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Week ending April 26, 2015

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<u>Fair Week for Field Work:</u> Pennsylvania had an average of 3.0 days suitable for field work last week.

Temperatures were reported with an average of 46(°F), a high of 78(°F) and a low of 18(°F). Further rain and cold temperatures have slowed overall progress and many plantings are a bit behind. Fruit growers in particular, shared concern over a potential frost which appears to have been avoided by most of Pennsylvania despite reports of snow this weekend in Cambria and Summerset counties. Warmer temperatures would be a welcome boon to all. Field activities included fertilizer and manure spreading, plowing and some oat and corn planting where weather permitted.

ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started week wet from heavy rains Sunday into Monday morning most areas got 2.5 inches of rainfall and then again Monday night had another 0.5" so we are plenty wet. Temperatures were in the mid 50's for morning temperatures but then rose to 64 then Wednesday morning was 44 and daytime only got in low 60's but sunny till evening then cloudy but breezy all day and Thursday and Friday was 37 with freeze warnings and also Saturday is to be colder. Day time temperatures only got to 45 degrees and windy. Pretty cold this time of year. No field work done this week for grain/forage producers. Small grains and forage crops are greening up and growing. Those crops could use some warmer temperatures and sunshine to help them. Fruit growers have been busy with trying to keep their orchards sprayed for controlling scab, blight etc. Freeze warning past few days and for tomorrow are a concern also. Stone fruit is blossoming and apples are pushing but cooler temperatures are holding them back a little. Vegetable growers are watching temperatures also for their crops that we have been having for their crops already planted. Overall the producers are readying their equipment for future planting season and awaiting the field conditions to permit them to access their spring field work.

ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr

Rain this week slowed the field work, but better weather later allowed for hauling manure, spreading fertilizer and herbicide burn down in preparation for planting. Cold nights Thur and Friday, did not reach critical temperatures for significant fruit bud damage. No winter damage to fruit is apparent at this time.

BEAVER County, Luke Fritz

Alfalfa and Oats are being seeded. Field applications of manure, lime, fertilizer and herbicide are being completed.

CAMBRIA County, Dolly Little

This week had a variety of weather patterns - rain, hail, snow, windy, and a little sun. Amongst all the crazy weather, farmers were spreading fertilizer, manure, plowing, and planting oats. Still behind in planting the crops in the county.

ERIE County, Nancy Lewis

Not a very good week for field activities. Heavy rains during the beginning of the week, followed by strong winds and below normal temperatures; prevented many activities from being conducted for this time of the year.

LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill

The cool weather is delaying the growth of small grains, however rye for forage is progressing well and some growers my begin cutting the end of this week. Overall corn planting is slow, but good soil moisture has allowed significant acres to planted.

LEBANON County, Charlene Ziegler

The weather remains very unseasonal with a couple nights of temperatures in the 30's. Corn and soybean planting is delayed while farmers wait for the warmer temperatures. Manure continues to be hauled. Some farmers are getting their cover crops burned down.

MERCER County, Jim Rust

Hay fields have started some growth this week. We had five nights in the mid-thirties and soil temperatures are low. Seeding of new hay fields are in progress the last few days.

MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield

Heavy rain Monday, 1.5" put an end to field work followed by cold, wet and windy conditions most of the week. Small grains, hay fields and pastures responded well to the rain and the incorporation of the fertilizer that was applied prior to the rain. Late week cold temperatures created concerns for those with tree fruit and tender vegetables planted.

Corn planting was on hold this past week following a window of suitable conditions the week before that some farmers took advantage of. Waiting for an extended period of warmer, sunnier weather to get herbicide applications made.
