According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in New England, there were 6.0 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, August 25, 2019. Topsoil moisture supplies were 2 percent very short, 35 percent short, 62 percent adequate, and 1 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 1 percent very short, 23 percent short, 73 percent adequate, and 3 percent surplus. Pasture conditions ranged from 1 percent very poor, 10 percent poor, 38 percent fair, 40 percent good, and 11 percent excellent.

# CONNECTICUT

#### LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Farms will also need to fight the urge to get started. Labor Day is usually the kickoff for harvest around here but very little corn will be dry enough to harvest next week.

# MAINE

#### AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

A lot of the potato fields are showing stress from the dry conditions. Grain harvest will be in full swing by weeks end. First cut hay is finished. I don't see any chance of a second cut.

## CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

The area received heavy rain Wednesday night. Apples are looking good, although some varieties have a light crop. Ripening is reported to be 1-2 weeks delayed. Peaches reported to half a crop. Second crop hay had not started growing due to late cutting and dryness. Fall like weather over the weekend.

#### FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

We are looking at a great week to finish up a lot of second cut and third cut hay. There is a lot of sunshine to help ripen up the crops. Great weather for field worm.

#### MASSACHUSETTS

#### ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Mainly dry week with some scattered thunderstorms mid-week. Outstanding weather for "U-Pick" operations this weekend with ideal picking conditions. Hay producers took advantage of ideal haying weather from mid-week on through the weekend. Potato growers seeing good size on their crops. Just a great end of the week weather-wise!

# NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

We have an abundance of tomatoes, cucumbers, zucchini, and eggplant. Waiting on onion harvest, and winter squash starting to come in. Growers need to start prioritizing cover crop seeding. Fall transplants are prepped for late fall harvest.

# CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Hot and muggy early in the week, but cooler and crisp after some clearing showers midweek. Field corn maturing well. Pastures and hayfields showing decent growth, and excellent haying weather by the end of the week. Wide range of vegetables available in stands. Still harvesting a few peaches, early apples beginning to appear.

# HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fruit: Orchardists harvesting peaches, plums, and picking Paulared, Ginger Gold, and other early season apples. Orchardists busy monitoring for pests, summer pruning trees, mowing orchard floors, fixing up orchard roads and moving bins into the orchard. Highbush blueberry harvest is over except for those few growers who have late maturing varieties, and fall raspberry harvest continued. Apple Scab seen in several orchards. Brown rot showing up in peaches, nectarines and plums. Black rot and downy mildew showing up in grapes. Vegetables: Growers are harvesting an array of vegetables: beans, beets, Cole crops, cucumbers, greens, peas, potatoes, pumpkins, radishes, summer squash, sweet corn, tomatoes, winter squash, zucchini, and other vegetables. Demand for local produce continues to be very good. Powdery mildew can be found on summer squash, pumpkins and winter squash. Corn Earworm and Fall Armyworm trap numbers went up at many farms. Black Rot seen in Cole crops. Field Crops: Hay cutting continued during the week with the second and third cuttings being made. Some spreading manure on hay fields, and forage seeding is being done.

## ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Harvesting peaches, nectarines, plums, apples (Jersey Mac, Honeycrisp, Paula Red, Jersey Mac's, Tydeman & Gravensteins and Gingergold). Blueberry season is almost done. Harvesting raspberries, herbs, a whole array of vegetables, flowers. There was a tornado warning for part of Rockingham County on Wednesday, August 21 in the afternoon into evening, but we saw only powerful thunderstorms and rain. Mums growing well in the fields and greenhouses.

## SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

A lot of 2nd and 3rd crop hay was put up this week as perfect hay making weather continues (trying to make up for last August). The rains during the weekend of the 17th gave a boost to hay crop, pastures, and field corn; however soils are still on the dry side. Apples are going strong. 2/3 of blueberries are done yet 1/3 of operations are going. Tomato horn worm is all around, but there is a surplus of tomatoes. Sweet corn is abundant. Bees are cranking.

# **RHODE ISLAND**

ALL RI COUNTIES, Heather Faubert Rain and high humidity this past week.

## ALL RI COUNTIES, Michael Sullivan

Overall crops responding well to moderately warm temperatures and some timely gentle rains. Although some significant storms rolled through the region and dropped as much as 4 inches in brief violent events during the week. These situations were not reported as influencing too much animal or crop situations but were fairly disruptive to the Washington County Fair.

# VERMONT

# BENNINGTON/RUTLAND, Tina Williams

Much needed rain fell on Tuesday encouraging pasture growth and corn growth. Early varieties of apples are ready to harvest. Corn is tassled and the early planted corn will be ready to harvest soon. Hoping for a late frost for the late planted corn.

#### FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Great weather in Franklin County, Vermont this week. Cooler temps are in the works which will slow growth. Corn still well into its reproductive stage. Time and temperature are going to be critical for corn from here to maturity. Moisture will become less important in this stage until harvest where too much will make soil conditions difficult to move equipment on. Apples are looking good on the trees with the jury still out on the picking and quality. Sweet Corn is all over the board with flavor and yield. Still some time to go for full swing harvest in this arena. Blueberries are hanging in there with continued ripening.
