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Good week for field work: New England averaged 5 days suitable for fieldwork last week.

Warm temperatures and little rainfall improved pasture conditions across the region. 7% of pasture land was in poor condition while 37% was fair, 48% was good, and 8% was rated as excellent. Fruit crops were improving rapidly last week and may catch up to normal development with continued warm weather. Field crops were still lagging due to remaining soil moisture and surplus cool Corn planting continued to temperatures. progress at a snail's pace and was 15% behind the five-year average. In northern Maine, planting of potatoes and coarse grains just began last week.

CONNECTICUT

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinart

Spreading manure, planting corn on drier fields, spreading fertilizer. Way too much driving around as farmers try to work the dry fields and skip the wetter ones.

WINDHAM, Dawn S. Pindell

With wet conditions and cool soil temperatures, very little was planted. The northern part of the county is about a week later than usual. Peaches and pears just started flowering, apple blossoms not ready as usual for Mothers Day Weekend. Farms are progressing on spreading manure, harrowing, and some are starting no-till planting of corn. Mowing grass. Plant sales improving with sun and warmth; after cool weather and past rainy weekends.

MAINE

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Beautiful weather on Mother's Day, close to 80 degrees inland. Leaves appeared on some trees overnight it seems. It's a very busy time for farmers planting crops.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Lots of land prep for planting going on, tilling and manure spreading. The current warm temperatures should help heat up the soil a bit. The season start was late but is now catching up.

OXFORD. Marcia Hall

Androscoggin, Sagadahoc and Oxford county producers have been busy the past week getting field work done on high ground. The low ground is still too wet for equipment. Some grain corn has been planted. Some much needed sun and warm temperatures arrived last week which brought out the bugs! Fence repairs are underway in all three counties.

PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

The snow is gone, the fields are drying. Some tillage in the dry areas of the fields, some tractors stuck in the mud.

SOMERSET, Elaine S. Moceus

Field activities include spreading manure, plowing and some planting has begun. Many fields are still too wet in low areas. The area has had at least one frosty morning last week. Blueberries and strawberries have reportedly wintered well.

MASSACHUSETTS

BARNSTABLE, Russel Norton

The weather has been a little drier, just less than .2 inches of rain for the week. Growers are tilling and planting. Asparagus is being harvested.

BERKSHIRE, Debra Senger

Farmers are getting to the fields planting corn, beets, peas, radishes, greens, cabbage, and sweet corn.

HAMPDEN/HAMPSHIRE, Ted Smiarowski

Rainy and cold week delayed the planting of many crops. Harvesting fiddleheads and asparagus. Farm stands had an excellent day of sales on Mother's Day selling flowers. Dairy farmers spreading manure and preparing land for field corn.

NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH, Deb Cannon

Cranberry plants have reached bud break. Growers have begun active IPM scouting. Scouts report emerged dodder seedlings. Winter moth larvae are being found in sweeps on the bog.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

BELKNAP/STRAFFORD, Kelly McAdam

Some apple growers in Belknap County have poor fruit bud development. We anticipate a lighter crop this year for some.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Generally a bit warmer for most of the week, with warm temperatures and sun by the weekend. Grass in pastures and hayfields looking great, and farms starting to turn animals out to graze. The big push has begun for corn planting, especially on better-drained sites. Planting is also in full swing on vegetable operations for early crops. Farmers markets are offering a variety of high-tunnel crops and some greens. Tree fruit and berries are a little behind compared to the last couple years, but seem to be coming along well.

COOS, Steve Turaj

Warmer this week, grasslands starting to wake up. A few fields on lighter soils worked up for corn planting.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

For the week ending May 11th, weather conditions were mixed. Conditions remained a little cooler than normal. Soil temperatures have started to warm and field work is progressing in the Ct. River valley. Many upland hay fields are still too wet to spread manure on, however fields along the river bottom are dry enough to work. Manure spreading and harrowing is progressing nicely along the river. Trees started to break bud toward the end of the week. The grass has begun to grow and spring has finally arrived.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fruits: Plum trees were blooming. Apple and pear are at tight cluster in the Hollis area. Peach trees are in pink. Orchardists are fertilizing orchards and are applying protective fungicide sprays on fruit trees. Blueberries are at pink bud stage and mummy-bery spray is being applied. Planting fruit trees, grapes, raspberries, blueberries and strawberries. Finishing up pruning blueberries and pruning peach trees. Field Crops: Farmers are fertilizing hayfields; spreading manure, plowing, discing fertilizing, planting corn, and applying herbicides. Vegetables: Continuing vegetable planting, along with sweet corn and potatoes. Liming, fertilizing, plowing, discing and getting ready to plant fields. Harvesting asparagus and rhubarb.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

A drier week; sunnier and warmer on the weekend. Harvesting lettuce (romaine, curly green, butterhead, & red oak leaf), Kale (green & red), spinach, chives, cilantro, swiss chard, parsley (curly & flat), garlic scallions, radishes. Preparing vegetables fields: plowing. Discing, liming and fertilizing. Planting small fruits and fruit trees. Deer are feeding on and destroying strawberry fields. Spraying protective fungicides in orchards and blueberry fields. Pastures look good. Preparing field corn and fertilizing hay fields. Some farmers markets are open for the season.

NEWPORT, Paul E. Brule

Well, all the early apples are in full bloom this weekend for Mother's Day. Late apples are still in the pink stage not full bloom. Potatoes are going into the ground, and better than 50% have been planted already. More sweet corn went into the ground with the nice weather this past week. The only vegetables I know of that are being planted are lettuce and peas. This coming week looks like all rain after today. We had a great Friday, Saturday and Sunday. High 70's all of those days. The heat is bringing the pastures right along and looking good.

VERMONT

ADDISON, Jeffrey Carter

Spreading fertilizer on hay fields. Plants starting active growth. Spreading manure on corn fields, primary and secondary tillage for incorporation on lighter soils. Started planting corn at the end of the week on lighter soils. Clay soils too wet to work. Rye cover crops elongating at 6 to 10 in. ht. Pasture in good condition, just starting to graze early sites.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Things are moving in Franklin County. Much manure spreading and tillage, grass is growing great, trees and fruit buds are swelling like crazy. Very little corn seed in the ground with soils still on the wet side. Average temperatures are on the rise; however, soils have some catching up to do for good germination. Grasses are doing a flip flop with better growth in the high country verses the low lands. Might be related to a very cold and frozen Lake Champlain this winter.
