<u>Good week for field work:</u> New England averaged 5.0 days suitable for field work last week.

Although cool weather was reported in some areas with some frost still on the ground, temperatures began to warm up throughout New England. Average weekly temperatures ranged from one to twelve degrees above normal in the region. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.00 to 1.04 inches. The warmer weather allowed for more field work to occur. The maple syrup season had come to an end throughout the region as maple trees were beginning to bud. Some fruit growers were evaluating the extent of damage to apples, peaches, and blueberries from a recent cold snap. Additionally, fruit trees were being sprayed with oil and fungicides where needed. Orchardists were busy pruning, chopping brush, and fertilizing orchards. In Massachusetts, cranberry growers were monitoring their bogs for winter moth caterpillars. Early season vegetable crops like peas, lettuce, and other greens were being planted. Farmers continued to bring out spring equipment, spread manure, disk, fix fencing, and harrow fields as well. Greenhouses remained busy with a variety of plants for sale.

CONNECTICUT

ALL CT COUNTIES, Jude Boucher

Soil in most of the state is getting dry. Looking forward to rain later today and tomorrow.

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Spreading manure and getting planting and other field equipment ready.

NEW LONDON, Sarah Woodward

Warm and sunny weather all week. Some producers began planting corn this week. Vegetable growers steadily working at getting early crops planted out in the fields.

WINDHAM, Dawn S. Pindell

Pruning blueberries, checking grapes for bud damage, finishing pruning apples. Spraying apples with oil and fungicide where needed. Planting apple and peach trees. Apple crop appears to be light due to freeze. Dairy farmers are spreading manure, spraying cover crop, getting fields ready to plant corn. Prepping for planting early vegetables. Greenhouses have a variety of annual plants ready for sale. Warm week with 70 degrees and sunshine. Rain later in the week.

MAINE

AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Many fields are dry enough to work, but we still have frost in the ground. Spring equipment is being brought out and seed is being cut. We really need a day of rain to pull the remaining frost.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Conditions are very dry. Little rain fell last week. Early crops have been planted. Row covers are up on many fields. Good week for outside tillage.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Great conditions for field work. All soils except poorly drained can easily be traveled on. Lots of manure being spread. Lots of fences being repaired and installed.

PENOBSCOT/PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

Manure spreading. Greenhouses getting filled with seedlings. Maple trees starting to bud.

SOMERSET, Kathy Hopkins

A little of everything last week: sun, rain, hail, warm and cold.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Two meetings for tree fruit growers were held this past week and consensus was that the peach crop will be non-existent this year. Apples were damaged due to early April cold spell, but still too early to determine extent of damage. Similar sentiments expressed about blueberries. Conditions for other field crops, notably potatoes and sweet corn, ideal for planting. Needed rain came on Friday; although rainfall was intense, it was for a relatively short period and much simply ran off the fields.

HAMPSHIRE/HAMPDEN, Heather Baylis

Field activities have increased; planting of early crops is ramping up. Apple and peach trees have the first leaves out. A good soaking rain is needed soon.

PLYMOUTH, Carolyn DeMoranville

A dry week, but continued cool for the most part with several nights of frost conditions on the cranberry bogs. Many growers are finding winter moth caterpillars on their bogs.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

BELKNAP, Kelly McAdam

Warm temperatures for two days this week caused fruit trees to begin green tip. Very little rain.

CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

Unusually dry spring has allowed growers to cultivate and lay plastic mulch early this year. Cold nights persist causing concern to developing fruit blossoms.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Dry and sunny most of the week. Some sites are a little dry - a bit of rain wouldn't hurt. Pastures and hayfields are greening up nicely. Some manure spreading and tillage beginning.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

A warm week gave farms an opportunity to continue with manure spreading and some tillage in early fields. Apples and blueberries are breaking dormancy.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

Conditions remained fairly dry. Light showers Monday night into Tuesday delivered less than a quarter inch of rain. Soils are still cool, but dry enough to be worked with farm equipment. Farms are spreading manure and harrowing their fields. Trees are breaking bud, and maple sugar operations have shut down for the season.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Very dry conditions. Field Crops: Liming and fertilizing hay fields and pastures. Spreading manure, plowing, disking, fertilizing and getting ready to plant corn. Fixing pasture fences. Also, getting ready to make new pasture and hay field seedings. Vegetables: Early season vegetables (peas, lettuce, greens) are being planted. Liming, fertilizing, plowing, disking and getting ready to plant fields. Fruits: Apples and pears are at half-inch green stage to tight cluster. Most peaches are calyx red stage to first bloom. Protective fungicide sprays applied on fruit trees. Removing straw from strawberries. Pruning raspberry and blueberry plants. Orchardists are chopping brush in orchard or push pruning out of the orchards. Fertilizing orchards. Protective fungicide sprays applied on fruit trees over weekend of April 23-24.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Some rain overnight Monday. Some sun during the day and saw some nights close to freezing. But it's still dry. Preparing vegetable fields. Spreading lime and fertilizer. Irrigating some pea fields and early Cole crops in the fields. Fertilizing blueberries, raspberries, strawberries and grapes. Monitoring for pests. Harvesting greens including spinach, arugula and others green types. Garden Centers very busy this week and many held Earth Day events. Bedding plant sales and greenhouses were busy.

RHODE ISLAND

ALL RI COUNTIES, George Goulart

Weather is beginning to warm up. Temperatures have reached into the 60s and 70s this week. Farmers are plowing their fields this week. Corn, beans, peas and potatoes are starting to be planted. Producers are reporting problems with apples and peach trees due to a cold snap that occurred in mid-February. Low yields are expected.

VERMONT

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Cool weather persists in Franklin County this week. Very little budding or garden work going on. Field work continues with some manure applications and tillage on corn ground. Maple Sap flow seems to be slowed down being an indicator that we may see some progress in tree budding. Morning frosts are very persistent and hopefully will subside when the buds do get going.
