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<u>Good week for field work:</u> New England averaged 5.0 days suitable for field work last week.

This past week's U.S. Drought Monitor reflected drought conditions slightly receding although the coastal areas in Massachusetts and New Hampshire still remained under D3 Extreme Drought classification and many other areas in New England still had a D2 Severe Drought. The average weekly temperatures ranged from seven degrees below normal to two degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.24 to 2.84 inches throughout the region. Swiss chard, kale, potatoes, lettuce, arugula, spinach were harvested while farmers also spent time spreading manure and lime, repairing equipment, cleaning fields, and wrapping up corn harvest and hay cuttings. Apple and pear harvest was complete for the most part. Orchardists were busy marketing their crops and spreading vole bait. Cranberry harvest continued; however, growers were concerned harvest would not be completed until much later in November under the conditions they have suffered. Alongside cranberries, vineyards were also well into harvesting grapes. Consumers enjoyed getting pumpkins for weekend festivities at farm stands and visiting corn mazes.

AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Most all the fall work is done. There are a few soybeans left to harvest. No hard freeze yet. Good crops and a strong market so far. Broccoli harvest has wrapped up with good crops. Broccoli markets were weak most of the season.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

The area received 2-3+ inches of rain over the weekend. Harvesting is just about complete.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

With good soaking rains at the end of the week, the recharge of ground water continues. Grain Corn and soybeans are still drying in the field. Manure structures are being emptied to make them available for winter storage.

PENOBSCOT/PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

First snow of the season. Finishing manure spreading on the fields.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

First accumulating snowfall of the year fell over portions of Western Massachusetts.

HAMPSHIRE/HAMPDEN, Heather Baylis

Growers focused on finishing silage corn chopping, seeding cover This week showed below average temperatures and about 1.25 inches of rain. A help but still not enough. Orchard crops are finishing up. Farmers are cleaning farm equipment, doing repairs, and spreading manure. Fall crops of pumpkins, squash and Brussel sprouts can be found at farm stands. The County office is busy with producers NAP insurance claims and processing LFP applications for producer's who have grazing animals.

PLYMOUTH, Carolyn DeMoranville

Cranberry harvest is moving forward rapidly but many growers predict that they will not complete harvest until well into November.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

More rain occurred over weekend to resupply wells and water supplies going into winter. Snow dotted the higher elevations while growers pulled in their last of the storage crops. Garlic mostly all planted, and bulbs also going in.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Back to cool temperatures, with even a little bit of snow showing up Thursday night. Not much going on - most fields were put to bed for the year, sporadic attempts at taking a late cutting for haylage as weather conditions allow.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

The northern part of the county saw a dusting of snow, the rest got a good soaking rain. Temperatures got down in to the low 20's one morning frosting tunnel crops.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

For the week of October 23rd, significant rainfall was received. Rainfall totaled close to 1.75 inches. Top soil moisture conditions are significantly improved. Subsoil conditions however remain dry. With cool weather now upon us, there should be minimal evaporation of the rain that we do get, before the ground freezes for the winter. The 2016 cropping season is just about over. Grass is still growing, and a few farms prepared to chop the last cut of haylage in the near future. Those farms that make dry hay are done for the season. Pumpkin harvest is just about over. Vegetable growers with high tunnels are stretching the harvest a few weeks later into the fall. Thus far, we have not had conditions cold enough to kill off fall crops.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Vegetables: Growers are harvesting a wide array of vegetables, including cabbage, kale, Brussel sprouts, winter squash and pumpkins. Farmers are cleaning up fields, picking up plastic mulch, drip tape, trellis stakes and irrigation equipment and soil testing fields for next season. Farmers are soil testing fields for next season, spreading lime on fields, and cleaning and putting away farm equipment. Fruit: Apple harvest is completed. Orchardists busy marketing crop. Orchardists are spreading bait to control voles. Also, picking up unused bins in orchard, repairing broken bins, and general cleaning and putting away farm equipment. Field Crops: Farmers are spreading manure and lime on fields, soil testing fields for next season, and cleaning and putting away farm equipment.
