**Good Week for Field Work:** Pennsylvania had an average of 4.5 days suitable for field work last week.

Temperatures reported with an average of 56(F) with a high of 83(F) and a low of 24(F). Despite some reported rains, last week was considerably drier than the previous week allowing for many more field work opportunities such as seeding of alfalfa, oats and barely as well as corn despite cool soil temperatures. Other activities included burn down and herbicide application in addition to continued tilling and manure spreading.

# **ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney**

Adams County had a pretty nice week of weather. Monday was in the 70's and sunny and Tuesday had some rain. Wednesday was pretty nice day but then Thursday has some rain evening into this morning. Most mornings started in high 40's to 50 and daytime into 60's and days with sunshine 70's. Fieldwork was getting done beginning of week then halted for some rainy conditions then now getting back into the fields. Some producers are ready to start planting corn when conditions permit. Some producers got their spring forage crops seeded and some oats past few weeks. Hay and wheat is pretty much done being top dressed this spring and looking greener as the days get warmer and sun is out. Fruit growers are in their busy time now with buds appearing and some pushing. Stone fruit blossoms are susceptible to brown rot and scab during warm wet weather and spraying occurring. We're experiencing a scab infection period April 17. Warm, wet weather also is a threat for stone fruit blossoms that are open. Cherries and pears, apricots are about to bloom if not blooming already. Vegetable growers are also busy tending to their plantings and additional crops being planted. All producers are hoping the cold temperatures are done because of what it can do to their crops. Overall farm producers are all busy with fieldwork and also with their livestock operations.

# **ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr**

Weather has been suitable for most field work, but soil is still cool. Planting corn and alfalfa well under way as most soils are dry enough. Other activities included spreading manure and fertilizer. Some early fruit varieties now in full bloom, but still a threat for frost.

#### **BEAVER County, Luke Fritz**

Very little field work completed.

# **CAMBRIA** County, Dolly Little

Great to see the sun and more activities out in the field. Some conventional spring plowing, chisel plowing, manure spreading, oats and spring barley planting.

#### **CENTRE County, Dick A Decker**

Oats and alfalfa seeding under way between showers. Grass is greening up. Slow start to spring 2015.

### CLARION/FOREST/VENANGO/WARREN, Tom Tanner

Some tillage taken place for spring oats and planting of new grass seedings.

# **CRAWFORD** County, Ron McCorkle

There was some tillage started towards the end of the week on the more gravely soils but mostly the activity was spreading fertilizer and spraying. It was nice to see cows out in the pasture grazing on the spring grass.

# FULTON County, Russel McLucas Jr.

Some wheat in the area has been run with fertilizer and weed control.

# JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William Sheaffer

Favorable weather conditions allowed for many field activities. Crops are progressing; however, winter annuals are growing quite rapidly in the winter grains and alfalfa. Seeding of alfalfa and oats is near completion.

#### LACKAWANNA County, Eric Johnson

Few producers mentioned that they were planting their early sweet corn that would be under cover.

# LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

Rye is really growing fast, now in the jointing stage other cover crops not far behind. A few fields of corn have been planted. Many farmers busy hauling manure and applying burndown herbicide in preparation for planting.

## MERCER County, Jim Rust

Field activity picked later in the week with temperatures in the 70's. The pot holes in area highways give farmers another danger or safety hazard to worry about.

# **MONTGOMERY** County, Andrew Frankenfield

Warmer week with limited rain has allowed field activities to begin. Some activities include: spreading fertilizer and manure, spraying small grains and some tillage. Livestock are beginning to be introduced back on the pastures.

#### **PERRY County, David L. Swartz**

Temperatures were warm enough this past week to allow for some spring burn down herbicide applications to fields. Manure application from manure storages continued this week.
