

Good Week for Field Work: Pennsylvania had an average of 5.5 days suitable for field work last week. Temperatures for the state were reported an average of 59(°F), with a high of 89(°F) and a low of 24(°F). Patchy weather and large fluctuations in temperature resulted in varied reports across the state. Some regions were hit with frost while others complained of heat. Overall, dry conditions left many wishing for a bit rain. Tobacco planting is in full swing. Field activities included corn, potato, and soybean planting in addition to spraying for corn and oats.

# ADAMS County, Judy A. Behney

Adams County started the week with morning temperatures in the 70's and Monday was up to 89 daytime and muggy with humidity and afternoon thunderstorms throughout the county. Most everyone got some but ranged from 3/4 inch to 2 inches. Tuesday was 68 degrees and humidity still high but cloudy in 80's. Wednesday was 50 morning temperatures and sunny blue sky and daytime into 70's. Thursday was 50 degrees morning and cloudy with some rainfall and then 60 daytime temperatures and after dark some showers but not much accumulation. Today Friday started 53 and suppose to be higher 60's later and blue sunny skies. Corn and soybeans continue to be planted where soil conditions permit. Some parts of the county received more rainfall than others so slowed planting down. Corn and soybeans are emerging that were planted a week ago so that is making the producers happy as it was pretty dry here for awhile and they weren't sure if going to emerge and/or if their chemicals were going to work that were sprayed during the dry time. More corn and soybeans will be planted the next few weeks. Wheat and barley and other forage crops are looking good and getting nice heads and some height. Oats that was sown earlier is looking good. Forage is being chopped when weather permits and also so dry hay will be made here this weekend. Fruit growers are happy with the way the fruit bloomed this spring and hoping for a good set. They are concerned with insects affecting their crops and also the rainy/cloudy periods affecting fire blight, scab etc. Vegetables continue to grow and some earlier planted are being harvested. Strawberries will be harvested here within the week. Overall the producers are busy doing variety of jobs in the fields all at the same time due to the weather we had this spring. All looking forward to good yields for their crops.

## **ADAMS County, Thomas Kerr**

A few showers only made tough hay making for a day, did not help soil moisture. Nearly all corn planted and most of full season soybeans are now planted. Hay making first cutting is done for alfalfa. Fruit crop reports vary from light to average in apples depending on if the crop was heavy last year. All other fruit looks good at this time.

# **ADAMS County, Lee Showalter**

Most apples have now been chemically thinned. Final set is unknown at this time, but outlook is favorable.

## **CAMBRIA / SOMERSET Counties, David Stolz**

A lot of frost and freeze damage to emerged corn.

# **CAMBRIA County, Dolly Little**

The weather was wild this week; temperature drops 10 to 30 degrees from evening to morning. Frost and some freeze in county on Thursday night. Activities included corn, potato, and soybean plantings. Spraying corn and oats and some cleaning up their planting equipment for storage.

#### **CENTRE County, Dick A Decker**

Field work continued, with most days suitable for some work. Light rain and misting slowed some activities. Total of 3/8" in my gauge for the week. Top soil moisture low at some locations. Frost in low areas May 23 could cause some replant issues.

# FULTON County, Russell McLucas Jr.

We really need some water, conditions are very dry.

## JUNIATA/SNYDER Counties, William Sheaffer

Very heavy rainfall in some parts of the area on Monday night. Cold temperatures following the rainfall has taken the green color out of the emerged corn. Haymaking is in full swing, while planting is continuing.

# **LANCASTER County, Jeff Graybill**

Spotty showers across the county beginning of the week brought much needed rain to some. In general corn and soybeans are up and looking good, with some poor stands due to dry weather. Tobacco planting was in full swing, however dry weather may put that on hold until showers arrive.

## **LEBANON County, Charlene Ziegler**

A storm crossed the county last week. The mid-section received 2.5 - 3 inches of rain. Other areas just over an inch. During the dry part of the week, alfalfa and grass hay was cut and baled.

## **MERCER County, Jim Rust**

Another week without rain for our area. Crops are under stress. Herbicides need rainfall and weeds are growing.

## **MONTGOMERY County, Andrew Frankenfield**

Still very dry. No measurable rain again this week. No-tillers are still planting corn and soybeans, many of those that tilled ground are now waiting for moisture to return before they resume planting. Farmers are now baling rye straw and hay, both look to be about 75% of average. Pasture growth has slowed considerably, people are now using the word drought and referencing the year 1999. Sweet corn growers are irrigating after planting to germinate the corn.

#### YORK County, John Rowehl

Soybean fields planted with a drill in dry tilled ground have poor emergence. Most wheat is flowering.
