Fair week for field work: New England averaged 4 days suitable for field work last week.

New England experienced multiple days of rainfall last week with warm and sunny conditions on Sunday. Average weekly temperatures ranged from five degrees below normal to four degrees above normal in the region. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.61 to 3.02 inches. The heavy rain mid-week melted snow rapidly, farmers expect most of the snow to be gone by the end of the week. Fields have started to thaw in many areas and field work is anticipated to begin soon. The rain and the snow melt has also restocked reservoirs and is recharging much needed ground water. It was also a good week for maple sugar operations given the cold night and moderate daytime temperatures. Calving and lambing season is underway. Farmers continued pruning fruit trees and grape vines last week and Orchardists are getting ready to apply oil and protective spays. Field activities for the week consisted of preparing fields, equipment repair and maintenance.

CONNECTICUT

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Mud season is slowing field work on most operations. Multiple days of much needed rain have restocked reservoirs and is recharging much needed ground water, so farmers are not begrudging the lost field time yet.

MAINE

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Spring has finally arrived! There is a deep snowpack in some areas. Greenhouses are becoming full of plants. High tunnels are producing greens. Too early for field work except for pruning.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Subsoiling, plowing, and tillage activities occurred. Sweet corn was planted under plastic in an isolated case.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

BELKNAP/STRAFFORD, Kelly McAdam Heavy rains and lots of snow melt this week.

CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

Fresh snow and a thawed ground is great for groundwater recharge. Farmers hopeful about the year ahead. It will be a late spring here as most all our fields are still covered in at least a foot of snow. Tree buds swelling but nothing in bloom yet. Microgreens and the last of storage crops available. Calving and lambing season underway. Seeding houses getting full with summer crops.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

A couple days with heavy rain mid-week, with warm and sunny conditions on Sunday. Streams seem to be pretty full, with some minor flooding in a few fields. Still some patches of snow in sheltered spots. No real field work going on.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

The snow we had on the ground at the beginning of the week has begun rapidly melting, and the ground is starting to thaw.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

Last week was a good one for maple sugar operations. Cold nights and moderate daytime temperatures made the sap run. The snow is melting rapidly. I would expect most of the snow to be gone by the end of the week. The frost is slowly coming out of the ground. Soils in the valley are thawing faster than the upper elevations. In many cases it is better to be patient and stay out of the mud. Field work will begin soon enough.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Beginning of week April 2^{nd} still had snow cover fields and frost in ground; by end week most of snow gone due to rains occurring mid-week. Getting equipment repaired and purchasing supplies for spring work and the new growing season. Pruning apple trees, peach trees, grape vines, blueberry bushes and raspberry patches. Orchardists are getting ready to apply oil and/or protective sprays.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Fields are wet from the beginning of the week with heavy rain and showers for most of the day on Wednesday April 6, 2017 (1-2 inches of rain). Some annuals are growing tall and leggy in heated greenhouse because of the lack of sun for most of the week. Pansies and other cold hardy annuals growing well and ready in greenhouses but sales are low because of rainy weather. Some fields were very wet because of the rain on Wednesday 4/6/17 and the melting snow from April 1. Seeing onions and celeriac. Greenhouse tomatoes are growing. Pruning fruit trees, blueberries and grapes.

SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

The week began with a good freeze with overnight lows in the low 20s. Temperatures warmed up into the low 50s during the day. The remainder of the week was a mixed bag. Rain fell Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday totaling approximately 1.25 inches. Temperatures were average with high in the upper 30s to mid-40s and lows in the low 30s. Sunday's highs were in the low 60s with sunny skies. It was a good week for maple producers due to the freezing overnight temperatures and warm days. Producers running vacuum fared better than those using only gravity. Today will most likely be the last boil of the season. Vegetable producers have begun starting seeds. Much of the field work has yet to begin since there is still snow on the ground in some areas and it's wet in others.

RHODE ISLAND

ALL RI COUNTIES, Heather Faubert

Received about 3 inches of rain over two rain storms. Ponds and rivers are very full

VERMONT

ALL VT COUNTIES, Terence Bradshaw

No apples reported at green tip by 4/9, but we expect some movement of buds early this week. Growers are rushing to complete pruning and push brush out of orchards in preparation for commencement of spraying.

BENNINGTON/RUTLAND, Tina Williams

Substantial Rain fell last week making field work next to impossible. With temperatures expended to be above normal this week, last week most likely marked the end of sugaring season.

CALEDONIA, Daniel Hudson

Saturated soils, still snow in some places, spring weather is late in coming.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley Wet weather continues in Franklin County, Vermont. Manure spreading is being delayed due to the wet conditions forcing some storages to capacity. Sugar makers continue to get some sap pushing towards a full crop. No buds yet making for some late good quality syrup.
