Good week for field work: New England averaged 5 days suitable for field work last week. Weather varied greatly throughout the week. Some areas reported dry but colder weather while others reported a light dusting of snow and frost. Regional weekly temperatures ranged from 9 degrees below to 1 degree above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.02 to 1.27 inches throughout the region. All field crop harvest was reported as nearing completion. Reports indicated it was an excellent year for corn and soybeans. However, hay harvest was down this year because of extremely dry conditions in the beginning of the season that resulted in below normal first cut. Farmers continued harvesting last cuttings of hay. Grass was still available for grazing. Apple harvest was reported as nearing completion as well. Vegetable operations were harvesting an array of fall vegetables such as pumpkins, carrots, beets, and turnips. Field activities for the week included cleaning up fields, soil testing for next season, disking, planting cover crops on harvested fields as well as equipment repair and maintenance.

MAINE

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

The season started extremely dry, then rain started in late July, into August and it has been a wet fall. Humidity was over 70% for 41 days in Portland. Most crops turned out well, such as silage corn. Apple production is down from last year. Also many orchards suffered severe damage from squirrels. All crops are harvested at this point except for late apples, grain corn and some dry beans.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

It was an excellent year for corn. Corn silage is harvested and grain harvest is underway. This was one of our best soybean crops ever. Hay was down some because of a below normal first cut. It is time to bolt down the hatches. Some snow and cold weather projected for this week.

PENOBSCOT/PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

Manure is being spread. Farm stands are starting to move to their winter farmers' markets venues.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Many areas saw first frost of the season. Harvest of late season crops continues.

PLYMOUTH, Steve Ward

The colder temperatures have certainly helped cranberry growers color up their crop. There have been a few reports that crop quality was disastrous, however, quality has been far better than expected, given the late season wet condition.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Sunny but cool for most of the week. Still grass available for grazing, but things are beginning to wind down otherwise. Still a few acres of corn to chop, though it's been hit with several frosts by now, and still a few late apples to pick.

COOS, Steve Turaj

Colder weather generally with first snow cover this week which lasted a day or so. Corn silage harvest finishing up.

GRAFTON, Steven Schmidt

The week of October 14th brought a light dusting of snow to the area. Total precipitation (including snow melt) was 0.26 inches. Soil moisture conditions remain in deficit. Harvest of silage corn is finished. There are still a few fields of grain corn left to be combined. Farmers are scrambling to chop the last few loads of haylage.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

Most of the county got a light dusting of snow and several frosts this past week.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Weather: County-wide hard frost occurred during week. Cloudy and colder weather weekend of Oct 21 for on-farm sales of farm products. Fruit: Orchardists busy marketing crop. Apple harvest is practically done. Finishing harvesting late maturing varieties like Rome, Fuji, and Pink Lady. Vegetables: Farmers are cleaning up fields, picking up plastic mulch, drip tape, trellis stakes and irrigation equipment and soil testing fields for next season. Cleaning and putting away farm equipment. Field crops: Silage corn chopping almost finished. Soil testing fields for next season and cleaning and putting away farm equipment.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

The week saw frost from light to hard ones and growers were busy to harvest the last of warm season crops and cut flowers. An abundance of greens, winter squashes, pumpkins, turnips, carrots, beets and other fall vegetables available at farms stands, farmers markets, and at CSA shares. Some late apple varieties are being harvested. And many apple varieties in abundance at markets. Cleaning vegetable fields and planting cover crops. Spreading manure and lime on fields that need it. Planting greens in high tunnels. Midweek saw gusty winds close to 40 mph as well as heavy rain.
