Fair week for field work: New England averaged 4 days suitable for field work last week. Warm but wet conditions reported throughout the New England states. Some areas received scattered rain showers and first frost over the weekend. Regional weekly temperatures ranged from 1 degree below to 14 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.40 to 4.11 inches throughout the region. Rain had made it difficult to get on poorly drained fields. Some areas were still waiting on a break from the rain to begin field crop harvest. Unusually warm night time temperatures this season had growers concerned about crop color development and increase in rot formation. Late season hay and haylage harvested continued as weather permitted. Apple harvest continued; peach, pear and fall raspberries harvest was nearing completion. Vegetable harvest continued with producers harvesting a wide array of fall vegetables including cabbage, Brussel sprouts, and pumpkins along with end of warm season crops. Cover crops had an excellent start with warm temperatures and moisture for germination. Field activities for the week included disking, cleanup and planting cover crops on harvested fields as well as equipment repair and maintenance.

MAINE

AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Pastures are getting very thin. Because of the hay shortage animals will be left to graze longer. Most potato operations are finished or close. They will start cutting soybeans as soon as the weather permits.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Frost have hit most of the area. Rains have made it difficult to get on poorly drained fields. One nice day over the weekend for apple picking.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski Some low lying areas had first frost on Sunday.

BARNSTABLE/BRISTOL/DUKES/NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH, Dr. Peter Jeranvama

Massachusetts is probably about 1/3 of its way through harvest, which is slower than in many past years. Color is starting to come on and we finally had our first frost night on Saturday 10/13. We usually have frost nights in September, but the night time lows have been very high this year (similar to last year). These warm night time temperatures slow color development and increase rot formation, a highly undesirable combination.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Temps in the 80's midweek, followed by the first frost over the weekend. Corn chopping just about done, with just a few small fields remaining. Grass still looks good for grazing, and a little bit of late-season hay/haylage being harvested as conditions allow. Vegetable crops just about done, fall crops dominating farm stands and markets. Late season apples still available.

COOS, Steve Turaj

Cooler and somewhat wetter conditions, although some reports of drier soils, lack of groundwater for springs and wells in northern half of county so reflecting in percentages above. Seems rainfalls have been scattered. A hard freeze rather widespread this Saturday night. Field corn mostly in but some still to be chopped. Soybeans should be combined soon, some late season hay/haylage coming in as weather permits. Nice colors this Fall, peaking or past in northern part of county.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

Much of the county had had its first frost by the end of the week.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fall harvest festivals had a rainy Saturday (Oct 13) but beautiful Sunday (Oct 14)! Some local-spot frost events occurred throughout the county during weekend of October 13 and 14. Fruit: Pick-yourown apple and farm stand operations were busy on Sunday, October 14. Apple harvest is in full swing with most growers concentrating on strip picking Cortland and picking Macoun and later maturing varieties. Peach and pear harvest is completed and fall raspberries, that hasn't been killed by frost, harvest continues. Vegetables: Great weather and good demand for all vegetable continues. Farmers are harvesting wide array of vegetables including: cabbage, kale, Brussel Sprouts, winter squash and pumpkins along with the tail end of warm season crops. Good demand for all vegetable continues. Farmers kept busy disking, cleaning up and planting cover crops on harvested fields. Field Crops: Silage corn harvest in full swing. The second and third cuttings of hay and haylage continues between rain showers.

SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

Producers were busy mid-week harvesting field corn, hay, apples, and vegetables. Temperatures were in the upper 70s with abundant sunshine. Thursday was a cool, rainy day adding additional moisture to already soaked fields. More rain fell on Saturday, but Sunday was nice and sunny. The first frost advisories were issued during the weekend. Corn harvest has been delayed in some areas due to wet field conditions. Later cuts of hay have been either delayed or forgone for the same reason. Many farm stands have closed for the season, but farmer's markets and CSAs are still going.

RHODE ISLAND

ALL RI COUNTIES, Heather Faubert Humid, warm conditions. Heavy rain fall 10/11-10/12.

VERMONT

BENNINGTON/RUTLAND, Tina Williams

Wet weather continues to hinder silage chopping and grain harvest. Fall tillage is also affected. Apple picking is wrapping up.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Harvest is closing in on all fronts within Franklin County this week. Still some silage corn harvest with most activity in this area going to grain. Cover crops have an excellent start with warm temps and moisture for germination and growth. Apples are mostly drops and late varieties at this point. Pumpkins are a plenty so get those faces carved in preparation of the great pumpkin arrival.
