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<u>Poor week for field work:</u> The six state region had an average of only 1.5 days suitable for field work last week.

Snow accumulation remains on the ground in much of northern New England and in higher elevations. Average temperatures were in the 30s in northern New England and low 40s in southern New England. Maple production is off to a later than normal start due to the low temperatures. Field access was limited by excessive moisture, but farmers have been preparing to begin spreading manure in some areas. Fruit growers have been checking plants and trees for winter damage.

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## **REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County**

#### CONNECTICUT

#### LITCHFIELD. Richard Meinart

Getting planters ready seems to be the primary focus. Some manure being spread if the fields are dry. A lot of farms are waiting for the ground to thaw and the snow to finish melting.

#### MAINE

## AROOSTOOK, Larry James

Very little to report as we are still under several feet of snow. Trees are being tapped. We are still waiting for the first good sap day. A few people have started planting in their high tunnels.

## CUMBERLAND/ YORK, Sandy Truslow

A cold March froze maple sap production for most of the month. During the first week in April, the sap was running well. Not much outside work being done right now, there is still snow on the ground in some areas. Greenhouses have had to spend a lot of money to keep the heat on in March. Threat of flooding on Tuesday.

## FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Snow is piled high and deep. This could be a very late spring. Maple sap is just starting to run. Some north facing slopes have not run at all. The only things growing fast are frost heaves and pot holes! There is still over 30 inches of ice in many lakes and ponds.

## HANCOCK/PENOBSCOT/WASHINGTON, Valerie Porter

Most fields are still snow covered with some open areas. Excessive moisture on most fields due to heavy rains Monday, Tuesday and Saturday. Blueberries fields have open areas but at this time, it is still too early to tell how the plants wintered. Longer days and sun being high is helping with the snow melt and higher fields may be cleared within a week or two. Farmers are performing maintenance checks on equipment and getting ready to start working as soon as possible.

## PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

We still have 2 to 3 feet of snow on the fields.

## SOMERSET, Elaine S. Moceus

Heavy rainfall with above freezing temperatures is expected during the week which may cause melting of existing snow pack - 1' to 2' in some areas - resulting in flooding.

#### MASSACHUSETTS

#### BARNSTABLE, Russel Norton

Current conditions are seasonal after a colder than normal winter with abundant moisture since January. Fruit growers are pruning and applying dormant insecticides and fungicides. Fruit buds are still dormant. Monitoring for winter moth hatch. Greens from high tunnels are being harvested.

#### BERKSHIRE, Debra Senger

Because of heavy rains and snow the fields are too wet to get onto

#### FRANKLIN, Heather Baylis

Soil is still too frozen to report on moisture especially in the Hilltowns where some fields still have residual snow cover. Maple producers on vacuum systems saw a drastic improvement with last week's warming temperatures and had really good sap runs. It will be a poor season for those with gravity fed systems.

#### NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH. Deb Cannon

Cranberry plants remain winter dormant. Growers are installing sprinkler heads in preparation for spring frost later this month when the plants break dormancy. Other activities include drainage ditch cleaning and preparation for pre-emergence herbicide applications.

#### **NEW HAMPSHIRE**

#### GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

Up to a foot of snow still on the ground.

#### HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Snow and ice still covering many field edges. Getting equipment ready for the spring rush. Field Crops: Hauling and stock-piling manure to corn fields. Vegetables: Starting transplants in greenhouses. Transplanting tomatoes into first high tunnels. Fruits: Pruning blueberry bushes and raspberry patches. Orchardists are pruning apples, chopping brush in orchard or push pruning out of the orchards. Seeing deer damage in many orchards.

## SULLIVAN, Kelly Greenbacker

Some long awaited warm weather is finally here. Maple Syrup producers have been hard at work with good weather for sap flow this past week. With a late start to the season due to unseasonably cold temperatures in March, many are concerned it will be a short season this year. A few producers have reported that they are currently at about 50% compared to last year's production. Snow coverage still remains in northern areas.

## RHODE ISLAND

#### NEWPORT, Paul E. Brule

This past weekend the flower stands opened up. All they have to sell is pansies. It is still way too cold to do much of anything. In the last week or two a lot of fertilizer has been delivered to the farms. It's great to be back, but there is not much to say right now! It's been a real cold winter.

## **VERMONT**

CALEDONIA, Daniel Hudson Still a lot of snow in most fields.

## FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

We still have a lot of snow and plenty of moisture. Questionable on manure applications! Sugar makers happy for the moment.

Some signs of spring, but still lots of snow around.

There is still a lot of snow on the fields here but it is starting to melt. The winter manure spreading ban was lifted on April 1, but the snow is still too deep to spread.

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
