Excellent week for field work: New England averaged 7.0 days suitable for field work last week.

Dry, warm conditions were predominant last week throughout the New England region although some seasonable, mildly cooler temperatures began to roll in along with some sporadic frosts in areas. Average weekly temperatures in the region ranged from six degrees below normal to five degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.00 to 0.12 inches. More third and fourth cuttings of hay and haylage took place with the dry weather last week. Field corn for silage harvesting continued to progress. Late sweet corn was still being harvested although it should wrap up soon. The potato crop was reported as looking good and well underway. Apples were late to color; however, they are doing well and plentiful. In Massachusetts, cranberries received the cooler conditions they had been waiting for with good coloration setting in. Irrigating continued along with the harvest of cabbage, tomatoes, acorn squash, kale, Brussel Sprouts, winter squash and pumpkins among other vegetable crops. As such, farmers' markets remained busy.

CONNECTICUT

WINDHAM, Dawn S. Pindell

Sunny, warm weather for haying, chopping corn, and farm activities. Still very dry. Some hay producers were not able to get a third cutting. Well attended "Celebrating Agriculture" event on Saturday, September 26th, with people coming to have fun while learning about dairying, forestry, livestock husbandry, and supporting local farms while eating local foods and seeing new and old farm equipment. Many volunteers made the day possible.

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Corn silage harvest is progressing rapidly - almost 2 weeks early at this point according to farmer estimates. Quality is off, due to blight and dry conditions, but tonnage is reported to be normal to "a little above" normal.

MAINE

AROOSTOOK (Northern), Donald M. Audibert

Most farmers are done harvesting their grain. Potato harvest is approximately half done. Doing fall tillage where grain was harvested. Had some light frost a couple of mornings. Very dry and expecting some much needed rain this Tuesday. Potato crop yield and quality looks good. Some producers stopped harvesting for a couple of days due to skinning.

AROOSTOOK (Southern), Doreen Conlogue

Potato harvest is in full swing, crop looks good. This week's forecast is calling for some rain Tuesday into Wednesday but the rest of the week looks perfect for digging potatoes!

AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Dry weather has everyone on the ground. Potato harvest is in full swing. Above average yields and quality so far. Broccoli harvest will continue for a couple more weeks. Grain harvest is almost complete. Most operations reporting record yields.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Beautiful but dry weather continues. The warmth earlier in the month kept apples from coloring up even though they were ripe. Late sweet corn was pushed ahead of schedule so local, sweet corn will be done soon. Hay is being cut just for silage at this point. Corn silage yields look good. We need rain.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

A killing frost has hit. Corn silage harvest is now moving fast. There appears to be some big rain events on the horizon.

PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

Widespread hard frosts have ended the growing season for vegetable crops. Potato and corn silage harvest in full swing.

PISCATAQUIS/SOMERSET, Elaine S. Moceus

Some corn growers are reporting average to above average silage production. Several have noticed more weeds than usual, possibly attributed to the higher temps in August. Producers are reporting dry, warm weather. September provided the perfect growing conditions for corn.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Thomas Smiarowski Another great week for harvesting activities.

PLYMOUTH, Carolyn DeMoranville

This was a week of seasonable temperatures, but again, no rain. Cranberry color is progressing well with the cooler nights and early varieties are being harvested.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

BELKNAP/HILLSBOROUGH/MERRIMACK, Donna Juneau A dry week with temperatures finally turning seasonal. Producers have been in the fields chopping corn. Corn yields reportedly vary from fair to good.

CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

No hard frosts yet, but getting very close. Difficult getting fall cover crops established due to lack of rain.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Dry, sunny conditions all week, with the first frost on Sunday morning. Corn chopping well under way. Third cutting haylage and bales are pretty much done with a little bit of the fourth cutting being taken here and there. Veggies still doing well, with mostly fall crops showing up in stands, etc. PYO apples are doing great.

