According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in New England, there were 5.0 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, October 6, 2019. Topsoil moisture supplies were 3 percent very short, 13 percent short, 59 percent adequate, and 25 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 2 percent very short, 13 percent short, 63 percent adequate, and 22 percent surplus. Pasture conditions ranged from 1 percent very poor, 20 percent poor, 62 percent fair, and 17 percent good.

AROOSTOOK (Central), Larry James

Cold wet weather has made harvest progress slow. Most of the round white variety potato growers are close to finishing. Many of the russet growers are only at the halfway point. Yields are variable, but most are pleased with the quality. Broccoli harvest will probably end in the next week or so.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Widespread freeze hit the area this week ending the growing season outside at least. A good percentage of winter squash was not mature. Silage corn is being cut. Good weather for pick your own apples over the weekend.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL MA COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Scattered frosts across Massachusetts on Saturday morning. Harvesting activities continue for all crops.

BARNSTABLE/BRISTOL/DUKES/NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH,

Dr. Hilary Sandler

Harvesting has started in earnest. Most dry picking is finished and wet harvesting is peaking. Frost is still a threat to this year's crop. Most growers are being diligent to pay attention to frost warning through and the Frost Committee. On October 5 a rather dangerous frost was called with an MBT of 22F and dew point of 40. At present the tolerance levels of Early Black, Howes and Stevens is 23F. In the meanwhile Ben Lear and super hybrids are at 24F.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Cooler, apart from a more wet and humid day midweek, and the first widespread frosts in the area on Friday and Saturday nights. Farms made a lot of progress chopping corn over the past week, but they're still not done yet. Still some grazing in pastures, but grass is slowing down quite a bit, and harvesting hay/haylage/baleage is about done. Some veggie stands planning to close down by the end of the week, though there's still an abundance of fall crops available. Great weather midweek - Saturday for PYO apples.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

With two frosts this week, much of the county has now had its first frost. Silage corn is drying slowly in much of the county, one farmer reported they will likely need to wait for a hard frost. There isn't one on the long range forecast. Some early fields have been planted to cover crops.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Vegetables: Scattered frost occurred in local areas throughout the southern part of New Hampshire, causing damage to tender plants and crops. Good demand for all vegetables continues. Harvesting wide array of vegetables including warm season vegetables like tomatoes and peppers that were protected from the frost. Also harvesting cabbage, kale, Brussel sprouts, winter squash and pumpkins. Farmers kept busy disking, cleaning up and planting cover crops on harvested fields. Fruit: Apple harvest is in full swing with most growers concentrating on working on Cortland, Macoun and other later maturing varieties. Fall raspberries and pear harvest continued, with peach and plum harvest almost over. Field Crops: Silage corn harvest in full swing along with second and third cuts of hay and haylage continues.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Harvesting all apple varieties, and there is a bounty of apples, fall raspberries harvesting as well. Greens are also being harvested. Planting and seeding for winter markets: Winter kale, spinach, swisschard, beet green, lettuce, and other vegetables. Plenty of winter squashes. Haying. Cleaning vegetables harvested vegetable fields. Few nights saw some light to medium frost (close to 27 degrees F.) damaging some unprotected tender crops such as peppers, beans and cherry tomatoes. Harvesting greens. mums, corn stalks, straw, pumpkins and gourds for fall decorating.

SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

After an unseasonably warm start to the week, killing frosts affected the area Saturday morning. Corn chopping continued during the week. Approximately 2/3 of the crop has been harvested. Vegetable producers scrambled to harvest pumpkins and other crops Friday before the predicted frosts. Many also covered the more sensitive crops. Farm stands were still overflowing with vegetables. Fall raspberries were available and the apple harvest was still going strong.

RHODE ISLAND

ALL RI COUNTIES, Heather Faubert Very warm, and then turned seasonable.

VERMONT

BENNINGTON/RUTLAND, Tina Williams

Another good week for cropping. Heavy rain today will slow silage chopping progress. Apples continue to be plentiful. Most of the area experienced a killing frost Friday night/Saturday morning.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Frost is becoming more frequent in Franklin County, Vermont. This week with good timing as more corn has reached maturity. Producers have done a good job of holding off corn harvest to make the most of the late maturing weather. Hay harvest seems to be coming to a close with wet conditions making any drying difficult. However, supplies of hay and haylage are adequate. Getting into late conditions for apples and headed to working drops for any harvest. Pumpkins galore so make the preparation of the great pumpkin search.
