<u>Good week for field work:</u> New York averaged 4.5 days suitable for field work last week.

Claims of prevented planting due to wet weather conditions in many areas throughout the state poured in. The average weekly temperatures ranged from 1 degree below normal to 10 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.00 to 3.12 inches. Producers worked to prevent washouts and continue planting in between strong thunderstorms and periods of warm, humid days. The break in rain helped corn and soybeans develop in areas where they had been planted but were slow to emerge. Strawberries were in harvest and u-pick operations were reported as getting ready to open. Long Island vineyards were blooming as crews worked to maintain air flow and light on crops.

June 18, 2017 New York Weekly Weather Summary

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

Broome County; Maria Heath:

Many acres of prevented planting being reported. Many acres of corn still being put in.

Cayuga County; Keith Severson, Cornell Coop Extension Cayuga:

Spotty rain developing has slowed progress.

Cayuga County; Colleen Cargile, Cayuga County FSA:

We finally got some dry, seasonal weather and many producers were able to get in a lot of acres of crops this past week. Although many producers have finally finished up planting, some still have quite a bit to go. There have been a lot of prevented planted acres reported in our county so far.

Columbia/ Greene Counties; Matthew Forrest:

Significantly more days were suitable for field work. A significant amount of planting that has not been done is now done. Certain fields have been prevented from being planted. Most of the hay Alfalfa and other is now done. The past few days has also helped the emergence and development of Corn and Soybeans many field of which had been planted previously but were very slow to emerge.

Fulton/ Hamilton/ Montgomery Counties; Andrew Michael:

Here in Tri County area of Eastern Central New York including: Montgomery, Fulton and Hamilton Counties, we continue with a real mix of weather conditions. However, crops are getting planted and a lot of corn and soybeans were "Prevented Planting." Haylage is being harvested with even some dry hay making it into the barns.

Livingston County; Dean R Pendergast:

Heavy rains on Thursday halted all field activity, planted crops and field work was progressing well up until that point.

Oneida County; Devon Kenny:

Conditions were very warm with high humidity and several strong thunderstorms with high winds and heavy downpours. A lot of haying and planting was done this week as the rain mostly held off. Corn and soybeans are continuing to be planted with some prevented acres being reported. Strawberries are just coming into harvest with u-pick operations opening mid-week.

Ontario County; Joann Rogers, County Executive Director FSA:

Ontario County experienced rain in the beginning of the week and then had flash flooding and down pouring rain on 06/15 that ranged from an inch to three inches of rain. Reports received of prevented planting, wash outs, flattened hay and wheat fields.

Oswego County; Ellen deMey:

Scattered rain showers once again plagued the county with some areas being harder hit than others. Many acres are still unplanted and first cutting hay has begun. Producers have indicated planting shorter day corn with hopes that it will mature in time to harvest this fall.

Rensselaer/ Saratoga/ Warren/ Washington Counties; David Holck, USDA-Farm Service Agency:

We had hot & windy conditions during the week, which helped corn emerge. A lot of hay was harvested during the week. A few farmers were able to start chopping 2nd cutting. Rains came again on Friday and fields that were too wet to plant, got wetter. There is still a lot of corn acreage that has not been planted and a lot of first cutting hay that has not been harvested.

Schuyler/ Seneca Counties; Kathy Mastellar, CED, Seneca/Schuyler FSA:

A few nice days allowed for field work, but then a couple of hard downpours stopped it. Prevented planted crops are being reported.

Suffolk County; Alice V Wise:

Long Island vineyards are in bloom. Vineyard crews were tucking shoots and adjusting trellis wires to ensure good air flow and light interception throughout the grapevine canopy.
