<u>Good week for field work:</u> New York averaged 5.5 days suitable for field work.

Temperatures ranged from 1 to 12 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.00 to 1.31, a decrease from prior week at 2.38. While normal conditions persisted for much of the state, some of the far northeastern counties slipped into D2 severe drought from D1 moderate drought conditions according to the U.S. Drought Monitor. Parts of Franklin, Essex, and Hamilton counties were affected the most. Hay and silage harvest remained underway throughout the state. Operators also prepared for wheat planting and looked to positive weather conditions for corn and soybean harvest with expectations to start early in areas. Only a few counties mentioned they were concerned about rain and the sudden drop in temperatures. Long Island vineyards prepared for harvested fruit for sparkling wines while ripening accelerated.

REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

Chemung/ Cortland/ Tioga/ Tompkins Counties; Janice Degni:

August has been a supportive month for crop development. Regular rain has made a beautiful soybean crop. We are on the cusp of corn silage harvest. A few acres have been harvested or green chopped to feed the cows where the bunks were empty but I expected widespread chopping to start this week. Monday; September 10th, is a rainy cold day so that may slow things a bit. There is fair amount of late planted corn that lacks a significant number of growing degrees to reach maturity. We just changed this past weekend from supportive weather with hot days and warm muggy nights to cold nights (40- 50 degrees) and cooler days. Time will tell how if the later corn will reach maturity. Recent 2nd, 3rd or 4th hay harvests have yielded excellently. The rains supported excellent regrowth. Quality for most will be good also.

Genesee/ Niagara/ Orleans Counties; Nathan R Herendeen:

Some hay harvest and hay crop silage harvest continuing. Preparation for wheat planting was underway and will start end of this coming week, weather dependent. Corn silage harvest will be starting full force this week. Soybeans maturing rapidly. Will be an early start to harvest.

Lewis County; Joe Lawrence:

It was a good week for corn to dry down and hay to be harvested. Corn silage harvest will be ramping up as weather permits.

Livingston County; Dean R Pendergast:

Silage harvest has started on a small scale at this point. Corn maturity is advancing rapidly, some soybean acreage is starting to drop leaves.

Oneida County; Devon Kenny:

Conditions have been very hot switching to chilly. Temps went from 80's to 40's overnight. Heavy rain and wind is expected today from the hurricane. Conditions continue to be difficult for making any dry hay. Corn is drying down and soybeans are turning yellow. Wheat has begun to be planted and green beans are continuing to be harvested.

Ontario County; Joann Rogers, County Executive Director FSA:

Fall harvest continues throughout Ontario County with fall tillage and spreading manure under way, as well.

Schuyler/ Seneca Counties; Kathy Mastellar, CED, Seneca/Schuyler FSA:

Very hot weather the first part of the week, then some rain & cooler at the end. Some headlands have been opened on corn and harvested is expected to start at the end of the month.

Suffolk County; Alice V Wise:

Continued warm temperatures accelerated ripening in Long Island vineyards. Fruit for sparkling wine will be harvested in the coming weeks.
