<u>Good week for field work:</u> New York averaged 4.5 days suitable for field work last week.

The average weekly temperatures ranged from four degrees below normal to seven degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.07 to 3.56 inches. Parts of New York had a break from rains but heavy rains returned in many areas towards the end of the week. Although this was seen as somewhat beneficial for corn and soybeans; it delayed hay, wheat, barley, and oat harvesting. Some of these storms had reports of hail. Vineyard crews on Long Island were hedging vines, removing shoot growth, and thinning clusters.

REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

Broome County; Maria Heath:

Storms moving through, dumping an inch at a time in some areas. Low spots still have water standing.

Cayuga County; Colleen Cargile, Cayuga County FSA:

Cayuga County has seen the longest stretch of dry weather in months. The warm and dry temperatures have really allowed the crops to grow tremendously in the past week and have allowed many farmers to harvest small grain crops like wheat and oats.

Chemung/ Cortland/ Tioga/ Tompkins Counties; Janice Degni:

We had a break from rain this week and high temperatures ranged from 80-90 degrees. Everything is growing. Also expecting rain this weekend.

Cortland/ Tompkins Counties; Jennifer Doty:

Wheat harvest began. Hay/haylage harvest is widely varied depending on field conditions and weather. Corn is either stunted due to excessive moisture, or looks great. Tassel and silk stages started. Pasture is still doing well with plenty of rain and cooler temperatures.

Essex County; David Reckahn:

Had a nice run of dry weather the end of last week (Friday, Saturday, and Sunday). There was a lot of dry hay down that got wet on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday and was ruined.

Genesee/ Niagara/ Orleans Counties; Nathan R Herendeen:

Rains have improved corn and soy prospects, but delayed hay, wheat, barley and oat harvest. Wheat is nearly done while oats & barley are losing quality as harvest is delayed. Preparation for August forage crops seedings should be underway, but is delayed by rains and lack of harvest of grains.

Lewis County; Joe Lawrence:

Heavy storms came through the central part of the county on Thursday with areas receiving 0.50 to 1.50 inches in about 30 minutes. A very narrow swath of the storm produced hail, leaving a few hundred acres of corn in a small area stripped by the hail.

Livingston County; Dean R Pendergast:

Wet cool weather continues while crops continue to advance slowly.

Oneida County; Devon Kenny:

Weather conditions have been stable this week with a few pop up showers, but no major downpours. Temperatures were hot at the beginning of the week, but cooled down considerably by the weekend. A lot of wheat was harvested for grain and straw this week and green beans have started to be harvested as well. Blueberry and raspberry season is in full swing. Hay is continuing to be spotty with not enough drying days in a row to get in a lot of dry hay.

Ontario County; Joann Rogers, County Executive Director FSA:

Ontario County received more off and on rain showers that resulted in struggles to make dry hay and harvest wheat. Fields are being rutted up on ground that is saturated.

Schuyler/ Seneca Counties; Kathy Mastellar, CED, Seneca/Schuyler FSA:

A few nice days, but then rain on Wednesday night and a heavy rain storm on Friday 8/4. Wheat harvest is done. Corn is starting to tassel.

Suffolk County; Alice V Wise:

Long Island vineyard crews are hedging vines, removing excess shoot growth, and thinning clusters to a desired crop level. Protective bird netting will be deployed in the coming weeks.
