<u>Good week for field work:</u> New York averaged 5.5 days suitable for field work.

Temperatures ranged from 1 degree to 8 degrees below normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.02 to 1.54 inches. Field conditions were dryer this past week in many areas and slightly cooler. Only a few places reported heavy thundershowers and wet conditions. Corn was reported as almost completely planted and soybeans were being planted. Emergence has been problematic in a few areas but reports on small grains and crops have been generally positive. Producers also made significant progress on alfalfa. Strawberries were near harvest and blooms on Long Island vineyards were just about to begin as crews tended to wires to hold shoots upright.

### **REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County**

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

#### **Broome County; Maria Heath:**

Still trying to get corn in as some ground is still quite wet. Some areas have been hit hard with thundershowers making it difficult for things to dry out.

#### Cayuga County; Colleen Cargile, Cayuga County FSA:

Cooler weather in the beginning of the week has given way to warm, dry weather. During this stretch of weather, many producers will be finishing up planting crops and chopping hay.

# Chemung/ Cortland/ Tioga/ Tompkins Counties; Janice Degni:

Crops just look great this year. Even though we had a late spring, a few warm days and adequate moisture supported rapid germination and good growth. The same can be said for weeds. That is the concern of the moment in field crops, controlling weeds in the annual row crops. Hay harvest is going well. Most clear alfalfa harvested. Any grass for dairy has been harvested. Grasses heading and still great for beef and other livestock. Small grains look great although there is disease pressure. Soybean and summer annual forages being planted. We've had enough rain to feed the crops but not excessive. The predicted temperatures this week should keep things growing, and weed control, hay harvest moving.

#### Clinton/ Essex Counties; Michael Basedow:

Rainy and wet conditions early in the week were followed by warm sunny days.

#### Genesee/ Niagara/ Orleans Counties; Nathan R Herendeen:

Everything needs rain. This area did not receive recent rains. Planting the last of corn and soy into dry soils. Poor emergence. Wheat is pollinated.

#### Livingston County; Dean R Pendergast:

Crops are advancing well. Many producers have completed planting or will be completed by weeks end. A nice rain would benefit all.

#### **Oneida County; Devon Kenny:**

Weather has been dryer than usual with field conditions great for planting and dry hay. Much of the county was busy making dry hay this weekend. Strawberries are almost ready to harvest and small grains are looking good. Corn and soybeans are up and looking good. If weather continues to be dry, it may become an issue but right now crops are growing well.

## Ontario County; Joann Rogers, County Executive Director FSA:

Ontario County experienced some rain at the beginning of the week; winter wheat has headed out and is short in height. Planting of crops and harvest of haylage continues throughout the county.

## Rensselaer/ Saratoga/ Warren/ Washington Counties; David Holck, USDA-Farm Service Agency:

The last 6 weeks have been dry with a few showers. Farmers have been able to plant corn and harvest hay & haylage. We are much further ahead of where we were a year ago at this time.

# Schuyler/ Seneca Counties; Kathy Mastellar, CED, Seneca/Schuyler FSA:

The rain we had Sunday through Tuesday and cool cloudy weather on Wed slowed planting. Most corn is all planted and soybeans are being planted. Heavy rain one day the week before may result in some soybean replanting.

#### Suffolk County; Alice V Wise:

Bloom will start very soon in Long Island vineyards. Vineyard crews are lifting wires to hold shoots upright in order to create a narrow wall of canopy.
