According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in New England, there were 5.0 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, October 13, 2019. Topsoil moisture supplies were 0 percent very short, 7 percent short, 80 percent adequate, and 13 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 0 percent very short, 7 percent short, 77 percent adequate, and 16 percent surplus. Pasture conditions ranged from 0 percent very poor, 14 percent poor, 53 percent fair, and 33 percent good.

Some operations have finished potato harvest, most are within a few days. Better than expected yields on early varieties. A little second cut clover is being done as bale silage. Apple orchards are finishing up.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Farmers are finishing harvesting and fall tillage activities. Silage is being cut and apples are being harvested before a big storm forecast for Thursday.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

The corn silage is in, leaving grain corn and soybeans still in the field. Sunday 10-13 was peak for foliage here and it was a beautiful season.

MASSACHUSETTS

Harvesting is in full swing and as of last week there had been a slight delay in fruit delivery compared with to last year this time 30% of acres have been delivered just over 350, 000 Bbls. Compared to last year, less fruit rot, higher total anthocyanin and similar firmness. Fall frost is still an issue so growers should continue to monitor for frost until all harvesting is finished.

PLYMOUTH, Steve Ward

Some well needed rain this past week. A low water table was making cranberry harvest flooding difficult.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

Generally dry all week, with more sun at the beginning of the week and overcast skies towards the end. Farms continue to make a lot of progress with chopping corn, but some farms still not entirely done yet. Grass still looks good for late grazing, but conditions aren't lending themselves to any kind of mechanical harvesting. Farm stands starting to close down for the season, though other markets, CSAs, etc. have plenty of late-season produce. Another great weekend for PYO apples.

GRAFTON, Heather Bryant

Several farms reported halting corn harvest as the corn wasn't dry enough, they are hopeful they can restart this week.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fall harvest festivals had a beautiful Sunday! Some county-wide frost events occurred throughout New Hampshire during week. Fruit: Pick-your-own apple and farm stand operations had a rainy morning on Saturday, October 11 and wonderful Sunday, October 12. Apple harvest is in full swing with most growers concentrating on strip picking Cortland and picking Macoun and later maturing varieties. Peach and pear harvest is completed and fall raspberries that has not been killed by frost harvest continues. Vegetables: Great weather continues. Farmers are harvesting wide array of vegetables including: cabbage, kale, Brussel Sprouts, winter squash and pumpkins along with the tail end of warm season crops. Good demand for all vegetable continues. Farmers kept busy disking, cleaning up and planting cover crops on harvested fields. Field Crops: Silage corn harvest in full swing. The second and third cuttings of hay and haylage continues.

The county saw some good rains early in the week. The rains were needed as much of the county has been D0 (abnormally dry) for a several weeks according to the drought monitor. Some corn silage still being harvested in parts of the county. Limited hay making weather this week for those looking to finish up their final cutting. Potatoes are mostly harvested. Carrots were being dug. The apples harvest is ongoing as well as fall raspberries. Many farmers markets and farm stands are closing for the fall. Blueberries are being mulched and out to bed.

Windy and overcast all week. Some exceptionally high winds are causing fruit fall and keeping the pick your own traffic that is important to RI away from orchards. So drop in fruit and customers is a concern. Increasing reports of deer damage as the oak tree losses cause them to seek other food sources. Exceptionally high losses in Northern RI and extending into select areas where urban edge is small or non-existent and hunting removal options more limited. USDA fencing programs clearly an increasing need. Giant pumpkin weigh-off in Warren RI this week with concerns for weather and financial impacts this provides to local growers.

Much needed rain fell slowing corn harvest progress but progress is still going forward. Apple picking is in full swing.
