Issued weekly on the internet, April - November by the Northeastern Regional Field Office of NASS

Fair week for field work: New York averaged 3.5 days suitable for field work.

Temperatures ranged from 4 degrees below to 4 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.00 to 2.30. As drought conditions have slowly decreased in the state with the exception of the northeastern most counties, increased rains and moderate temperatures helped crops improve overall. Only a few areas reported issues with showers and moisture related to vegetable crops. Corn and soybeans made a comeback from the previous weeks' overly dry conditions. Only oats were reported as being behind in some areas. Many wrapped up the third cutting of hay and alfalfa and grasses were planted. Apple harvest was reported as being positive. Long Island vineyard crews worked to set bird netting. Red grape varieties were progressing slower than normal.

Broome County; Maria Heath:

Producers were having problems with vegetable crops with heavy foliage as it is holding the moisture in and causing spoilage.

Cayuga County; Colleen Cargile, Cayuga County FSA:

Apple harvest is now in full swing for the earlier varieties of apples. It appears that there is going to be a good crop. Corn and soybeans are looking good and everyone is just about finished up with the third cutting of hay.

Delaware County; Mariane Kiraly, Cornell Cooperative Extension:

Land is still wet but some hay/haylage went in last week.

Genesee/ Niagara/ Orleans Counties; Nathan R Herendeen:

Rains have made a great, positive difference. Too late for much of the silage corn, but it helped grain corn. The rains have also been very positive on soybeans, new growth and new blossoms. Hay crops have rebounded with new grass growth. New alfalfa and grass seedings planted. Preparation for winter wheat underway.

Oneida County; Devon Kenny:

Weather has continued to be seasonable with some storms and very humid conditions, making dry hay difficult. Corn and soybeans are coming back well after the early drought. Grass hay is coming back as well. Green beans are being harvested on schedule. Oats are a bit late and some are reporting they are very light.

Schuyler/ Seneca Counties; Kathy Mastellar, CED, Seneca/Schuyler FSA:

We had brief showers a couple of days this week with milder temperatures.

Suffolk County; Alice V Wise:

Long Island vineyard crews are busy with application of bird netting. Ripening is progressing well though it is slightly later than normal in the red varieties.
