<u>Good week for field work:</u> New York averaged 5.5 days suitable for field work.

Temperatures ranged from 2 to 9 degrees above normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from 0.05 to 5.47. The most recent indications from the U.S. Drought Monitor had Franklin and Hamilton counties in the upper northeastern part of the state classified with D2 Severe Drought and D0 Abnormally Dry to D1 Moderate Drought conditions for the surrounding counties. Additionally, D0 Abnormally Dry conditions were also indicated for Orleans, Niagara, and Erie counties to the far west. The majority of the rest of the state was within normal levels and this has been the predominant pattern for the past few weeks. Some counties in the south central part of the state received heavy rains and flooding with concern for the corn, soybean, and vegetable crops while fall harvest was very active and early in other areas with ideal conditions. Some counties had reported higher than average yields so far on corn. Soybean harvesting progressed in some areas but at a smaller scale. Winter wheat planting and dry bean harvesting was also underway.

REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

Broome County; Maria Heath:

Flooding occurred in part of the county. Rain amounts varied between 1 and 5 inches. Mostly affected were soybeans, corn, and vegetables and pumpkins. Corn being chopped on gravel ground.

Cayuga County; Colleen Cargile, Cayuga County FSA:

Fall harvest is in full swing. Corn silage harvest especially, but some producers have also begun to harvest some of the earlier varieties of soybeans and I have even seen a couple of fields of corn harvested for grain. Many producers are also working on getting their winter wheat crop in. The weather conditions have been ideal for harvesting and planting of fall crops.

Livingston County; Dean R Pendergast:

Corn silage harvest continues. Dry bean harvesting began in sections of the county. Soybean harvest continues on a small scale at this point. Grain corn harvest may be early in some areas. Wheat planting continues but limited acres thus far.

Oneida County; Devon Kenny:

Weather has been seasonable with a few warmer than usual days. Temps are reaching into the low 40's overnight but no frost yet. Corn silage has begun with many people chopping throughout the county. Some dry hay is continuing but shorter days and cold nights make drying difficult. Soybeans are dropping leaves but not dry enough to combine yet. Corn grain is expected to begin this week or next.

Rensselaer/ Saratoga/ Warren/ Washington Counties; David Holck, USDA-Farm Service Agency:

We received around .75 inch of rain during the week. Corn silage harvest is underway on most farms. Yields have been above average for most producers.

Schuyler/ Seneca Counties; Kathy Mastellar, CED, Seneca/Schuyler FSA:

Corn & some soybeans are starting to be harvested.
