June 4, 2017 New York Weekly Weather Summary

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

Broome County; Maria Heath:

Corn planting is way behind. First and second cutting going to be at the same time for some fields.

Cayuga County; Keith Severson, Cornell Coop Extension Cayuga:

Fields are at field capacity for water any additional rain will just run off

Cayuga County; Colleen Cargile, Cayuga County FSA:

Cayuga County received significant amounts of rain early in the week. Producers have voiced their concern about being behind on getting crops in, and possibly not getting crops in at all. Many acres still need to be tilled and planted. We are expecting to have many prevented planting claims.

Columbia/ Greene Counties; Matthew Forrest:

Cold, wet weather has continued and is preventing many fields from being planted timely. The cold, wet conditions have also slowed the emergence of corn and soybeans and prevented the timely harvesting of many forage crops. Many Alfalfa and grass hay fields are past the ideal time to harvest.

Cortland/ Tompkins Counties; Jennifer Doty:

More excessive rain. Three nice weather days in a row had farmers putting in long hours to catch up on planting and hay harvest. No dry hay yet, only haylage and bailage. Pastures are growing faster than animals can keep up, but muddy.

Fulton/ Hamilton/ Montgomery Counties; Andrew Michael:

Here in Tri County area of Eastern Central New York including Montgomery, Fulton and Hamilton Counties we continue in a mix of everything, with the weather being unstable. However, we did have a couple of days that hay was harvested and crops were planted. We are still behind on the corn and soybean planting. A lot of spring seeding are going to be shifted to late August.

Lewis County; Joe Lawrence:

Things started to dry out mid-week and some progress was made with first cutting though some ruts were left in hay fields. Corn planting continues but there are still many acres to be planted. Sunday night brought additional rain that looks to persist through the early part of the week.

Livingston County; Dean R Pendergast:

Hay harvest has progressed slowly with some additional planting completed late in the week.

Monroe/ Wayne Counties; Bruce Wadhams, Farm Service Agency:

Monday, we had over 2+" of rain between two thunder storms in the afternoon into late evening. The ground was just starting to get dry enough to work and then the rain hit.

Oneida County; Devon Kenny:

Temps were yet again very low for this time of year reaching mid to low 40's overnights and barely hit 70 during the day. There were several strong storms that blew through during the week with sporadic reports of hail and heavy winds though no crop damage reported. Excess precipitation combined with low temperatures remain an issue. Corn that is planted is emerging throughout the county. Time will tell if the excess rain will be an issue with how crops that have been planted mature.

Ontario County; Joann Rogers, County Executive Director FSA:

Ontario County experienced on and off rain showers. Delayed planting. Some areas experienced wash out in recent storm.

Oswego County; Ellen deMey:

A few dry days have enabled a bit more field work. Producers are far behind where they should be and are trying to balance the need to plant corn with the need to harvest hay. Many have indicated they will be unable to plant all acres that were intended.

Rensselaer/ Saratoga/ Warren/ Washington Counties; David Holck, USDA-Farm Service Agency:

Our wet weather pattern continues. An article in the Albany Times Union was titled "Rain holds farmers captive". According to the National Weather Service; during the month of May, there were 16 days when it rained, 7 cloudy days, and 8 partly cloudy days. Not much sunshine. Farmers continue to try to plant corn & harvest hay. Hay fields are being rutted up to get first cutting chopped. Some corn fields that have been planted have been too wet to have herbicide applied.

Schuyler/ Seneca Counties; Kathy Mastellar, CED, Seneca/Schuyler FSA:

Rain continues and once again delays planting.

Suffolk County; Alice V Wise:

Vineyards on Long Island are in the pre-bloom stage. Crews are shoot thinning vines to 4-5 shoots/ft. of row.
