

This will be the last publication for the 2018 crop year. We hope everyone has a wonderful holiday season and good luck next spring!

Poor week for field work: New England averaged 2 days suitable for field work last week. Cold weather continued throughout the New England states with most areas reporting below average temperatures and snow covered grounds. Regional weekly temperatures ranged from 15 to 5 degrees below normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.01 to 1.85 inches throughout the region. Although the harvest of most field crops was complete, wet weather continued to challenge producers as they attempted to accomplish fall projects. Christmas trees and other holiday farm tourism dominated the region. Cranberry harvest was completed. Cranberry growers were preparing for winter by checking/repairing flume status and assessing water resources to flood fields if winterkill conditions arrive. Farmers were busy marking remaining fall crops, cleaning and putting away farm equipment and assessing the challenges of this growing season and planning for next year.

AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

It appears that a great deal of the soybeans have been lost. No blight reported in the potato crop this year, so most are keeping very well. Movement has been strong, but the cullage is well above normal. The drought caused a lot of second growth and growth crack.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Another snowstorm on Tuesday and very cold temperatures over Thanksgiving. There is an unusual amount of snow on the ground for November.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Winter is here. There is up to a foot of hard pack snow in this area. Soybeans got harvested; it was nip and tuck. It was a bumper crop. There may be a little grain corn standing.

MASSACHUSETTS

BARNSTABLE/BRISTOL/DUKES/NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH, Dr. Peter Jeranyama

Harvest is complete and growers are preparing for winter by checking/repairing flume status and assessing water resources (preparing to flood if winterkill conditions arrive).
