Fair Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 4 days suitable for field work. The weather for the state this past week while within the normal ranges for this time of year was a stark contrast to the unusually warm weather of the past couple of weeks. Many fruit producers are waiting to see if the two mornings of frost during this week will have any effect on this year's upcoming crop. Farm activities for the week included field preparation, manure hauling, and equipment maintenance for the upcoming planting season.

Crop Progress: The year's oats crop is 36% planted, ahead of the 0% at this time last year, and the five-year average of 17%; with 6% emerged. Peaches are 93% in the pink with 74% in full-bloom. Apples are 66% in the pink.

<u>Crop Condition:</u> State-wide winter wheat conditions are; 0% very poor, 1% poor, 8% fair, 55% good, and 36% excellent. Pasture conditions are; 2% very poor, 5% poor, 27% fair, 55% good and 11% excellent.

Nationwide as of March 18, 2012: While mild, near-normal temperatures were evident throughout much of the West, above average temperatures continued to blanket areas of the country from the Great Plains eastward. Most notably, recordings more than 20 degrees above normal dominated much of the Great Lakes region, northern Corn Belt, Ohio Valley, and Northeast, promoting a rapid pace for planting and small grain development. A strong, slow-moving storm system dumped precipitation on the central

and southern Great Plains, as well as much of the Delta. Total accumulations exceeded 400 percent of normal in isolated locations, leading to some lowland flooding.

Dry weather and above average temperatures persisted across much of Florida, providing producers ample time to prepare and plant fields. Corn planting was well underway in northern Florida where field conditions warranted. Vegetable producers continued to harvest their winter crop in some areas, while spring varieties were planted in others. Market movement included cabbage, cucumbers, peppers, sweet corn, and tomatoes. Valencia bloom was heavy across the citrus-producing region, with varying stages of bloom evident in other citrus crops. Orchard growers were busy applying herbicides, disking, irrigating, and caring for young trees.

A wet week delivered much-needed rainfall to most of Texas during the week, with total accumulations exceeding 5 inches in portions of the Blacklands and along the Louisiana border. Temperatures were near-normal across much of the State. The developing oat and wheat crops benefitted from the recent moisture, with an improvement reported in crop conditions. However, some problems with powdery mildew, rust, and armyworms were evident in winter wheat as producers scouted fields. Field preparation for corn and cotton was ongoing in the High Plains, while fields in other areas of the State were being planted. Soybean and sunflower producers were also preparing to plant. Fruit trees were in full bloom and pecan trees were budding. Pecan producers in some areas were applying nitrogen fertilizer to their orchards.

REPORTERS COMMENTS, By County

ADAMS COUNTY, Judy A. Behney

Adams County had an interesting week of weather. Tuesday was 22 degrees with some wind and heavy frost and warmed to 50's daytime. Wednesday morning was 44 and sunny with some rain showers after lunch but sun returned and was in high 60's. Thursday was 51 morning temperature but cloudy and got to 60 with some wind. Friday morning was 30 degrees and sunny but no wind. Friday evening thunderstorms in the county and Sat/Sun had another inch of rainfall. The fruit growers are concerned about the cold temperatures we had on Tuesday and Friday of this week. All fruit is in blossom except apples which is not a good time to have cold temperatures. Time will tell on outcome of the cold temperatures. Producers are getting back into fields after last weekend's rainfall. Field preparation, manure hauling, etc, are being done. Oats are still being seeded when conditions permit. Oats seeded earlier are now emerged and growing. Wheat and barley are growing now with warm temperatures and sunny days. Some looks good and some doesn't look too good. Hay crops are beginning to grow also. Overall, the producers are busy readying equipment for spring planting season which isn't too far away.

BRADFORD COUNTY, Keith Kline

Activity has been on river and creek flats; most hill ground is still too wet to work. Maple syrup producers have had a couple good runs.

CENTRE COUNTY, Dick Decker

Cool overcast week 1/2 inch rainfall. Some field work continued.

CENTRE COUNTY, Tim Craul

Central PA is currently running about a 3 inch rainfall deficit. Conditions have been such that we are ahead in field tillage operations. Not much has been planted due to the chance of a hard frost that we did receive a couple of nights last week.

CLARION COUNTY, Tom Tanner

The frost on March 27th and 30th damaged many of the fruit blossoms. Many farmers are preparing soil for spring planting. Have been hearing of oats and new seedings being planted in the past week. The wheat crop is off to an excellent start. Many farmers applying nutrients and spray to the crop.

COLUMBIA COUNTY, Dave Reedy

There was a freeze this week that could affect the peach crop. Temperatures below freezing in late March are normal but the above normal temperatures late winter and early spring has blooms well ahead of schedule. Now we're waiting to see the effects.

CRAWFORD COUNTY, Ron McCorkle (NRCS)

Weather conditions have been good around the county for doing some tillage, lime and manure spreading, and general maintenance. It is nice to see cattle out in the pastures grazing the new spring growth.

FRANKLIN COUNTY, Thomas Kerr

Early spring this year; fruit is about three weeks early. Peaches past full bloom and apples are about ready to bloom. Good pasture conditions. Soil moisture is near normal, but could be a bit warmer before planting any corn. No immediate damage from frost and freezes this past week, but still too early to determine the extent of loss on the peaches.

MERCER COUNTY, James P. Rust

The Amish in our area are done with spring plowing. The Amish are about 80% complete in planting spring oats. Many of the area apple and peach orchards are watching for any freeze damage to the blossoms last Tuesday morning - March 27th. Area farmers are busy plowing, chisel plowing, vertical tillage applications and completing spring field work such as planting oats.

SNYDER COUNTY, William C. Sheaffer

Two major freezes this week caused setbacks with the rapidly growing hay crop. The early seeded oats have emerged, and the winter grains are looking very good. There were a variety of field activities during the week with manure spreading being the predominant activity. Now waiting on the rain to come in.

SUSQUEHANNA COUNTY, Willie Keeney

Seasonal temperatures have returned. Some rain showers during the week were a welcome site.

TIOGA COUNTY, Pamela Barnes

Farmers are busy hauling manure, spreading lime, and fixing equipment. Received some much needed rain Saturday and in to Sunday. Monday morning brought the return to sunshine.

WESTMORELAND COUNTY, John Lohr

Two weeks of 70 plus degree weather have the season about a month ahead of normal. Unfortunately this week, two mornings of below freezing temperatures have almost certainly damaged fruits and berries. Grass growth has been excellent.
