Good Week for Field Work: New York had an average of 5 days suitable for field work. Fall harvest continued throughout the state. Some rain was reported which slowed corn and soybean harvest and planting of small grains. Killing frost/freeze was also reported in some parts of the state delaying field growing conditions. Winter wheat is planted and has emerged. Pasture is reported as done and supplement feeding continues for animals that are still outside. Field activities for the week included plowing and planting of fields, fall tillage, harvesting, repair and maintenance.

November 1, 2015 New York Weekly Weather Summary

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

Columbia/Dutchess/Greene/Putnam Counties, Sandra Ferry:

The Hudson Valley has been very dry this growing season but has seen some rain the last couple of weeks slowing corn and soybean harvest and fall plantings of small grains.

Essex County, Laura Mcdermott:

Several killing frost/freeze events have put an end to most field growing conditions. Tunnel production continues and garlic and winter onions are being planted.

Oneida County, William Paddock:

We had reports of 2.5 to 4 inches of rain received last week in the first part of the week over the course of 5 days. Winter wheat is planted and up. Producers are on the downswing of corn and soybeans needing to still be combined. The rain from last week will slow them down but weather looks excellent for this week, hopefully they will be able finish. Pastures are done and supplemental feeding is going on for any animals that are still outside. Pastures that have had a lot of rest, over 100 days, are looking pretty good.

Ontario County, Joann Rogers:

Ontario County continues with fall harvest; some rain received during the week but most days harvest continued.

Schuyler/ Seneca Counties, Kathy Mastellar:

Crop harvest continued with only a couple of days of rain.

Suffolk County, Alice V Wise:

Most vineyards on Long Island finished harvest this week. Bird netting is now being removed from vines. Equipment is being cleaned and winterized.