COOS, Steve Turaj

Silage corn harvest begins as weather continues fair and dry, very good haying conditions this week. Farms are saying it would have been nice to see this past September weather in July. Soybeans are now dropping leaves as pods are filling out. Scattered frosts towards the end of week were reported. Splashes of color in higher elevations and further north. Swamp maples are turning red there are lots of wild apples.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

Temperatures dropped to the low 40's most nights this week, but no reports of frost so far.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

Morning showers on the 20th delivered about 1/4 inch of rain. Field conditions for the week remained good for haying, and chopping corn. Shorter days, cool morning temperatures, and heavy morning fog has slowed the drying of hay, but farmers have been taking advantage of the good weather conditions. Corn harvest is ramping up. Corn producers are skipping some fields, giving them a few more days to mature before harvesting. Vegetable operations are still offering sweet corn, along with an assortment of locally grown, high quality fresh produce.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fruit: Another fantastic weekend for farm stands and apple Pick-Your-Own (PYO) operations. Apple harvest is in full swing with most growers picking McIntosh and Gala and starting on Cortland. Peach harvest is completed and fall raspberries harvest continues. Vegetables: Great weather and good demand for all vegetable continues. Irrigating crops that have not been harvested. Farmers are harvesting a wide array of vegetables including: cabbage, kale, Brussel Sprouts, winter squash and pumpkins along with the tail end of warm season crops. The warm-season crops harvest including tomatoes, peppers, sweet corn and beans is almost completed. Farmers kept busy disking, cleaning up and planting cover crops on harvested fields. Field Crops: Silage corn harvest in full swing. The second and third cuttings of hay and haylage continues.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Harvesting fall raspberries, many apple varieties, pears, blackberries, and an array of vegetables (warm and cool season crops) including winter squashes, potatoes and root crops, sweet corn, greens, tomatoes. Cleaning vegetables fields, planting cover crops. Chopping corn and haying. It has been quite dry with no rain for several weeks. Nights are much colder.

SULLIVAN, Jennifer Gehly

Last week was unseasonably warm with high temperatures in the mid-60s to mid-70s with overnight lows in the 40s. Farmers kept busy harvesting corn for silage. The dry field conditions made for easy harvesting. Producers are reporting good yields. The dry hay harvest is winding down. Producers reported low yields during first cut; however, good growing conditions during the summer resulted in an overall average crop. Fall vegetables are available at farm stands and farmers markets along with many summer vegetables including zucchini, tomatoes, kale, sweet corn, and eggplant. Vegetable farmers were also busy preparing harvested fields for winter. Apples are plentiful with many orchards keeping busy with PYO operations. Available varieties include Honey Crisp, Cortland, and Macoun.

RHODE ISLAND

ALL RI COUNTIES, Paul E. Brule

It's been very dry throughout most of the State. Hope to get some rain this week. It's supposed to be a rainy week, but haven't seen anything yet. Potatoes are being harvested and should start storing winter potatoes within the next week or so. Apple picking is going great. There are still plenty of vegetables around. Sweet corn is still plentiful; it was planted late in the spring and is of good quality. Cover crop is being put in for the winter. It's not germinating because we need rain. Pastures are pretty well gone because of the lack of rain in the past few weeks.

VERMONT

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Another dry week in Franklin County has allowed for continued hay harvest and corn harvest well underway. Corn is still hesitant to mature to milkline stage for ideal quality conditions. Ears have developed very well and ear to stalk ratios are great. There is not a lot of tonnage; however, there is good quality where corn has matured. Much hay is still going in and if weather participates, should be able to get some harvest after corn. This is a situation for optimum soil nutrients to hold the grass and legumes through the winter. Vine crops are still coming in from the gardens with potatoes and onions drying in the garages.

ORLEANS, David Blodgett

For the first time this season, the area had a full week without rain and autumn is definitely in the air. The temperatures were much cooler and Friday night brought the first widespread frost. Activity this week included third and fourth cut hay harvest and the beginnings of the corn harvest. Most corn has matured and the moisture content is dropping. This should bring the corn harvest into full swing this coming week.
