Fair week for field work: New England averaged 1.5 days suitable for field work last week.

The past week in New England started out with warmer temperatures, transitioning to colder temperatures at the end of the week, with snow, sleet, freezing rain, and high winds reported in some locations. Average weekly temperatures ranged from three to twelve degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.58 to 3.68 inches. Maple sap was still flowing in some states last week. In Connecticut, cover crops were reported to be in great condition and growing vigorously. In Massachusetts, cranberry farmers were performing maintenance to irrigation systems to prepare for frost protection and maintenance of drainage ditches. The recent cooler temperatures have helped to hold the cranberry buds in dormancy. In New Hampshire, some apples were at silver bud stage and a few were showing green. Peaches were beginning to swell, but it was reported that not many flower buds survived the winter. Throughout the region, orchardists were busy pruning and chopping brush in orchards. Some growers were seeding vegetables and flowers in greenhouses and preparing vegetable fields. Farmers were busy repairing fences, cleaning up farm stands, and spreading manure on fields.

CONNECTICUT

ALL CT COUNTIES, Jude Boucher

Down to 17 degrees Fahrenheit midweek, maybe lower tonight. Four inches of snow with high winds yesterday, even more today. Apples that pushed with warm weather earlier may be in trouble. Vegetable growers are holding off planting until after this cold spell.

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Spreading manure and getting equipment ready for the planting season were the primary concerns on farms this week. Unseasonably warm weather had manure trucks rolling early. Last year's late fall and mild winter has cover crops in the best condition in years.

WINDHAM, Dawn S. Pindell

Changing weather conditions from warm with heavy rain, to temperatures 10 degrees below normal with snow, sleet, freezing rain and high winds. Dairy farms spreading manure on fields. Cover crop green and growing vigorously. Concern over freezing condition effect on fruit tree buds.

MAINE

AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Fields are basically snow-free. Depending on the weather, we could have an early start.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow Above average rainfall, with high winds this week. Below normal cold weather expected this week. Lows in the teens.

SOMERSET, Kathy Hopkins After some nice winter, winter cold is returning.

WASHINGTON, Audre Hayward

Windy weather. The weather was in the 50s, then back to below freezing for a couple days.

MASSACHUSETTS

HAMPSHIRE/HAMPDEN, Heather Baylis

There were a couple of really nice days last week with about an inch of rain. Greenhouses are starting plants and farmers are getting itchy to get out into fields.

PLYMOUTH, Carolyn DeMoranville

The end of the week saw very high winds and warm temperatures on Thursday and Friday and below freezing with more high wind and snow on Sunday. Cranberry farmers are completing spring tasks including irrigation system maintenance (to prepare for frost protection) and maintenance of drainage ditches. Overall, cool temperatures are helping to hold the cranberry buds in dormancy, a welcome outcome since very cold temperatures will start this next week.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

BELKNAP/HILLSBOROUGH/MERRIMACK, Donna Juneau We experienced a week of fluctuating temperatures, with temperatures on Thursday and Friday well above average (by 20 plus degrees) and then plummeting temperatures on Sunday night to well below freezing and about 10 degrees below average. We experienced light rainfall on Monday and again towards the end of the week; and awoke to snow on Sunday morning. Reports were that maple sap was still flowing last week. Producers indicated that it was dark but still sweet.

CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

Rain on and off as well as low temperatures (15-30 degrees) have returned. Snow is all gone, except for higher elevations. Seed starting houses are starting to fill up; not much happening out in the field yet, aside from pruning trees.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Several unseasonably warm days last week. Turning much colder over the weekend, currently snowing.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

The unseasonably warm conditions of a few days ago have returned to cold! Some tree species did flower last week. We may see freeze damage on those trees. Maple producers who did not pull their taps will likely get another run or two. Top soils remain frozen, but the frost is not down too deep. Some farms were field stacking manure and even spreading manure on a few fields.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Apples are at silver bud stage and few showing green. Peaches are beginning to swell; however, not many flower buds survived the winter (Feb 14 and 15 temperatures were at minus 15 degrees F). Pruning blueberry bushes, grape vines and raspberry patches. Orchardists are pruning, chopping brush in orchard or push pruning out of the orchards. Greenhouses are started where grower are plant plugs and liners along while seeding vegetables and flowers. Hauling manure to fields. Getting equipment repair and purchasing supplies for spring work and the growing season. Some farmers started fixing pasture fences.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Growers transitioning from winter to spring growing, but still picking a lot of winter greens including overwintered spinach. Preparing vegetable fields. Pruning apples, some other tree fruit types and blueberries. Fixing fences and cleaning up farm stands. From warm weather to very cold temperatures in the last 24 hours. On the weekend, some localized gusty winds potentially up to 40 mph. The week saw rain and some warmers days.

RHODE ISLAND

ALL RI COUNTIES, George Goulart

Because of early in the season and the cold weather extending into April, there has been minimal field work. It is snowing today, with up to 6 inches expected in the northern part of the State. Temperatures are expected to be in the teens for the next couple of nights. Greenhouse plantings have begun, including basil, tomatoes and peppers. Weather permitting, potato growers are hoping to start planting in the fields next week.

VERMONT

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Manure Ban is now lifted in Franklin County, Vermont; however, caution needs to be used for any must-manure applications. Fields are still frozen and wet. The bumper crop for sugar makers has come to be and barrels for bulk syrup sales are few and far between. Grasses are beginning to show some life and the adequate moisture and some warm weather will bring on a welcome site of green grass.
