool, cloudy conditions for much of the week, ending with some decent weather. Just over an inch of rain for the week. Apples have been in tight cluster for at least a week. First plantings of sweet corn are in. Some growers able to till pending soil moisture.

#### BERKSHIRE, Debra Senger

Farmers are now plowing, and spreading manure. Starting to plant corn in some areas in Berkshire County.

## FRANKLIN, Heather Baylis

Another week of below normal temps continues to increase the lag of current conditions compared to normal seasons. We received another inch of rain spread out through three days. Crop work includes planting sweet corn, potatoes, peas, beets, greens, onions and cabbage. Field prep continues and hopefully warmer temps in the coming week will accelerate progress.

#### HAMPDEN/HAMPSHIRE, Ted Smiarowski

Fields are very wet from all the heavy rains this week. Harvesting fiddleheads and many different types of greens under high tunnels. Planting beets, peas, radishes, greens, cabbage, sweetcorn and potatoes. Sweet corn under plastic is 5 inches tall.

#### NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH. Deb Cannon

Cranberry plants continue to advance towards bud break but have yet to reach that stage. Growers are scouting for winter moth larvae and dodder seedling emergence. Spring pre-emergence herbicide applications are near completion with the exception of dodder treatments.

#### **NEW HAMPSHIRE**

#### BELKNAP/STRAFFORD, Kelly McAdam

Some orchards in Belknap County are well into green stage, while others are still behind. We had small hail for a few minutes in Meredith on Saturday (Belknap County). Growers reporting that crops seeded two weeks ago are still not up yet (peas), but seed appears to be in the germination process.

## CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Reasonably dry for most of the week, but still cool. Fields have dried out enough so that field prep and some planting has begun, but still not in full swing. Grass in pastures and hayfields looking good.

### COOS, Steve Turaj

Another cool and wet week. Soils remain too wet for equipment although a few attempts to spread manure where possible. Meadows starting to green up. Tributaries running strong, ponding in many cornfields. Looks like corn will go in late this year.

#### GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

For the week ending May 3rd, we had a mixed bag of weather conditions. There were periods of sun and rain showers. Temperatures generally were in the 40 or higher. The frost in the ground is all but gone. Some north facing slopes and higher elevation fields still have a frost layer 18 inches or so below the surface. Farms along the Connecticut River are spreading manure and harrowing it in. Soils are still too cold to begin corn planting.

## HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Orchardists made sure bees were in apple orchards. Plums were starting to bloom. Apples and pears are at half inch green to tight cluster in the Hollis area. Orchardists are fertilizing orchards and are applying protective fungicide sprays on fruit trees and blueberries. Planting fruit trees, grapes, raspberries, blueberries and strawberries. Finishing up pruning blueberries and pruning peach trees. Field Crops: Farmers are fertilizing hay fields; spreading manure, plowing, disking and fertilizing corn fields to be planted Vegetables: Continue early season vegetables (peas, lettuce, greens, cole crops) planting, along with sweet corn and potatoes. transplanting zucchini and summer squash into row tunnels and floating row cover. Liming, fertilizing, plowing, disking, laying plastic and getting ready plant fields. Harvesting first asparagus, but it is slow growing.

## MERRIMACK, Dorothy Perkins

Hay and pasture are progressing well. Southern region of Merrimack County is almost ready to graze. Corn for silage is being planted.

#### ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Cloudy, wet and cold with more sun at the end of the week. Fruit growers are spraying protective fungicides as apple scab is of concern. Blueberries are also being sprayed. Field work delayed because of wet conditions and wet fields. Preparing some of the dry fields. Planting greens and tomatoes in high tunnels. Harvesting lettuce, spinach, rhubarb, cilantro, kale, arugula and Swiss chard.

#### SULLIVAN, Kelly Greenbacker

Periods of rain and wind, followed by periods of sun provided an interesting week of weather in Sullivan County. Field work has begun with manure spreading, fertilizing, and some farmers beginning to till fields. Scattered winter damage to alfalfa has been seen in southern, river bottom areas. Orchardists are noting some winter damage to peach buds as well, but unsure of extent. The damage is attributed to the extreme cold weather that affected Cheshire/Sullivan in March. Many maple producers are reporting 50-60% of normal production this year, while some areas in higher elevations have benefited from colder nights reported a normal crop.

#### NEWPORT, Heather Faubert

Fields are very wet. Hopefully we are entering a drying spell.

## NEWPORT, Paul E. Brule

Mothers Day is next weekend and if the weather holds this week into the 60's, apples are normally in full bloom by Mothers Day. Potatoes are going into the ground slowly. 25% have been planted so far and with a good week they should keep moving along. No silage corn has been planted yet. Sweet corn is planted under plastic, but only a little bit as it has been too cold and wet. As far as vegetables, only a little lettuce has been planted. Farmers are waiting for warmer ground.

#### **VERMONT**

#### ADDISON, Jeffrey Carter

Limited manure spreading on corn and hay fields. Light tillage only. Too wet for primary tillage. Pasture and hay greener by the day, not much growth yet.

#### CHITTENDEN, Terence Bradshaw

Apple scab continues to be the main concern for growers at this time of the season. Infection periods occurred last week through Monday, May 5. Another infection period is expected to run from Friday, May 9th through the weekend which will necessitate fungicide coverage. Trees are being planted in orchards now. Grapes are at bud swell, no bud break has been observed yet. Insect activity is quiet given the cool temperatures. Fertilizers may be applied to orchards any time now, and to grapes after bud break.

## FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

We are in a stall pattern for Franklin County with wet weather being the road block. Cool season grass continues to be the only progress species so far. Tree Buds are starting to look puffy, however, still not much green at this point. We will need a good launch soon to begin our growth season.

## ORLEANS, David Blodgett

Some field work has begun on the drier fields. Most farms with corn land are spreading manure now. A few grassland farms are spreading as well, but only on the drier fields. Some of the larger farms have begun disking their corn fields. I have also noticed some moldboard plowing. We have had a lot of rain over the weekend. The rivers are high but not at flood stage yet. Temperatures have remained cool delaying the grazing season.

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
