Poor week for field work: New York averaged 2.0 days suitable for field work.

Temperatures ranged from 3 to 14 degrees below normal and weekly precipitation ranged from .28 to 2.92 inches throughout the state. As the season is wrapping up; wet, snowy conditions of the past week prevented several operators from harvesting while vineyards on Long Island cleaned and winterized equipment. Harvest concerns lingered among crop producers regarding whether harvest would be able to be completed as many areas were impacted with heavy snowfalls. Winter wheat planting was completed.

REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County

Reporters are from Extension Service (Ext), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Farm Service Agency (FSA), Conservation District (CD), farmers, commodity specialists, or other knowledgeable individuals.

Broome County; Maria Heath:

Several hundred acres of grain corn still standing as it is too wet to get to it. Wet, heavy snow fell this week.

Cayuga County; Colleen Cargile, Cayuga County FSA:

Copious amounts of snow fell in much of CNY on Friday 11/16. This has only made the already delayed and troublesome harvest even more difficult. There are still quite a few acres of corn and soybeans that need to be harvested. The temperatures are supposed to remain cold for the next 4 or 5 days, which means the snow won't be going away any time soon. With the combination of the snow and the saturated, unfrozen ground; very little, if any, harvest will likely be completed within the next week.

Cortland/ Tompkins Counties: Jennifer Doty:

Excessive snow has halted harvest. Corn harvest will resume, soybeans are currently under snow.

Delaware County; Mariane Kiraly, Cornell Cooperative Extension:

An early foot of snow added to misery with wet fields and poor harvest weather for late crops.

Genesee/ Niagara/ Orleans Counties; Nathan R Herendeen:

Weather continues to be a challenge. Either too rainy or light snow. One day was cold enough and dry enough to see a little soy and grain corn harvest being done. Yields have been very good.

Lewis County; Joe Lawrence:

Significant snowfall occurred this week with most areas currently having 8 to 12 inches of snow cover.

Livingston County; Dean R Pendergast:

Slow progress for the week due to continued wet weather. Heavy snow at the end of the week will cause longer delays for harvest. Great concern for the remaining soybean acres with the snow. Safe to say, winter wheat planting is done.

Monroe/ Wayne Counties; Bruce Wadhams, Farm Service Agency:

Wayne County received 12" of heavy wet snow last night.

Ontario County; Joann Rogers, County Executive Director FSA:

Ontario County received rain at the beginning of the week and then snow at the end of the week making fall harvest of corn and soybeans challenging.

Rensselaer/ Saratoga/ Warren/ Washington Counties; David Holck, USDA-Farm Service Agency:

On Friday our counties received around 6 inches of snow. There are still a lot of corn and soybeans that need to be harvested. Most farmers are reporting above average yields, the challenge is getting the crops out of the fields and into the bins.

Schuyler/ Seneca Counties; Kathy Mastellar, CED, Seneca/Schuyler FSA:

Sunday & Monday were good for harvesting even though the fields are wet. Snow Tue & Wed and then a heavy snow Thursday night & Friday morning have halted harvest completely.

Steuben County; Jamie Earl:

The area was hit with 10 plus inches of snow. This will make it difficult to harvest remaining standing crops on already saturated fields.

Suffolk County; Alice V Wise:

With harvest completed, Long Island vineyard crews are removing bird netting as well as cleaning and winterizing equipment.
