**Excellent week for field work:** New England averaged 6 days suitable for field work last week. Weather conditions were mild to warm throughout the New England states. Unseasonably warm weather and a lack of rain was reported for most of the region. Several areas reported a light frost, but no reports of crop damage as a result. Regional weekly temperatures ranged from 1 to 11 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.00 to 1.14 inches throughout the region. Rain earlier in the week caused some delays in crop harvest and hampered sales for pick-your-own growers. The hot and humid weather has kept soil conditions damp, delaying harvest for corn silage; however, producers that were able to begin harvest were experiencing average yields. Despite the stream of tropical storms over the past few weeks, including Tropical Storm Nate last week, most of New England's fruit producers have been able to hang on to most of their crop. Apple producers seem to be having a bumper year with reports of overflowing bins in sight. However, the dry weather seems to be creating harvesting issues for cranberry growers, as they anxiously await more rainfall for better yields. Farmers were harvesting a wide array of vegetables last week and farm stands were filling up with ripe produce. Field activities for the week included sidedressing fields with fertilizer, cultivating, mowing weeds, as well as equipment repair and maintenance.

#### CONNECTICUT

#### LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Corn harvest is way behind this year. Corn refuses to dry down. Numerous fields have been opened up and that is all as harvesters have moved on looking for corn dry enough to ensile properly.

#### MAINE

#### AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Potato harvest moved along quickly last week. Many operations have finished, others have a day or two left. Over an inch of rain on Monday will halt progress until midweek. Mild temperatures and plenty of moisture have kept the pastures green.

#### CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Silage corn has been harvested with average yields reported. First crop of hay harvest was good and despite not much of a second cutting, there is a good amount of hay available. This has been a good year for apples with good color and size. Apples are hanging on well despite the warm weather. Rain on Sunday and Monday made for slow pick your own sales.

Dry, dry, dry. Corn silage being harvested.

#### MASSACHUSETTS

#### PLYMOUTH, Steve Ward

Dry conditions are impacting the ability of cranberry growers to flood for harvest.

#### **NEW HAMPSHIRE**

#### CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Unseasonably warm for much of the week, but a little rain. Corn silage harvest continues, but some farms still waiting to get the crop a little more mature. Some hay/baleage getting harvested, but there's still good grass for later-season grazing. More fall crops are showing up in farm stands and at markets. PYO apples continues with later varieties.

### COOS, Steve Turaj

Cooling temps, morning fogs and fairly heavy rain into Columbus Day. Rivers and tributaries had been running fairly dry prior to that. Some corn hit by frost last week as corn silage harvest continues. Late planted grain oats combined. Difficult hay drying conditions for anything cut towards week's end. Fall foliage coloring up now in southern part of county.

#### HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fall harvest festivals had a beautiful Saturday and damp Sunday! Some local-spot frost events occurred throughout the county during the week. Fruit: Pick-your-own apple and farm stand operations had a wonderful Saturday, October 11 and was rainy on Sunday, October 12. Apple harvest is in full swing with most growers concentrating on strip picking Cortland and picking Macoun and later maturing varieties. Apple drop on some varieties have been bad. Apple crop is large at some orchards, where the orchardists are running out of bins. Some sun burning on fruit is being seen. Peach and pear harvest is completed and fall raspberries, which has not been killed by frost, harvest continues. Vegetables: Great weather and good demand for all vegetables continues. Farmers are harvesting a wide array of vegetables including cabbage, kale, Brussel Sprouts, winter squash and pumpkins along with the tail end of warm season crops. Good demand for all vegetable continues. Farmers kept busy disking, cleaning up and planting cover crops on harvested fields. Field Crops: Silage corn harvest in full swing. The second and third cuttings of hay and haylage continues between rain showers.

#### ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Rain needed but came at a wrong time on a holiday weekend for PYO apple operations. Saturday weather was rainy mainly in the morning. Sunday turned to be a nice day. But the rain forecast as a result of Nate tropical storm/hurricane for Monday made apple growers nervous as they have tons of apples and rain could prevent customers from coming to the farm. Sweet potatoes available from farms as well as fall raspberries and strawberries growing in high tunnels. Harvesting kales, greens, and other vegetables, herbs as well as pumpkins. No frost yet. Chopping corn has been delayed for a few days.

#### SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

It was a nice week in Sullivan County with highs in the upper 60s to upper 70s with cool mornings. Rain showers were present during the weekend and it was warm and muggy. Corn silage harvest is in full swing. Apple harvest is winding down. Vegetables are plentiful.

#### RHODE ISLAND

#### ALL RI COUNTIES, Heather Faubert

Parts of RI received over an inch of rain on 9/30/17 which was helpful.

#### ALL RI COUNTIES, George Goulart

The entire state of Rhode Island is under abnormally dry conditions. Producers continue to harvest what is remaining in the fields and some are preparing to plant their winter rye. Other farmers have been active with their farm fall activities.

#### VERMONT

#### FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Another week with no rain has progressed corn harvest in Franklin County, VT. Still some kernels in the milk to dough stage, however, dent stage is arriving quickly. Hearing of some springs drying up due to the lack of rain and warm temps. Drilled wells seem to still be supplying water. Pastures have also taken a hit from the dry weather with less growth. Pumpkins are very abundant at road side stands displaying a lot of orange and giving the great pumpkin seekers plenty to choose from.

#### ORLEANS, David Blodgett

The beginning of the week was dry and warm and ended with a good soaking rain. Farmers are finishing up both third and fourth cut hay. The corn silage harvest began in earnest this past week as well. We have had 2 frosts so far but, for the most part, the temperatures have been mild. Corn yields vary widely depending on soil type and due to the very wet and cool spring and summer. Corn on the lighter soils fared much better than on the heavy soils.
