**Excellent week for field work:** New England averaged 6 days suitable for field work last week. New England weather conditions were ideal for many farmers last week. Drier weather conditions and warm temperatures helped dry some oversaturated fields, allowing operators to get more field work done than in previous weeks. Regional weekly temperatures ranged from 5 degrees below to 9 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.12 to 3.47 inches throughout the region. High humidity helped keep moisture in the ground on dry days, but high pressure systems moved into the area by the weekend leading to reports of thunderstorms. Field crops were looking great last week, as reporters indicated that field activities and growth progress were moving along at a decent speed. Fruit trees were progressing nicely, with apples, peaches, and pears beginning to bloom. Field crop planting was in full swing, with nearly half of farm operations finished planting corn. Cranberry weevil have been found in high numbers, so operations were using pesticides to prevent crop damage. Field activities for the week included tilling, manure spreading, plowing, disking, fertilizing, equipment repair, and maintenance.

#### CONNECTICUT

#### MAINE

### AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Everybody is planting now. Dry weather has stopped the springs from running. One half inch of rain on Saturday has made conditions perfect. I expect several operations will finish this week.

#### CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Possible frost in some locations on Saturday morning, but so far no reports of damage to apples and blueberries. Warm crops haven't been planted outside yet, the soil is still cold. Potatoes, onions and peas were early crops planted. Asparagus is being harvested. Still could use more rain.

## FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Another excellent week for field work. We were happy to see rain on Saturday. Things are looking green with added color from lots of flouring trees.

#### **MASSACHUSETTS**

#### ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Scattered thunderstorms with some isolated reports of hail occurred on Wednesday though no damage was reported to any crops. Cooler weather came in after the storms but a push of warmer humid air started moving in at the end of the week. Harvest of leafy greens has begun. Potatoes are beginning to emerge. First hay crops were being harvested.

## HAMPSHIRE/HAMPDEN, Heather Baylis

Everything is full steam ahead. Although behind from last year it is catching up. Livestock are out on pastures and farmers are starting their first cutting of hay. Moisture from last few weeks has improved the soils. First asparagus is out on farm stands - yumm!

## BARNSTABLE/BRISTOL/DUKES/NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH, Dr. Peter Jeranyama

The cranberry buds have progressed and are now around rough neck stage of development. The buds 1 cultivars are now all sensitive to a spring frost damage at a temperature of 29.5 degrees F. As the temperatures warm up we expect a faster pace of greening up of the runners and uprights. In the past three weeks cranberry weevil have been found in high numbers; gypsy moths are not so high, the winter moth are still low. Avaunt has been used as a pesticide against cranberry weevil and this week the window to spray is there.

#### PLYMOUTH, Steve Ward

Due to an abundance of cool damp weather, cranberries are making very slow progress this season. Growers are expressing concern that there will be a negative impact on the crop very soon. On a positive note, clouds have kept the frost season close to an all-time low.

#### **NEW HAMPSHIRE**

#### CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Generally warm and sunny most of the week, with some well-timed rain on the weekend. Grass growth is strong in pastures and hayfields, orchard grass beginning to head out. Corn planting continues in full swing. Planting continues on vegetable operations. Orchards in late bloom.

### HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fruits: Apples are at petal fall and growers are determining what they should use to thin apples in Hollis and Londonderry areas (southern NH). Apples are full bloom to petal fall in Concord area (central NH). Blueberries are at full bloom. Strawberries are starting to bloom. Orchardists are applying protective fungicide sprays on fruit trees and blueberries. Field crops: farmers are plowing, disking, fertilizing, planting corn, and applying herbicides to fields dry enough to get on. Pastures and hayfields starting to look good. Early planted corn has emerged and new seedings are up and growing. Vegetables: continued planting vegetables, along with successive planting of sweet corn. Laying plastic mulch and drip irrigation tape. Harvesting spinach, asparagus, rhubarb and all kinds of greens.

#### ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Planting fruit trees such as apple and peaches; also planting small fruits trees like blueberries and strawberries. Transplanting tomatoes in high tunnels. Cucurbits, peppers seedlings growing well in greenhouses and waiting for the frost free, warmer weather to be planted in the field. Preparing vegetable fields, disking, laying plastic. The fruit orchards are in full bloom. A few more days left for the bees to work in fruit orchards. Harvesting spring onions, and greens, snow and snap peas, kales, lettuce, herbs, asparagus, rhubarb. More apples coming up from controlled atmosphere storage (CA) at some farm stands. Community Supported Agriculture (CSAs) operations expecting the first pick share to start at the beginning of June. Farmers markets attracting crowds especially on weekends. Hay fields look good. Spreading manure. Livestock enjoying pasture and the outdoors. We saw some rain over the weekend.

#### SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

After a nice week, much needed rain fell over the weekend. Producers were busy planting field corn and vegetables, killing cover crops, and fertilizing fields. Producers in Langdon, Acworth, and Lempster continue to clean up downed trees from the May 4th wind event, which has been deemed an EF1 tornado.

#### RHODE ISLAND

### ALL RI COUNTIES, George Goulart

The fields in Rhode Island continue to be fairly wet and producers are finding it hard to complete their field prep and plantings. Apples are in petal fall stage in the north end of the state. Early crops like spring greens, spinach, lettuces and asparagus are being picked.


#### **VERMONT**
