Excellent week for field work: New England averaged 6 days suitable for field work last week. New England weather conditions were overall very good for field activities and production last week. The weather consisted of mostly warmer dry conditions, which made it easier for farmers to get field work done. Regional weekly temperatures ranged from 1 degree below to 11 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.02 to 1.36 inches throughout the region. Conditions permitted operators in the New England states to plow, disk, fertilize and apply pesticides in their fields. Operations were also busy harvesting early spring crops, such as asparagus, beets, romaine lettuce, kale, and herbs. Floriculture operations were looking good, as many flowers began blooming. Orchardists cleared debris left in orchards from winter and early spring pruning. The first cutting of hay began and reporters indicate that hav yields were down, but the quality of hav produced was described as being remarkable. Pests such as the European corn borer moth and cucumber beetles have been spotted, but hopefully pesticides applied to fields will diminish any potential damage. Field activities for the week included tilling, manure spreading, plowing, disking, fertilizing, equipment repair and maintenance.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Planting is progressing. Irrigation was being used on vegetables and turf last week. Except for a few areas, no measurable rain over the weekend. Very dry for this time of year.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Fantastic haying weather with very few showers and good drying conditions. Fantastic planting weather. We are off to a good start but will need rain soon.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Temps gradually rose as the week progressed finally peaking on Saturday before cooling off on Sunday. Ideal weather for all field activities. Could use some rain.

HAMPSHIRE/HAMPDEN, Heather Baylis

Five out of seven days in the 80's range gave a good push to most everything. Corn planting is going well, potatoes are emerging. First cutting of hay is being harvested. Harvesting: Spinach, rhubarb, herbs, many kinds of greens and asparagus. Pastures are doing well with the extra heat this week.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Warm and sunny most of the week, with scattered showers on a couple days; we could actually use a bit more rain. Corn planting starting to wind down, and more planted fields starting to emerge. Grass is ready for first cut, but not too many farms have been mowing yet. First early crops showing up at farmers' markets and CSA shares.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

For the week ending May 27, top soil conditions remain dry. Farmers are reporting that first cut is significantly below normal on the sandy well drained soils. Some first cut yields are off by as much as 50%. Soils that are less well drained are doing better. Most of the corn in Grafton is planted and emerged. Vegetable growers are planting at a brisk pace.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fruits: fruit growers were monitoring pest and crop development and applying cover sprays for pest control. Orchardists are applying thinning sprays to apple orchards. Mowing orchard floor and weed spraying under trees. Blueberries were at bloom to petal fall during the week. Strawberries were blooming. Field crops: farmers are plowing, disking, fertilizing, planting corn, and applying herbicides to fields. Farmers are making haylage. Vegetables: Transplanting tomato and pepper plants in field, and making successive planting vegetable crops. Harvesting spinach, greens, asparagus and rhubarb. First European corn borer moth caught in traps. Also, striped cucumber beetles seen feeding on vine crops.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Friday night saw downpours and gusty winds. Vegetable fields are being prepared by picking rocks, disking, spreading fertilizers and other amendments; also busy planning, seeding, transplanting, and watering. Cleaning and picking up wood in the orchards that were pruned in winter/early spring. Rented bee hives have left the orchards. Harvesting from the fields: asparagus, beets, romaine lettuce, kale, and herbs. Farm stands and greenhouse operations were busy over the Memorial Day weekend with sales of a variety of vegetable transplants, herbs, annuals, perennials and others plants. Haying starting. Pastures are green. Strawberries season is almost here.

Another very good week for planting corn. Fields are on the dry side of normal, making tilling and planting much easier. There was only one day this past week where field work was not possible. Most of the corn has now been planted and some has emerged. Started to see hay this past weekend. Grazing is in full swing and pastures look green and lush. A lot of apple blossoms around the county this weekend. Temperatures have been average during the day but still a little chilly at night. Not chilly enough to keep the black flies and mosquitos at bay unfortunately.
