Good week for field work: New England averaged 5 days suitable for field work last week. The region experienced a mix of weather with bright sunny days at the beginning and end of the week, and several inches of rain mid-week. Regional weekly temperatures ranged from 3.76 degrees below to 4.87 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.0 to 2.83 inches throughout the region. The intermittent showers slowed all field activities last week. However, warm temperatures along with the rain had been ideal for crop and grass growth. Most field crops including potatoes had emerged. Cranberries had begun blooming. With the continuous rain, many cranberry producers were questioning the last time they had gone this far into the season without having to irrigate. Vegetable crops were reported as doing well, with farmstands beginning to open for the season. Strawberry harvest began last week with many operations opening for Pick-Your-Own. Orchardists and small fruit growers were monitoring pests and applying protective fungicides. Field activities for the week included spreading manure, scouting for pests and spraying, and harvesting hay.

CONNECTICUT

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Nitrate testing and top-dressing Nitrogen on corn. Harvesting haylage on the few sunny days. Spreading manure when conditions allow.

MAINE

AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Most potato fields have emerged. Warmer temperatures along with a couple inches of rain Friday has really sped up crop growth. Hay crops look excellent so far. Crops are probably about 10 days behind normal.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Nice weather over the weekend. Farmers are still having to work around wet areas. Many will have prevented planting or late planting of an alternative crop. Fields were wet after 1.5 inches of rain on Thursday.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Intermittent showers slowed all field activities in the middle of the week. Asparagus harvest is essentially complete and yields are down 20-30%. Transplanting of cigar binder tobacco continues buts lags considerably behind last year.

BARNSTABLE/BRISTOL/DUKES/NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH,

Cranberry is now showing scattered blooms and they have been reported to be in this order; Early Black and Howes are less than 10% open flowers. Stevens have a wide range of 3 to 21% open flowers; Ben Lear has a range of 6 to 20 %; Mullica Queen is 10 to 20%; Crimson Queen is 20 to 40% open blooms. Scattered blooms means it's time for first fungicide sprays against fruit rot. Bees and bumble bees are out.

PLYMOUTH, Steve Ward

Wet conditions continue. Many cranberry growers are questioning the last time they've gone so far into the season without having to irrigate.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

A mix of weather, with bright, sunny days at the beginning and end of the week. All the corn has emerged now, and earlier-planted fields are growing well. Conditions are still ideal for growing grass, but difficult for harvesting it. Most first cutting haylage is done, but plenty of upland fields are still a little too wet for equipment, with infrequent stretches of good drying conditions. Vegetable crops still doing well, with farmstands beginning to open for the season. First strawberries of the season have appeared, with farms opening for PYO.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

Farms are starting to get caught up, but typical reports are still that folks are 1-2 weeks behind.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fruit: Strawberry harvest continues. Fruit growers mowing orchard floors, monitoring pest and crop development, and applying sprays for pest control. Some apple scab being seen. Field Crops: Farmers making haylage. Farmers are trying to finish up corn planting, sidedressing fertilizer to field corn, if needed, and to hay fields. Pastures and hay fields are growing well. Vegetables: Growers continued harvesting early season vegetables such as lettuce, greens, radishes, etc. Weeds are plaguing growers. Farmers are side dressing fields with fertilizer, cultivating and hand-hoeing weeds, scouting for pests and spraying. Striped cucumber beetle and potato leaf hopper is here, and first squash vine borer has been caught!

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

What a great weekend for strawberry PYO operations and festivals. Perfect and abundant strawberry fruits. Some PYO operations had to close on Thursday because of the torrential rain. Harvesting cabbage, salad greens, rhubarb, asparagus, kale, microgreens, scallions, radish, arugula, and greenhouse tomatoes. Preparing more vegetable fields and planting different vegetable varieties. Orchardists and small fruit growers are monitoring pests in the field and applying protective fungicides. With the sun and a few showers and misting rain, pasture and hay fields are growing well.

SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

Finally another dry stretch over the weekend for dry hay makers. Field corn was emerging well with the tail end of planting this week. Some heat will be needed at some point! Strawberries coming on slowly.

RHODE ISLAND

ALL RI COUNTIES, Heather Faubert

Very wet week. Fields are saturated. Peak strawberry harvest is being damaged by all the rain and high humidity.

ALL VT COUNTIES, Terence Bradshaw

Welcome change in weather has brought improvement in growing conditions. Primary apple scab season is over in all orchards; growers are keeping an eye out for lesions before ending spraying for the season. Fire blight has popped up in sporadic spots; growers are cutting out where they see it. Codling moth are active in all orchards, growers are treating in warmer sites (Champlain, Connecticut valleys) and awaiting egg hatch in cooler areas. Grapes are growing rapidly and all major diseases are active and need management.

BENNINGTON/RUTLAND, Tina Williams

A heavy rain storm Thursday, June 13 flooded fields again and brought field work to a screeching halt. Newly planted fields lay under water, with a high chance of rotting the seed in the ground where it lays. Dry hay production is at a standstill. Haylage & baleage is harvested off dry fields without too deep of ruts. Fruit trees are plentiful. Strawberry crop is fair but season will be short with the cold wet spring.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Doing very well to catch up in Franklin County, Vermont this week. Most of the corn is planted and first cut hay continues to be harvested. Growth for second cut hay has been great with some being harvested. Manure continues to be spread on grassland as it is harvested. Jury still out on the strawberries harvest; however, looks good at this time with dryer weather minimizing berry rot.

ORLEANS, David Blodgett

June continues to be cooler and wetter than normal. However, there have been breaks in the wet weather to allow first cut hay harvest. Almost all of the harvest has been in the form of haylage. Very little harvest has been in the form of dry hay. Hay yields are down a little due to the cooler temperatures. Corn has been planted and emergence looks good. Most corn is 3-6 inches tall. Grazing is in full swing and pastures are looking good right now. Activity this past week has been first cut hay harvest and manure spreading.
