# New **England**

**Good week for field work:** New England averaged 5 days suitable for field work last week. The weather remained hot and humid again last week, as operators continued harvesting and field maintenance. Regional weekly temperatures ranged from 4 degrees below to 9 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.17 to 5.38 inches throughout the region. Operations ramped up corn harvest last week in preparation of weather effects expected from Hurricane Florence's aftermath. Water tables in Massachusetts were reported as being at good levels, as operations prepared for the cranberry harvest. Several New England states reported issues with pests, chiefly squirrels and bears in corn fields and Spotted Wing Drosophila fruit flies on fruit operations. Humid weather last week created challenges for farmers wishing to harvest dry hay. Field activities for the week included treating fields for pests, tillage, side-dressing fields with fertilizer, cultivating, mowing weeds, as well as equipment repair and maintenance.

#### **CONNECTICUT**

#### LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Corn harvest is slow due to field conditions. Some farms still haven't started due to wet muddy conditions. Corn is also drying down much slower due to weather.

#### MAINE

### AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Grain harvest is wrapping up. Yields and test weights were much better than expected. Hay supplies are very short. Harvest break for the schools started today. This will be the last year of what has been a long tradition of students helping get the crop in.

# CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Heavy rain of 2+ inches last week helped with the drought conditions. Reports of squirrels eating crops like never before, such, as pumpkins and apples. Silage corn is beginning to be cut. Sweet corn harvest is almost complete.

### FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Crops are progressing nicely. Lots of third cut hay harvested. We could really use some rain, the water table is getting low.

# **MASSACHUSETTS**

# ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Though it's been a challenging season for winter squash and pumpkins, ample supplies seen on farmsteads and farmer markets. Summer squash and cucumbers were in short supply. Good quality for late season sweet corn. Farmers stepping up harvest of crops, especially with corn silage and potatoes, with heavy rain expected this coming Tuesday.

#### PLYMOUTH, Steve Ward

Another wet week in for the cranberry industry. On a positive note, water levels are decent to begin harvest flooding, however, fruit rot concerns remain high.

## **NEW HAMPSHIRE**

#### COOS, Steve Turaj

Heavy rain during week helped to keep moisture at a good level. Warm temperatures but foggy mornings especially in river valleys makes for difficulty in any late season haymaking. Field corn was looking good as more was reaching towards maturity for silage, we may see some chopped in the coming week. Bears were hitting the corn rather hard, particularly sweet corn. Abundance of squirrels everywhere this year.

#### GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

Top soil conditions remain on the dry side. Corn is being harvested at an accelerated rate. Corn has dried down fast this year due to the weather conditions. Farmers are chopping haylage and completing field activities in preparation for fall.

# HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Vegetables: good demand for all vegetables continues. Harvesting wide array of vegetables, including warm season vegetables like tomatoes and peppers. Starting to harvesting cabbage, kale, Brussel sprouts, winter squash and pumpkins. Farmers kept busy disking, cleaning up and planting cover crops on harvested fields. Fruit: apple harvest is in full swing with most growers concentrating on picking McIntosh and Gala apples. Fall raspberries and pear harvest continued with peach and plum harvest winding down. Grape harvest is moving along. Continuing to see SWD fruit fly numbers increasing at several sites. Cucumber beetle adults damaging pumpkin and winter squash fruit. Field crops: some farmers are starting silage corn harvest along with second and third cuts of hay and haylage continues.

# SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

Rain showers early in the week made way for summer-like weather during the weekend. High temperatures were in the 80's and lows were in the 60's. Field corn harvest has begun.

### RHODE ISLAND

# ALL RI COUNTIES, Heather Faubert

Plenty of rain - at least 2 inches. Too much humidity. Expect lots of diseases to appear on tomatoes and other vegetables. Fruits too.

# **VERMONT**

### BENNINGTON/RUTLAND, Tina Williams

Corn harvest is underway in large quantities and rates to beat Hurricane Florence. Apple harvest is in full swing. Another hot and humid week made dry hay harvest a challenge.

# FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Dry conditions are back in Franklin County this week with a vengeance. It's going beyond effecting crops to supplies for cattle and households. Corn harvest is getting underway, however lots of variation in maturity within fields. Apples continue to be harvested and the pumpkin crop seems to be abundant.

# LAMOILLE, Heather Mateja

Dry and warm. Corn is being harvested.
