According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in New England, there were 6.0 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, July 28, 2019. Topsoil moisture supplies were 4 percent very short, 39 percent short, 54 percent adequate, and 3 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 2 percent very short, 39 percent short, 56 percent adequate, and 3 percent surplus. Pasture conditions ranged from 0 percent very poor, 12 percent poor, 39 percent fair, 43 percent good, and 6 percent excellent.

MAINE

AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Dry weather and extraordinary yields have made this one of the best dry hay seasons in memory. Hot dry weather has started to affect the potato crop.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Heat and rain have helped ripen field vegetables; green beans, early corn, garlic and potatoes are being picked. A lot of hay is being made, producers are still behind with the hay harvest. What has been harvested has been heavy. Strawberries are done, blueberries and raspberries are being picked.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

Hot weather, lots of sun and rain showers are pushing the crops right along. Crop maturity is a little late but harvest looks bountiful.

PENOBSCOT/PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

Hot and humid. Most first cut haying is done. Farm Stands are full of vegetables.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Much needed rain fell early in the week and hot, humid conditions returned by the end of the week. Scattered thunderstorms on Saturday brought reports of isolated hail. Harvest of all crops continues in full swing with the first potatoes being harvested during the week.

BARNSTABLE/BRISTOL/DUKES/NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH.

Dr. Peter Jeranyama

At this time of the season, the major production concern is irrigation. Make sure your moisture sensors are working properly. If using tensiometers, keep moisture between -3.5 and -6.5 cbars. If using volumetric sensors, be around 15-25% moisture range. Manage the water stress on your bog at times by raising the water in the ditches. Be on the lookout for spargnothis.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

Growers dealing with excessive heat by starting early in the day and running irrigation often. Summer crops like tomatoes and sweet corn are here. The start of blueberry and raspberry picking were on average 2 weeks delayed.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

We finally got some badly-needed rain Monday, then warm and sunny weather for the rest of the week. Crops have benefitted from the moisture, and most everything is growing pretty well. Field corn starting to tassel. Veggie crops doing well. PYO blueberries just starting this week.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Vegetables: Very good demand for produce at most local farmers' markets and farm stands. Farmers kept busy harvesting, cultivating, hoeing weeds, monitoring pest pressures, spraying pesticides for insects and diseases. Growers harvesting an array of vegetables including: beans, beets, broccoli, cabbage, cucumbers, greens, lettuce, potatoes, radishes, snap beans, summer squash and sweet corn. Fruit: Peach, blueberry and raspberry harvests continued. Strawberry cultivating and weeding newly renovated beds. Orchardists busy monitoring for pests, spraying if needed, and mowing orchard floors. Some growers are continuing to monitor traps for Spotted Wing Drosophila. Japanese beetle damaged several fruit crops foliage (grapes, peaches, etc.). Field Crops: Farmers making baled hay, great drying conditions for dry hay. Silage corn is rapidly growing. Second hay crop is looking good.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Harvesting raspberries, blueberries, late strawberry varieties, apricots, cherries, herbs, a whole array of vegetables including cherry tomatoes and slicer ones, garlic, and cut flowers. Peaches sizing well and will be ready in few more days for picking. Tomatoes and other crops growing well in the field. Growers busy staking tomato plants. Also irrigating crops. The weather has been good for the Pick- Your – Own/CutYour – Own operations. Farm stands, farmers markets, garden centers saw steady traffic. And CSA shares are now full of a nice assortment of vegetables and small fruits. Sheep are rotating from one field to the other enjoying the green pasture. Cows, goats and chickens are enjoying the outdoors too. Rain was welcomed on Wednesday with some steady rain at times with downpours. This week saw very high temperatures and humid weather.

SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

Strawberries are done for the year, an abbreviated season with the hot weather. Blueberries are showing varied results depending on the level of winterkill observed in a given location. The local sweet corn is just starting to hit the stands. Field corn is taking full advantage of the hot, humid weather of late. More is needed. Occasional fronts with showers have kept everything growing for the most part.

RHODE ISLAND

ALL RI COUNTIES, Heather Faubert Huge rainfall 7/22/7/23. Up to 3 inches.

ALL RI COUNTIES, Michael Sullivan

Another weather pattern dropped in and deposited up to 5 inches of rain in a 24 hour period restoring all depleted soil moisture but flooding many fields. Initial damage includes some significant erosion events, sediment movement causing plant damage or rendering difficulty in harvest. Prolonged heat and humidity allowing significant disease occurrence on small grains leaving many with concerns on grain fill and grain quality as harvest approaches.

VERMONT

ALL VT COUNTIES, Terence Bradshaw

Conditions are getting a bit dry out there, irrigation should be run where available. Apple maggot fly is picking up, diseases are pretty-well managed except where scab sprays were missed in spring. Grapes are growing well and canopies should be fully managed. Downy and powdery mildew are popping up in places.

BENNINGTON/RUTLAND, Tina Williams

Another dry week and rain is actually needed which I never thought would have been the case after such a wet spring! Corn is curling in the drier more well drained soils but the hot days has made the corn shoot up. Blueberries have started ripening and are plentiful. Pastures need some rain. Apples are plentiful in the trees. Second cut dry hay and 3rd cut haylage is being harvested.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Hot dry week in Franklin County, Vermont made for some great hay weather. Producers responded with much 2nd cut harvest and much manure out getting us caught up in both areas. Seeing some corn leaves curling and slowing growth due to the dry conditions. Some concerns of dry weather impacting reproductive stage. Some sweet corn has shown up, however, very limited. Blueberries are ample and starting to ripen for the picking.
