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<u>Very poor week for field work:</u> New England averaged 0.5 days suitable for field work last week.

Temperatures in New England have been colder than normal, and snow and ice were still covering the ground in most locations. Average weekly temperatures in the region ranged from ten degrees below normal to four degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.02 to 0.89 inches in the region. Maple syrup season was off to a later than normal start this year due to the colder weather and snowpack accumulation from this winter. The melting of snow and freezing and thawing of fields has delayed most field work in the region, except for some frost seeding. In New Hampshire, some spring greens were coming out of high tunnels and being seeded. Orchardists and other fruit growers were behind in pruning due to the weather. Farmers were focused on repairing equipment, performing maintenance on buildings and roofs covered with snow, and purchasing supplies for the upcoming growing season.

CONNECTICUT

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

The only field work happening on most farms is sugaring. Sap is being boiled. Everyone else is still waiting for the snow to disappear.

MAINE

AROOSTOOK, Larry James

Still several inches of snow on the ground at this point. The temperature this morning was -10° F, a new record.

PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

Ten degrees this morning with snow still on the ground. Maple sap is still flowing.

WASHINGTON, Michael Look

The fields are just now beginning to peek out of the snow. It will be at least 3 weeks before anything can be done in the fields, except for frost seed.

MASSACHUSETTS

BARNSTABLE, Russell Norton

Snow is still receding. Average temperature was 41° F, with a high of 54° F and a low of 24° F; 0.25 inches of rain.

BERKSHIRE, Debra Senger

Fields are still covered in snow; hoping for warm weather in the next couple of weeks.

FRANKLIN, James Newland

It has been a late start to spring so far in 2015, with colder weather holding on throughout Franklin County. Maple sugar producers have seen a late start to their season that has set back expected yields by as much as 50%, but the warmer days and cold nights this week have made for ideal harvest conditions that will hopefully give the low yields a boost. Elsewhere, vegetable producers are busy inside greenhouses with their pre-season starts. Outside, the snow continues its retreat in most places.

HAMPSHIRE/HAMPDEN, Heather Baylis

March ended with temperatures on average ten degrees lower than normal and almost seven and a half inches of snow. Fields in the valley have lost their snow and are very wet, but fields in the hills are still snow-covered in places. Until fields firm up, not much field work will be accomplished.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

BELKNAP/MERRIMACK/HILLSBOROUGH, Donna Juneau

Winter is still hanging on. Temperatures have generally been below average and the snowpack is melting slowly. There is still a way to go before fields are ready for planting this year.

CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

Still lots of snow on the ground; some patches starting to clear, but it will be a while until we can get out on the fields. Spring greens coming out of high tunnels and being seeded now. Sugaring season is well underway; some think it will be a low-yielding year. New applications for farmers' markets are all in, with decisions on who will be at the summer markets being made within the month.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Melting and thawing continues, with a couple days in the 50s, but still plenty of snow and ice around. Too wet to do much of anything in the field.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

We had both rain and snow this past week, with temperatures about 60° F on Friday and then snow on Saturday. The ground is still mostly frozen and by the end of the week approximately 40-50% of the ground was still snow-covered, with significant depth still in the forests.

GRAFTON. Steven Schmidt

Temperatures remained cooler than normal. Many north and east facing slopes still have a substantial blanket of snow. Many fields are still frozen, with a substantial frost depth. South and west facing fields have bare spots, but nights in the single digits and teens have slowed the snow melt and runoff. Maple producers are still waiting for the sap to run. A number of them have expressed the concern that the season could be a short one.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Still snow cover and frost in the ground. Orchardists are behind in pruning, along with blueberry growers. Some failures in heating greenhouse structures resulted in loss of plants. Growers were getting equipment repaired and purchasing supplies for spring work and the new growing season.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Fields are either too wet or still covered with snow. In the last two days it has been very windy. Fruit and small fruit pruning schedule is running late by about three weeks to a month. Some growers have re-scheduled and delayed the delivery dates of young strawberry plants and other small fruits while waiting for fields to dry. Growers were repairing fences that were covered with snow and other buildings and roofs. It has been a very cold and long winter/spring.

SULLIVAN, Kelly Webb

Maple season was off to a slow start due to the snowpack and cold weather. Warmer temperatures Thursday into the weekend helped the sap run. Many are reporting that they are at half crop or just beyond. The snow continues to melt, with some ponding in fields.

RHODE ISLAND

NEWPORT, Heather Faubert

Fruit growers are getting trees and bushes pruned now that snow is mostly gone and plants are still dormant.

VERMONT

ADDISON, Jeffrey Carter

Snow mostly gone. Ground is frozen. Frost seeding clover in pasture and hay fields. Sugaring on about half the crop is done.

CALEDONIA, Daniel Hudson

Given the amount of snow left and the forecast, I am expecting that field activities will be delayed this year.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

The focus at this time is on maple, which is anybody's guess at this point. Weather is ideal, however, the small windows for good runs of sap are making the sugar-makers very impatient. With much snow and frozen ground, very little manure is being spread, which is a good thing due to the huge focus on water quality.

ORLEANS, David Blodgett

Most of the fields in Orleans County are still snow-covered. It actually snowed off and on through the past weekend. The Vermont winter manure spreading ban was lifted on April 1st, but due to the snowpack, producers in this area were not able to do so. Snowfall and rain have been a little less than normal but once the snow melts and the ground thaws, moisture levels should be adequate. Maple syrup production is in full swing but so far the yields are very low. The sap runs that producers got last week seem to have a high sugar concentration so the gallons of sap needed for each gallon of syrup is lower. However, reports are that the syrup is a bit darker than usual. The season started very late with most producers just starting to boil last week. I am hearing reports that feed is short for some livestock producers, especially organic feed. Those producers are hoping for an early spring so they can begin grazing. It has been a long and cold winter.
