Excellent week for field work: New England averaged 6 days suitable for field work last week. Hot and humid weather was reported throughout the New England region for most of last week. The heat this summer seemed to have pushed crop development along. Regional weekly temperatures ranged from 1 degree below to 10 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.00 to 2.44 inches throughout the region. Temperatures cooled down towards the end of the week, which should help with fruit coloring. Multiple apple varieties were showing up in stands as apple harvest was fully underway. Cranberry producers were pleased to find that water tables have returned to normal, but concerned that the warm temperatures and high moisture levels may cause fruit to rot. Spotted Wing Drosophila fruit flies were reported in several counties, as farmers continued fending off pests. Sweet corn harvest was in full swing, as reporters estimated harvest at 75 percent complete. Field activities for the week included treating fields for pests, tillage, side-dressing fields with fertilizer, cultivating, mowing weeds, as well as equipment repair and maintenance.

CONNECTICUT

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Corn harvest has begun on a few farms that started planting early. Most fields still a week or more out. Starting to see some bear damage in field corn.

NEW LONDON, Sarah Kubik

Heat and humidity finally broke on Friday. Cool temps and rain over the weekend. Silage corn chopping underway. Pick your own apples and corn mazes open. Vegetable farmers harvesting winter squash. Zucchini and tomato crops winding down.

MAINE

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

The heat this summer pushed crops along early. Problems with mold/fungus on squash crops reported. Also reports of resistant ear worms in corn. Lots of small pumpkins. Silage will start to be cut this week. Remains very dry for most of the area. Damage from a thunderstorm reported from Bridgton to Brunswick last week.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

First frost on some pumpkins in real low lying areas. All crops looking good. We could use a few showers.

PENOBSCOT/PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

Frost hit this weekend. Pumpkins are coloring up. End of sweet corn season. On to fall activities.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Warm and humid weather at the beginning of the week gave way to cloudy, cooler temps at the end of the week making it tough to make dry hay. Aerial (helicopter) rye seeding underway. Harvest of butternut squash and pumpkins underway; earlier than most years. Tobacco harvest wrapping up.

BARNSTABLE/BRISTOL/DUKES/NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH, Dr. Peter Jeranyama

Cooler temperatures are certainly welcome for the upcoming week and will aid in color development. Most receiving stations will open next week and signal the start of the cranberry harvest for Massachusetts.

PLYMOUTH, Steve Ward

Recent rain has brought water tables to a relatively good level for cranberry growers to start flood for harvest. However, moist conditions continue to cause concern for fruit rot.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Hot and humid for the first part of the week, cooler and drier during the weekend. Some late 2nd or 3rd cut hay/haylage harvested. Silage corn harvest has just begun, with the crop maturing everywhere else. Vegetable crops doing well, with some fall crops just starting to appear. PYO apples starting to ramp up.

COOS, Steve Turaj

Mixed weather but trending cooler with morning fogs along rivers. Possibility of scattered frosts during last part of week. Hills and swamp maples showing colors. Grain oat harvest being done. Field corn moving along in maturity with a little dent showing if you look hard enough. Fielding calls on white grub damage to a number of hayfield in Grafton City but have yet to see any in Coos.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

For the week ending September 8th, conditions generally remained dry. A few scattered showers dropped varying amounts of rain. At our Orford location was 0.21 inches for the entire week. The hay crop continues to show some improvement. The corn crop is looking good. We have received a number of calls concerning grub infestations on hay fields, with wildlife coming in to root out the grubs.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Vegetables: growers are irrigating unharvested crops. Harvesting an array of vegetables: beans, beets, broccoli, cabbage, cucumbers, greens, potatoes, radishes, summer squash, sweet corn, tomatoes, zucchini, and other vegetables. Some farmers are starting to clean up harvested fields and plant cover crops. Sweet corn growers are monitoring insect pressures and spraying accordingly. Trapping numbers continue to show continue sizeable increase in corn earworm and fall armyworm activity. Fruit: orchardists harvesting Zestar, Gala, Marshall McIntosh and beginning of Honeycrisp apples and fall raspberries. Irrigating, weeding and fertilizing strawberry beds. Spotted Wing Drosophila fruit fly population continues to increase rapidly. Field crops: farmers are continuing hay cutting during the week with the second and third cuttings being made, very low yields. Continue chopping corn silage, yields are down but quality is good.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Harvesting apples, plums, raspberries, peaches, nectarines, a whole array of warm season vegetables and cool crops. The week again started with very high temperature and high humidity. Finally weather broke on Thursday afternoon with heavy rain and temperature dropping by about 20 degrees. End of week saw night and early morning temperatures enjoyed by growers and cool crops. Growers busy irrigating, harvesting, and sowing beds of fall greens in the fields. Planting cover crops in field fully harvested. Haying.

SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

Hot and humid start to the week. Cool and seasonable ending. Pumpkins, winter squash, and mums were out at farmers markets and farm stands along with plenty of summer vegetables. Even more varieties of apples were available. Field corn looks good and harvest is anticipated to begin soon.

Very hot and humid conditions for most of the week. Finally cooling down at end of week.

VERMONT

BENNINGTON/RUTLAND, Tina Williams

Another hot humid week for field work. Dry hay is a challenge and hay harvest is winding down while corn silage harvest is gearing up. Apple harvest is underway.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Shorter days and cooler temps are helping with dry conditions in Franklin County this week. Continued hay harvests is still on the short side with great quality. Hearing corn harvest thoughts which the unbearable heat for man and beast has great for maturing corn. Apples are still bountiful and orange pumpkins are starting to show up at veggie stands.
