According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in New England, there were 5.0 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, October 27, 2019. Topsoil moisture supplies were 0 percent very short, 0 percent short, 54 percent adequate, and 46 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were 0 percent very short, 4 percent short, 63 percent adequate, and 33 percent surplus. Pasture conditions ranged from 1 percent very poor, 13 percent poor, 66 percent fair, 20 percent good, and 0 percent excellent.

CONNECTICUT

LITCHFIELD, Richard Meinert

Crop season is mostly finished for the livestock and dairy farms. Silage harvest is over expected for the latest fields planted.

MAINE

AROOSTOOK, Larry James

Most operations finished potato harvest just before the big rains. Some wet areas were abandoned and look like a lost cause at this point. Most are reporting average yields with better than average quality. A small amount of soybeans and corn are still in the field.

CUMBERLAND/YORK, Sandy Truslow

Outdoor harvesting is just about wrapped up. The ground is wet from several rain events. Silage yields are below average, but better than expected when planted.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

The rivers and streams are full. Groundwater is being replenished for the winter. The weather has been fairly mild. Grain corn & soybeans are still in the field.

PENOBSCOT/PISCATAQUIS, Donna Coffin

Most crops are harvested. Some manure being spread when fields are dry enough. Farm stands are winding down for the season.

FRANKLIN, Gary J. Raymond

High winds and heavy frosts this week. There was widespread power losses. Pick your own pumpkin patches and apple orchards are busy. Grain corn and soybeans remain in the field.

MASSACHUSETTS

ALL COUNTIES, Tom Smiarowski

Harvest for most crops winding down.

BARNSTABLE/BRISTOL/DUKES/NANTUCKET/PLYMOUTH,

Fall frost is still a problem and growers are to take heed to frost warning messages and protect accordingly. A frost was called for October 26th Early Black and Howes are at 23F, Ben Lear is at 20F while Stevens is at 23F tolerance. As of last week, 707,000 barrels of berries had been delivered at a leading handler and the average yield was 170 bbl/acre which represent 18 bbl/acre less than 2018. However, the color of the berry measured at TACY at this time is 20% better than the 5 year average at 36. Percent poor is at 3.8% which is 2% lower than the 5 year average.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

CARROLL, Olivia Saunders

Fall produce in abundance as growers try to get winter vegetables to markets. Farmer's market demand remains moderate but not as strong as summer months. Growers beginning to tighten things up for winter, and inspecting winter lettuce crops for insect and pest damage.

CHESHIRE, Carl Majewski

A mix of sunny and cloudy days, with steady rain most of Sunday. Still a few acres of corn to chop, and some farms getting in some late 4th cutting haylage. Veggie operations working on putting fields to bed for the season. PYO apples winding down.

HILLSBOROUGH, George Hamilton

Fruit: Orchardists busy marketing crop. Apple harvest winding down, finishing harvesting Roma, Fuji, Golden Delicious and other late maturing apple varieties. Many orchardists are flail mowing apple drops under trees. Vegetables: Farmers are cleaning up fields, picking up plastic mulch, drip tape, and trellis stakes, seeding cover crops on harvested fields, draining and putting away irrigation equipment and soil testing fields for next season. Cleaning and putting away farm equipment. Field crops: Silage corn chopping is finished. Soil testing fields for next season and cleaning and putting away farm equipment. Seeding cover crops on harvested fields. Some manure spreading and incorporating in soil is taking place.

ROCKINGHAM, Nada Haddad

Finishing picking the last of the apple crop and fall raspberries. Green and cool season crop harvested. Cleaning vegetable fields, removing plastic, disking. Cleaning so of the equipment and getting ready to store them. Growers also getting ready for winter markets. The week ended with quite a bit of much needed rain between 1-2 inches.

SULLIVAN, Jennifer Z. Gehly

Still some field corn still being chopped. Some significant rain events over the last week (especially Sunday) will make the process a little slower as the later planted fields were generally the wetter ground to begin with. Soil moisture back to more than adequate after dry late summer. Many root crops out of the ground. Farmers are mulching blueberries.

RHODE ISLAND

ALL RI COUNTIES, Heather Faubert

Above average temperatures. Good working weather.

ALL RI COUNTIES, Michael Sullivan

The eastern section of the state continues to miss out on precipitation patterns and is growing dryer. Crop impacts are lighter than they might be given the time of the year but some later crop impacts will be noted. Otherwise a relatively gentle end to the 2019 crop year. Fall seeding of forage and turf grass crops look quite good across the state. Some drier surface soils showing some stand issues but overall things are in good situation.

VERMONT

BENNINGTON/RUTLAND, Tina Williams

Another inch of rain falling yesterday muddied the fields further slowing spreading, fall tillage and remaining corn harvest. Apple season is coming to a close. Producers are buttoning up for the winter.

FRANKLIN, Paul Stanley

Wet week in Franklin County made continued corn silage harvest a challenge. Perseverance has prevailed and Corn harvest is down to the cleanup fields. Jury is still out on quantity and quality. Wet weather has made any fall grazing very difficult. The stage is set for the great Pumpkin so get out the binoculars for the nearest siting.
