Poor Week for Field Work: New York had an average of 2 days suitable for field work. Many areas throughout the state experienced snow and/or rain throughout the week. Several locations that reported snowfall experienced severe winter weather conditions, with snow accumulation reaching upwards of 2 feet in the heaviest hit areas. Despite the precipitation, some areas were still listed as being in a D1 "moderate drought" or D2 "severe drought" category under the U.S. Drought Monitoring system. Soybean harvest is nearly complete, however, corn for grain still needs to be harvested in several counties throughout the Empire State. Winter wheat continued to be reported as looking excellent. Grape growers were cleaning and winterizing equipment. Field activities for the week included harvesting, repair and maintenance/winterization of equipment.

REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

Broome County; Maria Heath:

Snowfall amounts varied in the county ranging from a few inches to 2 feet in some parts, and the warmer temperatures and rain has mostly melted. We still have some fields of grain corn waiting to be harvested.

Cayuga County; Keith Severson, Cornell Coop Extension Cayuga:

Snow on Sunday 11/20 stopped everything, and any leftover soybeans are probably wildlife feed. Corn is going to be tough to get harvested from here on out. Crows are having a field day.

Chemung/Cortland/Tioga/Tompkins Counties; Janice Degni:

Grain harvest came to a swift halt due to the abrupt change from unseasonably warm summer weather, to hard winter weather and a heavy snow storm. The southern counties only had a few inches, while Whitney Point and northern areas had a foot or more of snow. Corn is up to the ears in many fields.

Cortland/ Tompkins Counties; Jennifer Doty:

While most harvest is complete, heavy snowfall overtook the remaining fields. The snow is already melting, resulting in combines mudding through to get the rest of the crops.

Genesee/ Niagara/ Orleans Counties; Nathan R. Herendeen:

Still some grain corn to be harvested, showers have slowed progress. There is very little soy left to harvest. Some soy yields are turning out excellent despite the dry June-July and early August weather conditions. Winter wheat is looking excellent.

Livingston County; Dean R. Pendergast:

Operators are nearly finished with harvest.

Ontario Co.; Joann Rogers, County Executive Director FSA:

Ontario County received snow at the beginning of the week that put a halt to any harvesting and field work. Part of the county is in a D1-moderate drought and the other part is in a D2-severe drought, per the US drought monitor.

Schuyler/ Seneca Counties; Kathy Mastellar, CED, Seneca/Schuyler FSA:

Heavy snowfall on Monday halted corn harvest, and rain throughout the week hindered it more.

Suffolk County; Alice V. Wise:

Long Island grape growers are cleaning and winterizing equipment, removing blocks slated for replanting and making trellis repairs.
