General: Limited precipitation and above normal temperatures across the state allowed for good small grain harvest progress, according to the USDA, National Agricultural Statistics Service, North Dakota Field Office. Most of the state was dry last week with the southwest district receiving the majority of the precipitation. The warm temperatures were beneficial to the late season crop development. Topsoil moisture supplies were rated 1 percent very short, 35 short, 62 adequate and 2 surplus compared with the five-year (2004-2008) average of 15 percent very short, 26 short, 55 adequate and 4 surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies were rated 2 percent very short, 33 short, 64 adequate and 1 surplus compared with the average of 19 percent very short, 28 short, 50 adequate and 3 surplus. Statewide, on average, there were 6.4 days suitable for fieldwork last week.

Crops: The small grain harvest made good progress last week with all small grain crops gaining over 15 percentage points toward completion. Durum wheat harvest advanced 17 percentage points to 26 percent complete, compared with 73 percent last year and 72 percent on average. Spring wheat harvest, at 44 percent complete, progressed 22 percentage points from the previous week but remained behind last year and the average. Barley and oats were 74 and 66 percent harvested, respectively. Durum and spring wheat turning neared completion at 97 and 98 percent, respectively. Reporters noted that the late harvest had led to lodging in some fields.

Crop development of all other crops was aided by the above normal temperatures, but still remained behind last year and the average. Corn in the dough stage advanced 29 percentage points to 59 percent complete. Soybeans fully podded advanced 36 percentage points to 86 percent complete, behind last year and the average. Canola swathed, at 74 percent, was more than two weeks behind the average. Canola harvest reached 26 percent complete by week's end, compared with 50 percent last year and 68 percent on average. Dry edible beans in the fully podded stage advanced 23 percentage points to 76 percent complete. Dry edible pea harvest gained 25 percentage points to 93 percent complete by week's end. The sunflower crop had 46 percent of their acreage in the ray flowers dried/dropped and beyond stage. Twenty-two percent of the potatoes had their vines killed, behind 51 percent last year and average. Crop condition ratings for all other crops declined last week except for flaxseed which showed an increase.

Livestock: Haying was aided by the above normal, dry temperatures last week, although reporters commented that dry conditions in some areas has led to higher fire risk. The second cutting of alfalfa was 91 percent complete. The hay crop condition was rated 2 percent very poor, 5 poor, 25 fair, 56 good and 12 excellent. Pasture and range conditions were rated 1 percent very poor, 6 poor, 32 fair, 56 good and 5 excellent compared with last year when conditions were rated 16 percent very poor, 20 poor, 30 fair, 30 good and 4 excellent. Stockwater supplies were rated 95 percent adequate to surplus, compared with 52 percent last year and 65 percent on average.

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
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

Weather: Temperatures were above normal across most of the state with near normal temperatures in the southeast. Precipitation was near normal in parts of the southwest and below normal elsewhere. Monday was dry with highs in the mid-70s to mid-80s. There were a few showers and thunderstorms in the southwest on Tuesday with highs in the mid-70s to mid-80s. A few showers continued in the southwest on Wednesday with highs in the 70s to 80s. Thursday was mainly dry with highs in the 70s to mid-80s. Highs on Friday were in the mid-70s to low 90s with dry conditions. Dry conditions continued on Saturday and Sunday with highs in the 80s to mid-90s. Dry conditions continued in the north central through the southeast area of the state with moderate drought conditions in parts of the east central region.

Outlook, Sept. 7-13: Temperatures will be near normal across the state this upcoming week. Precipitation will be near to above normal. Above normal temperatures will persist through the first half of the week with below normal temperatures the rest of the week. The best chance for significant precipitation will occur early in the week. Monday started off with highs in the mid-70s to 80s with showers and thunderstorms in the central and west. There were some severe thunderstorms in the southwest on Monday with damaging winds and large hail. There will be a chance of showers and thunderstorms across the state on Tuesday with highs in the upper 60s to low 80s. There will also be a chance of severe thunderstorms in the south and east on Tuesday. Wednesday will be dry with highs in the 70s to low 80s. Dry conditions will continue on Thursday with highs in the mid-60s to mid-70s with a chance of showers and thunderstorms across much of the state. There will be a chance of showers on Saturday and Sunday with highs in the mid-60s to low 70s.
