<u>Fair week for field work:</u> New England averaged 3.3 days suitable for field work last week.

Several days of sunny weather and warmer temperature was reported in New England last week. Average weekly temperature ranged from 3 to 14 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.01 to 1.5 inches. Warmer temperature has melted most of the snow. Some areas reported spring tillage while many areas are still experiencing muddy fields. Hay fields and pastures have started to green up. Spring bulbs have started to emerge and early trees have begun blooming. Farmers have started to spread manure on fields and getting equipment ready for spring rush. Early season vegetables are being planted in selected dry field. Pruning of trees continued this week. Apple and peaches are reported as green tip. Maple sap season is reported as winding down with mixed results. Field activities for the week consisted of preparing fields, spreading manure, equipment repair and maintenance.

CONNECTICUT

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Some manure began moving to fields this week as fields slowly begin to dry and become firm enough for traffic.

MAINE

AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Still snow on the ground in the woods and along fence lines. With the rains this weekend the ground is fully saturated.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Warm weather has melted most of the snow. A couple of frosts last week. Grass has yet to turn green.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Still some snow on fields. There was a lot of snow to melt and the last 3 feet were froze down hard. Mud season is upon us. Maple sap season is winding down with mixed results.

HANCOCK/PENOBSCOT, Valerie Porter

Fields are still snow covered in areas and others are still too soft to bet equipment on. Some burning going on and finishing up pruning. Temperatures are staying above freezing so field work will be coming soon. Producers are finishing up maintenance of equipment for the busy season.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Spring tillage operations picked up across the area.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

Fields slowly melting out from the deep snow cover. Soil temperature should be rising this week, fields have not yet started to turn green. Spring bulbs only starting to emerge, and earliest trees starting to bloom.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Warm, sunny weather at both the beginning and the end of the week, with cooler temps and a little rain in the middle. Hayfields and pastures starting to green up. Some farms just starting to spread manure. Seeding and some high tunnel transplanting continues on veggie operations.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

This past week saw several warm days including one in the high 70's. The soil is drying out, possibly enough to begin manure spreading soon.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

Some farms have stock piles of manure ready to be spread on fields when top soils are ready for heavy equipment. Farmers are getting their equipment ready for spring field work. The grass is starting to green up in the river valley. Maple sugaring is about finished. The warm days and nights above freezing for the week of April 9th, finished off the sugaring season. The warm weather also brought the ticks out.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Field Crops: Liming and fertilizing hayfields. Spreading manure and getting equipment ready for the spring rush. Vegetables: Transplanting tomatoes into high tunnels. Early season vegetables (peas, lettuce, greens) are being planted in selected dry fields. Liming, fertilizing, plowing, disking (fields that are not too wet to work) and getting ready to plant fields. Fruits: Pruning blueberry bushes and raspberry patches. Orchardists are pruning and getting orchard sprayers ready to apply protective sprays on apples. Spraying peach and other stone fruit trees.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Beginning of the week saw one day reaching a temperature mid 80s followed by a rainy day. The county is still under moderate drought. Pruning some apple trees, blueberries bushes, raspberries and grape vines. Chopping apple brush and other wood brush. Apple and peaches are at green tip. Forsythia brushes are in blood. Plowing fields. Planting cool season crops. Farm-stand getting ready to open.

SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

The week began with high temperatures in the upper 70s to low 80s with overnight lows in the 40s. Rain moved through the area Wednesday. About a quarter of an inch of rain fell. The end of the work week was cooler with highs in the mid-50s to low 60s with lows in the upper 20s to low 30. The weekend was sunny and breezy. Rain showers fell overnight Saturday and late Sunday afternoon. Highs on Sunday were in the mid-80s. The maple season is over and it was a great year. Most producers had an average season. Rivers and streams are high from rains and snow melt. Snow is pretty much gone in the area. There may still be a few patches here and there in shade and in the woods. Vegetable farmers were out last week preparing the fields for planting. Cover crops are greening up.

RHODE ISLAND

VERMONT

BENNINGTON/RUTLAND, Tina Williams

Extremely warm temperatures and wind dried up fields making spring tillage begin in some areas. The warmth also started to bring out the fruit tree and blueberry buds.

CALEDONIA, Daniel Hudson

Frost still in the ground in many places. Field conditions are very wet. Not much manure spread in upland areas

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Spring is starting to bloom in Franklin County. Buds are showing on trees and grass beginning to green. Starting to get on the land with manure and hope to see some tillage behind it.
