<u>Good week for field work:</u> New York averaged 5.5 days suitable for field work.

Temperatures ranged from 3 degrees below to 8 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.01 to 1.87 inches, a slight decrease overall compared to the prior week. Rain in some areas slowed progress but overall the past week moved ahead as operators were able to continue with forage harvest, plantings, haylage, and other field work. The ground was reported as beginning to dry out in most areas which helped operations. Strawberries were nearing harvest with no major issues and shoots were progressing fast on Long Island vineyards as crews work to thin and disbud trunks.

Broome County; Maria Heath:

Corn planting has slowed to switch to chopping. Corn emerging.

Cayuga County; Colleen Cargile, Cayuga County FSA:

Much of the county received a good amount of rain this week, which put a halt on planting early on in the week. The ground is beginning to dry out now and people are getting back in the fields. I also observed many producers harvesting first cutting grass silage. Now that the ground is drying out, I anticipate a lot of ground will get planted between now and Sunday before the next rain comes.

Chautauqua County; Anna Emke-Walker:

Northern portion of the county received 4 inches of rain in 2 hours on Sunday, May 27th. It has been unusually wet for this time of year with extreme heat; record highs.

Clinton/ Essex Counties; Michael Basedow:

Many orchards are now past petal fall.

Cortland/ Tompkins Counties; Jennifer Doty:

All field work continues at full speed. First cutting has finished for some; yield is light due to late spring.

Genesee/ Niagara/ Orleans Counties; Nathan R Herendeen:

This past week's activity included hay crop silage harvest, corn and soy planting, and weed spraying. Crops are growing FAST with adequate moisture in soil and above normal heat. Hay crop silage yields are good. Quality excellent!

Livingston County; Dean R Pendergast:

A good week of farming. Field and crop conditions are favorable overall.

Madison County; Jessica Pylman:

Many farms are finishing up their corn and have started working on hay. Soybean plantings are also on going. Rainfall had been very scattered but over all seems like almost everyone in the county had been hit by some of these showers, none of which seems to set any field plans back too much.

Oneida County; Devon Kenny:

Weather has been dryer than normal. Warm temps and dry weather have made for excellent conditions for planting. Producers continue to struggle to catch up after the late spring and with first cutting coming on it has been difficult to get everything done on time. Soybeans are going in as well as the first green beans. First cutting has come off in places with a lot of it going to haylage. Strawberries are almost ready to begin harvest as well with no issues this year with any late frosts.

Ontario County; Joann Rogers, County Executive Director FSA:

Ontario County experienced some rain earlier in the week but the remainder of the week was warm and dry, which resulted in the harvesting of alfalfa haylage and planting continued that later part of the week.

Oswego County; Ellen deMey:

Lots of ground has been worked as a result of the warm, dry weather. Corn and beans are up and look good. Pastures are greening up and some hay has been chopped.

Schuyler/ Seneca Counties; Kathy Mastellar, CED, Seneca/Schuyler FSA:

One day of solid rain Tuesday halted corn planting. Forage harvest is progressing.

Suffolk County; Alice V Wise:

Shoots are growing rapidly in Long Island vineyards thanks to warm sunny weather. Vineyard crews are shoot thinning and disbudding trunks.
