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Crop Progress (in %):

Good Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 4.5 days suitable for field work this week. Fieldwork is still hindered by rain and heavy soils. Fruit trees are mostly in bloom with reported winter damage to cherries. Most fruit trees were fully bloomed by this point last year. Corn is continuing to be planted with some fields already emerging. Some farmers are starting to burn down their cover crops and cut rye for forage for livestock. Corn and soybean planting will soon be in full swing. This upcoming week's weather is looking very wet with at least a 30% chance of showers and scattered thunderstorms every day. Temperatures will still be warm though with a high's in the mid 80's and overnight lows in the upper 50's.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Corn and soybeans are being planted in the county as soil conditions have improved this week with warmer weather and sunshine/breezes that have dried out the fields. Still wet in some areas but better soil is allowing producers to plant. Small grains and hay are growing and getting greener and taller as the warmer temperatures and sunshine. Pastures are also growing. Fruit blossoms are still pretty scenery if you are in the fruit part of our county. Cherry producers are expecting a severe loss on their crop this year due mostly to cold temperatures in April when the cherries were pushing buds. Also, other early blooming fruit crops such as Apricot, Plums will have a loss due to cold temperatures in April. Apples appear to be ok for now but that may change as year continues. Penn State put out bulletin about Stink Bugs starting to emerge and other insects also so fruit growers are kept busy spraying as needed for their fruit crops. Scab is also trying to be controlled by spraying. Vegetables are being planted throughout the county. Strawberries are blooming but are going to be later than normal for harvest. Overall all the farmers are busy readying for 2014 planting season and hoping we get some rain this summer when crops are needing it.

ADAMS County, Lee Showalter

Peaches are now petalfall approaching shuck split Apples are mostly beyond full bloom running 5-7 days later than normal. Pollinating weather has been adequate.

ADAMS/FRANKLIN County, Thomas Kerr

Normal week. Apples in full bloom. Some varieties may be reduced in some blocks but overall a very good crop at this time. Peaches are good as well. Cherries are most significantly damaged, with at least 50 to 75% loss. Some rye being cut for forage this week.

CAMBRIA County, Dolly Little

Finishing up oats, planting corn and potatoes were the main activities this week.

CENTRE County, Dick A. Decker

Great week for field work. 0.1 inches of rain fall.

CLARION/VENANGO/FOREST/WARREN County, Tom Tanner

Many acres of new seedings, oats, soybean, triticale, and corn planted this week.

COLUMBIA/LACKAWANNA/LUZERNE/MONTOUR County, C. John Esslinger

The cherry crop is very poor due to winter damage. The peach crop has been reduced, especially north of I-80. The apple crop looks good, so far.

INDIANA County, C. John Esslinger

Finished up the oasts last week. Now working on finishing the plowing. Now gearing up to plant some corn. Hope everyone has a safe week farming.

JUNIATA/SNYDER County, William C. Sheaffer

A very good week for field activities. Corn planting, spraying, field preparations were the norm. All crops are looking good at this point.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Many acres of corn and soybean were planted last week. Lots of ryelage cut between showers last week as well.

LEBANON County, Charlene Ziegler

Corn was planted in fields that were dry enough. Many fields are still very wet. A few farmers planted soybeans. Ryelage was harvested. Cover crops continue to be burned down.

MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield

Planting continues to be delayed due to less than ideal planting conditions on the heavier soils in the area. Lots of spraying to burn down fields for planting some corn planting by late week. More rain over the weekend set planting back even more. Livestock have been put out on pasture and hayfields have grown considerably in the past week. Warmer weather has arrived now it depends on where the showers and thunderstorms hit if farmers can get in the fields to plant.

SCHUYLKILL County, Kelly Sundy

Barley producers have begun phoning the office regarding burndown of their barley acreage. A significant amount of barley acreage will not be taken to harvest but will be killed off and planted to most likely corn.

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
