According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in New England, there were 5.0 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, September 29, 2019. Topsoil moisture supplies were 4 percent very short, 20 percent short, 54 percent adequate, and 22 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 6 percent very short, 12 percent short, 71 percent adequate, and 11 percent surplus. Pasture conditions ranged from 1 percent very poor, 19 percent poor, 60 percent fair, and 20 percent good.

Cranberry harvesting has started in earnest, some Early Blacks and DeMoranville have already been harvested. Dry picking is at its peak as we speak. We still have to protect the fruit from fall frost. As of Thursday September 26, the tolerance levels were as follows; Stevens =25F; Ben Lear =24F; Early Black = 23F; Howes =24. The super hybrids are similar to Ben Lear.

Although we are a little short on rain over the past month, most cranberry growers feel they will be in good shape for harvest flooding.

# NEW HAMPSHIRE

# CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Dry and sunny all week, with some unseasonably warm temperatures on Saturday. We could use some rain, but dry conditions allowed farms to make progress chopping corn all week. Pastures still looking pretty good, and conditions allow for a little bit of late season baleage harvest. Still wide selection of veggies in farm stands. Great weather for picking apples.

# GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

Farms in the northern part of the county have reported frost.

# HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fruit: Pick-your-own apple and farm stand operations had fantastic weekend. Apple harvest is in full swing with most growers concentrating on starting to strip picking McIntosh apples, and working on Cortland and Macoun. Peach harvest and fall raspberries harvest continues. SWD fruit fly is now a major problem for raspberry growers! Brown Marmorated Stink Bug being trapped in several orchards. Vegetables: Great weather and good demand for all vegetable continues. Irrigating crops that have not been harvested. Farmers are harvesting wide array of vegetables including: cabbage, kale, Brussel Sprouts, winter squash and pumpkins along with the tail end of warm season crops that were not damaged by frost a week ago. Warm-season crops (like tomatoes, peppers, sweet corn and beans) harvest is almost completed. Farmers kept busy disking, cleaning up and planting cover crops on harvested fields. Field Crops: Silage corn harvest in full swing. The second and third cuttings of hay and haylage continues.

#### ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Harvesting a whole array of warm season vegetables including sweet corn, tomatoes, eggplants, many greens varieties, cut flowers and herbs. The week saw a couple of nights with low temperatures resulting in frost affecting peppers and cucumbers. Also harvesting many different apple varieties, fall raspberries, winter squashes and pumpkins. Also available: mums, Indian corn, corn stalks. Cleaning vegetables fields that have been harvested. We had some rain.

#### SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

Soil conditions remain very dry which will be good for the corn harvest that is now underway. The warm late summer has brought much of the silage corn close to maturity. Hay makers had another good weekend of weather to harvest their last cutting. Apple harvest is going strong as well as tomatoes and potatoes. Late raspberries looking good still.
