<u>Fair week for field work:</u> New York averaged 3.0 days suitable for field work.

Cold temperatures set in ranging from 3 to 10 degrees below normal. Weekly precipitation ranged from .49 to 2.32 inches. Abnormally dry conditions for the upper northeastern counties remained constant while wet, saturated ground continued to give many operations throughout the remainder of the state setbacks to planting winter wheat and cover crops as well as harvesting corn and soybeans. Mold on soybeans had some worried. Prevented planting claims on winter wheat increased over the previous week. Long Island vineyards began to wrap up harvest as growers focused on red varieties primarily.

REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

Broome County; Maria Heath:

Ground saturated.

Cayuga County; Colleen Cargile, Cayuga County FSA:

The cold, wet fall weather continues. Most people that did not get their fall grains planted have given up at this time, as they feel it is getting to late to plant and the fields are still too wet. In addition, there are still quite a few acres of corn and soybeans in the field to be harvested. Producers are hoping for some drier weather so that they can get their crops in before the snow flies. However, it does not appear that the dry weather will be coming any time soon since more rain is predicted for this weekend.

Cortland/ Tompkins Counties; Jennifer Doty:

A couple nice days to push field work before more incessant rain. Some fall tillage was started. Corn and soybean harvest continues as weather permits.

Delaware County; Mariane Kiraly, Cornell Cooperative Extension:

Extreme wet conditions kept farmers off fields for the most part.

Genesee/ Niagara/ Orleans Counties; Nathan R Herendeen:

Continuing grain corn and soybean harvest. Last of corn silage and hay crop silage. Some late wheat planting and cover crop planting. Weather has been intermittently good or wet.

Livingston County; Dean R Pendergast:

The week started out well for harvest but once again the weather turned with heavy rain over the weekend. Yields have been reported as good for harvested crops.

Ontario County; Joann Rogers, County Executive Director FSA:

Ontario County continues with fall harvest and fall field work between rain showers.

Suffolk County; Alice V Wise:

Harvest is winding down in Long Island vineyards. Growers picked reds such as Cabernet Sauvignon this past week.

Yates County; Amy Parmelee, Farm Service Agency

It continues to be too wet for much work to get done. There is a fair number of acres of prevented planting on wheat. Soybeans are now starting to mold due to cold and wet conditions
